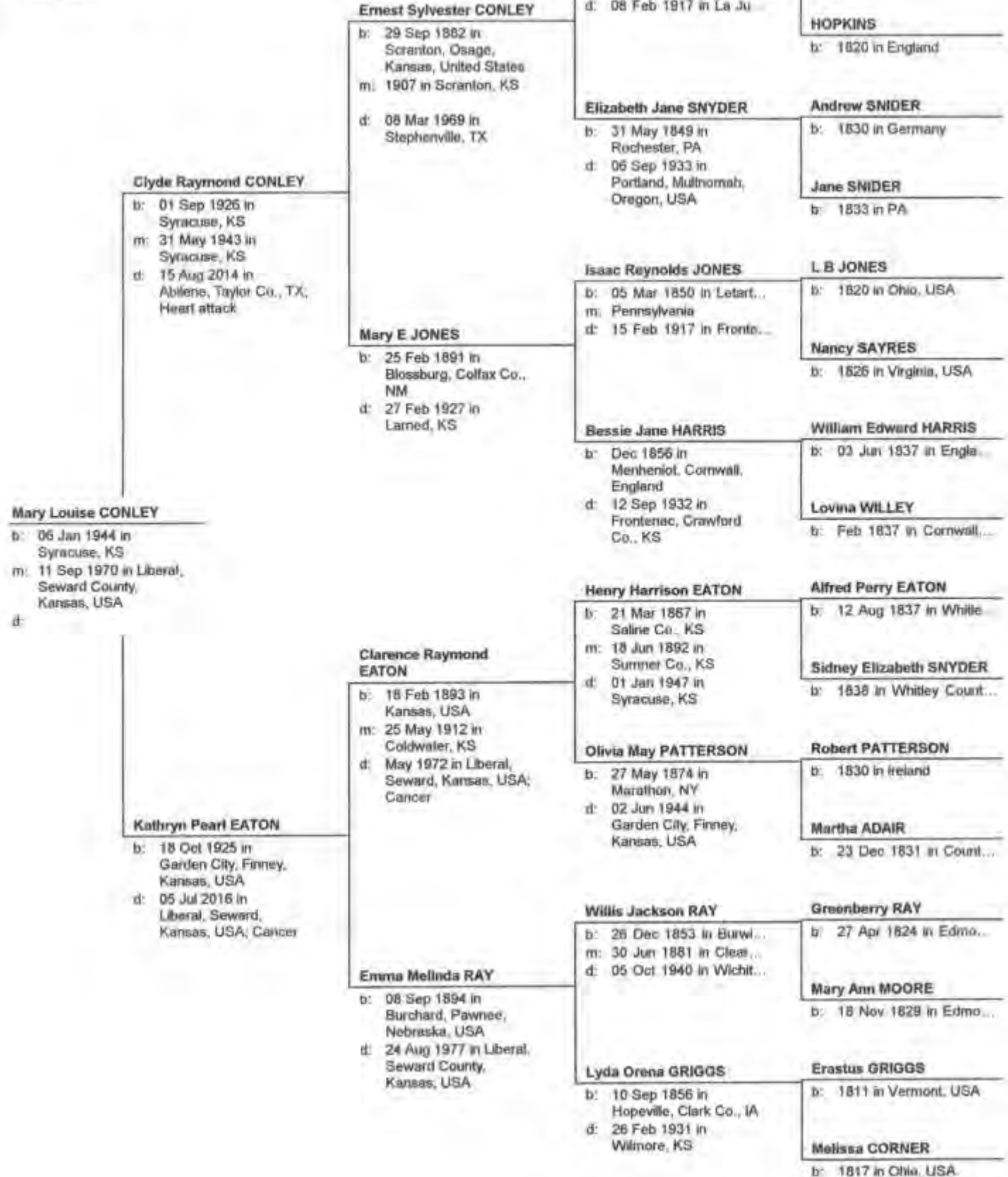

CITY AND COUNTY NEWS.

Uncle Jack Peyton returned from Missouri this week.

Dr. Angel, of Emporia, has been visiting the city with a view of locating.

Deiter & Kaiser have refitted up their shop preparatory to the summer trade.

Our lady correspondent on the Cowskin favors us with a chatty letter this week

John B. Dunscomb, the wide-awake dealer of Clear Water, was in town last Saturday.

Our office and its employes were honored with a call from a bevy of young ladies on Monday.

Mr. Frank Wright's lady, who has been spending the winter in Ohio, returned home last Friday.

Street Commissioner Pride is still continuing the good work of grading up streets and cleaning out gutters.

The Hope is that the Dutch (Bill) and English (N. A.) will not lose sight of the West's interests in the coming races.

His honor, W. C. Little, the probate judge of Sedgwick county, returned home from an eastern visit on Saturday last.

Sunny Southern Kansas was treated to a frolicsome frigid dampness, that came very near being snow, on Monday night.

The regular monthly meeting of the board of trade will be held on Thursday next – postponed on account of the election.

Butter and eggs, which have been high priced luxuries for some time back, are becoming more plentiful in our market.

Our city marshal, Mike Meagher, returned last week from a fruitless pursuit of the absconding and multifarious officer, George D'Amour.

Quite a large crowd gathered at the corner of Main and Second streets, on Monday morning, to witness the ground breaking for the \$30,000 hotel.¹

The amendments to certain sections of law governing cities of the second class, as passed last winter, will be found on the first page of this week's paper.

Judge M. S. Adams, of Leavenworth, spent a day in our town. He was on his road to Winfield to attend the district court, now in session at that point.

Through private enterprise of farmers and settlers interested, the slough and Cowskin, on the Medicine Lodge road, west of Wichita, have both been bridged.

The storeroom and banking room of Wm. C. Woodman & Son have both been refitted up and painted, and are now as pleasant and tasty as any place of business in the city.

Mrs. S. A. Page, whose millinery establishment adjoins the bank of W. C. Woodman, has just received her spring stock of goods, a large and fashionable assortment. Her card will appear next week.

Wm. Mathewson's train, from Fort Sill, arrived last Saturday, heavily loaded with choice buffalo robes, consigned to J. R. Mead. The grass around Sill is up sufficient for fine pasturage. Indians all quiet.

We have a communication in our possession from the secretary of the interior, touching a land contest case of Abraham Rawlinson vs. Henry Sherwood, which the former party can have by calling at the Eagle office.

By a card elsewhere it will be seen that Dr. S. B. Street is at present located near Cowskin Grove, where he will still continue the practice of medicine. Persons desiring his professional services will please take notice.

In view of the fire ordinance, every available foot of frontage on Main street, between Douglas avenue and First street, is being utilized. The fire ordinance was very wise, only it should have been passed many months ago.

Hudson George has been busy for two weeks past with his compass and transit. From some cause or other the surveys heretofore made in the city do not hitch, and he has all kinds of trouble in locating some permanent buildings on Douglas avenue.

New residences are going up in every part of town. The music of the saw and hammer is heard from early morn till dewy eve. On J. R. Mead's addition alone we should judge that not less than thirty houses have been erected already this spring.

We spoke last week of the magnitude of the fur and hide trade. As another indication of its importance and the amount of money employed in that traffic, we state that the Messrs. Hays Bros. have shipped in three months over \$24,000 worth on their own account.

M. R. Moser is making some good improvements upon his forty acre lot on the rise east of town. He intends to make it one of the most interesting spots in the valley. He has just completed transplanting upon the place 1000 fruit trees, of every conceivable variety.

Samuel Ewing, of Evans, Colorado, came here last week and made some investments in land. Mr. E. is an old wheat grower, and he gives it as his opinion that this is the finest wheat country outside of California in the Union. He intends making this valley his home.

Ex-Commissioner H. C. Ramlow has been selling considerable quantities of Norway oats in our market during the past week. We took occasion to test their weight and found them forty pounds to the bushel, strong. He has still more of the same crop for sale on his place, in Park township.

Messrs. Steele & Levy sold since Monday the following described real estate at the prices annexed: The west half of section 20, township 28, 1 east, to Mr. Geo. W. Elder, \$1250; the northwest quarter of section 19, township 28, 1 west, to C. P. Lyon, \$1000; also several building lots in Greiffenstein's addition.

The city board of trade have decided upon having a large number of circulars printed, which will contain many important facts touching the cattle market of this point, together with the extract from a letter from Texas printed last week, for distribution among cattle buyers of the north and east.

M.H. Garner arrived in this place from Elkhart, Indiana, on the 10th of this month. Within the next ten days he bought a quarter section of land, plowed and seeded down to wheat thirty-four acres of it, and came to town on the 11th day and bought a lot of flax seed and subscribed for the Eagle. Mr. G. thinks this is the finest country, without exceptions,

in the world, and he says that within a year he will have a successful farm in cultivation.

"Heaven tempers the wind to the shorn lamb." But for the large herds of buffalo that roam the west, many frontier settlers would have suffered for food the past winter. Buffalo furnished thousands of these new settlers meat, while they have been enabled from the sale of the hides to buy clothing. Now that spring has come and the bison has grown poor, fat geese, brant and ducks by the hundreds of thousands fill the air, and the settlers have another source of supplies while they put in their crops.

Saturday afternoon was extremely pleasant; the town was full of people; Main street was a jam. All things being propitious, our band appeared on the verandah of the Southern Hotel, where for an hour they discourse many of their finest pieces. Everybody seemed delighted, except, maybe, the fellows whose teams were not used to that sort of "carryin's on" and became restive. We would like to know who is going move in the matter of that concert. Give the boys the benefit of the instruction of a professional but for three months and they'll knock the spots off any brass blowing arrangement in the state.

The "Eaglet" lit down on the Wichita course last week. It was a little, unfledged squab, but of the amount of skittishness developed, and the tearful dust kicked up, we rise to explain. All Hope at once deserted iron-gray "Jim" and back he settled on his staple "ring," stretching his supple length from Douglas avenue clear up to the new hotel, in which his backers were slyly taking stock - "in a horn" - while threshing-machine "Bob" came down Douglas avenue, from the bridge to the depot, in a style that plainly said, "Here's my track and this hoss wants no other stamping ground." "Big Jake" just tore his five per cent. mortgage blanket into shreds, and swallowed his groom's sponge, which had been soaked in "Turn Halle" lager a week. Lynchburg "George," he of the fine eye and dilating nostril, bucked, bolted the track and went tearing away in wheelbarrow shafts for his former quiet grazing ground on the banks of the classical Cowskin. Around on his single-racking hoof, with a strain that bursted his belly-band, waltzed old Dan Rice's corn-fed pony "Kirk." While the Plymouth colt, he

of the Puritan stock, kicked himself out of his old shoes. The slow race ponies, "Charley" and "Milo," said to relate, came very near being lost in the dust and confusion kicked up by a rattling little limping, glass-eyed dobbin, which had not been noticed before, called "Mike." As to the jockeys, timers, trainers and backers, they all now solemnly avow no race was ever contemplated, while the stable boys of the "Arkansas Valley," "First National" and "Ring Corner" are being energetically treated for the "thumps" and "upyersnootic" by that eminent veterinary surgeon "Eaglet."

The city election next Tuesday promises to be, if not tame, at least a pleasant, good-natured race. No political party, as such, having made nominations, no lines are perceptible and no acrimonious discussions are heard. The canvass is eminently independent, each voter being left to rely on his own individual choice and judgment. The only semblance of tickets are the parties presented for mayor, police judge and treasurer by two different caucuses, made up of friends of candidates. For several places we have not even heard a name mentioned. We have talked with all the leading candidates for the leading positions and are satisfied that in any event the best interests of the city will be carefully studied and guarded, but as a republican journalist we should have felt more at home had our party selected a ticket in behalf of which it would have become our duty to have written good words of candidates and platform. But so little interest is felt that candidates have not gone even to the expense of announcing their names. The strongest pull will be made for the police judgeship, for which position there are not less than four or five candidates. It is an onerous one, and pays from \$800 to \$1,000 per annum. Some little interest has been evinced for the place of city treasurer, and, in addition to Messrs. Phillips and Kellogg, Mr. Mike Zimmerly has taken the field. There are four places in the board of education to fill, as also a school treasurer. We have heard no name mentioned as yet for either. The city should poll from four to five hundred votes, but the present indications are that not over three hundred fifty will be polled.

The new brick yard of J. W. Phillips, on J. M. Steele's place, east of Chisholm, was visited on Monday. Mr. P. had about completed his arrange-

ments for the manufacture of brick upon an extensive scale. The foreman of the yard, Mr. S. H. Van Schorck, informed us that moulding could be commenced sometime this week. Four mortar pits have been made, in which the mud will be mixed by a patent arrangement. Two hundred cords of wood had already been delivered upon the ground and another hundred cords contracted for. Two wells had been sunk on the ground, in which water in abundance was found. A sand bank had just been opened not over two hundred feet from the pits. From the number of wheelbarrows, tables, moulds, dump-carts, etc., upon the ground, we should judge Mr. Phillips means business. Two sets of hands will be started in with, which hands, for the most part, are excellent workmen, from Bloomington, Illinois. We see no possible chance of failure if the brick do not check or crack in the process of yard drying. The clay had stood all tests so far, some of which was sent to Illinois and burned in a kiln. If no bad luck attends the enterprise, Mr. P. calculates that he will have a million brick ready for the market during the season.

The M. E. annual conference meets this week at Ottawa, Kansas. Rev. J. F. Nessly preached his farewell sermon on last Sabbath evening to a large congregation. His labors among this people for the past year have been signally fruitful and abundantly blessed. When Mr. Nessly came here last spring the outlook was discouraging. The society was weak and scattered. The town had had no station minister before. Within that short period the church has been thoroughly organized, with a membership now rising one hundred and eighty members. A church costing over two thousand dollars has been built and paid for, and also a neat, comfortable parsonage. Within the year, for church, parsonage and minister's salary, over five thousand dollars have been raised. Mr. N. has decided to retire at present from a ministerial life. In bidding adieu in that capacity he takes with him the heartiest well-wishes of the entire community.

There is a proposition to vote \$3,000 in bonds for the purpose of erecting an addition to the school house submitted to the voters of this city at the election next Tuesday. We dislike the idea of erecting any more public buildings out of wood, but when we take into consideration our newness as a place,

the present rate of taxation, together with the large number of children unprovided for, it is probably the wisest thing that the board could do. The length of time proposed for the bonds to run is too short. Bonds running so short a time are not in demand, besides it will become necessary to commence raising a sinking fund almost immediately. The location is all that could be desired, and we are only sorry that the board could not have devised a way for room for another year or two, by which time it might have been possible to erect permanent school buildings.

Rev. J. P. Harsen addressed a large and intelligent audience last Sabbath evening upon the wicked degeneracy of the times and political corruption in high places. He handled his subject in a way that showed he had given it patient thought. Whatever objections may be urged against mixing church and state, we think it high time for ministers to rise in their places and denounce the spirit of corruption that of late seems to threaten the life of American liberty. The people even seem to wink at delinquencies and open corruption in high officials that fifty years ago would have consigned the participants to eternal infamy and disgrace.

The great stage route from Wichita to Fort Sill is now an established fact. By Terrill returned from the latter point last Friday, and he informs us that the whole line is stocked with good horses, the stations averaging from twelve to fifteen miles apart. The distance from Wichita to Fort Sill is two hundred and forty long miles, and the time taken to make the run is two days and one night. The fare is \$25. The travel is so much greater than was at first anticipated that semi-weekly trips will be made after this week. Wichita has now become the headquarters for the trade of Fort Sill and all the western portion of the Indian territory.

John T. Carpenter, county commissioner, desires us to say, touching a certain anonymous communication which we refused to publish last week, that all material allegations contained therein were without any foundation in truth whatever, and that the "several citizens of Park township" represented not to exceed two or three individuals.

After partaking of the Lord's supper in Wichita it is considered a breach of good manners to pick one's teeth with a bowie knife. — *Ft. Scott Monitor*.

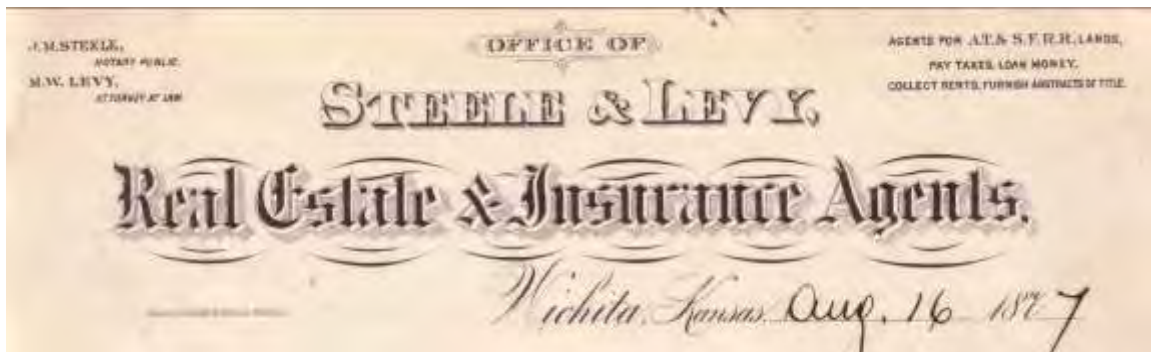

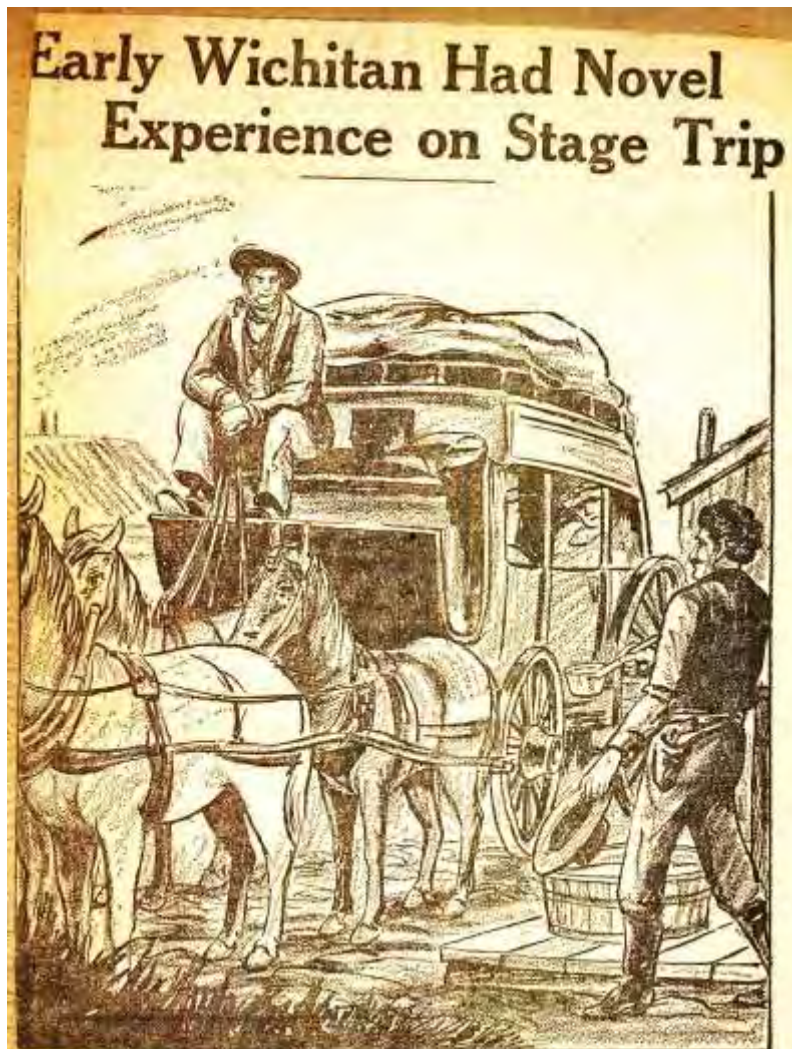

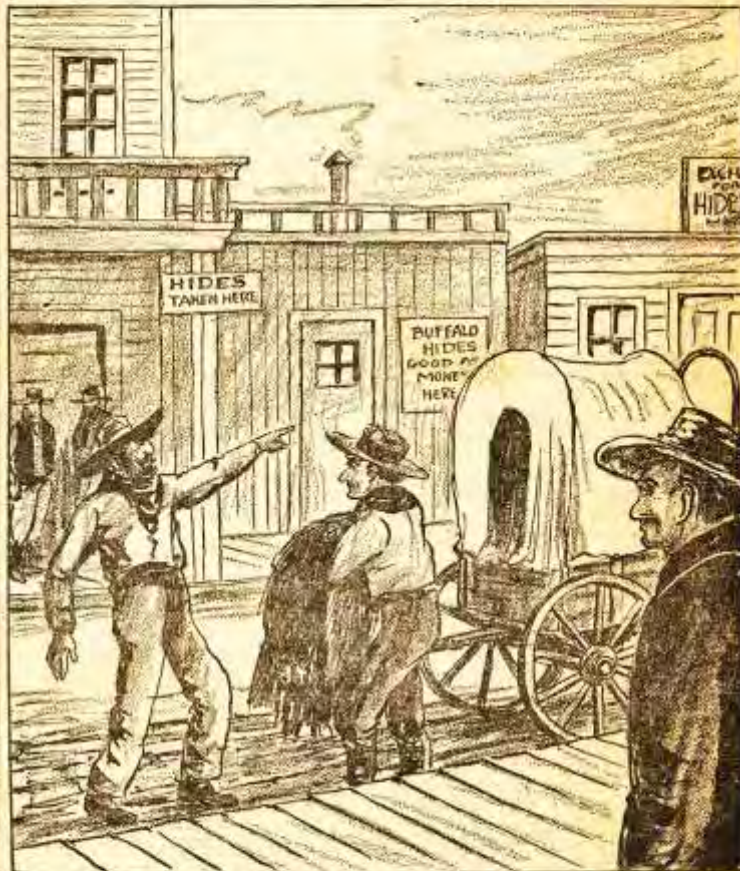
RIDING in a stage coach when the Tisdale Overland was the only regular transportation system into Wichita was an experience which, as a rule, did not cause passengers to become friendly, as an incident recalled by a pioneer Wichita woman, Mrs. Frank Todd, who in 1870 came to Wichita from Newton in such a stage. She has related an experience on that trip with an "Appolo like" man with dark curly hair who talked to another man about a "hide out" and the state of his wife's health. At the relay station between Newton and Wichita the handsome man got out and pumped a dipper of water which he handed to Mrs. Todd, who at that time was 18 years old and Miss Joanna Laurretta Packer. It was some time later that the young lady learned her kindly, courtly traveling companion was the "Curly" Marshall who was supposed to be in bad with a dozen law enforcement officials and who soon was tucked away in his final resting place on the hill.

"HIDES GOOD AS MONEY HERE." Such inscriptions on many large signs in West Wichita in 1870 indicated the demand at that time for buffalo hides. Fitch Freeman of Wichita was 17 years of age at that time and with his father and a party of settlers from south of Wichita went hunting near where Conway Springs now is located. They were successful and soon filled two wagons with buffalo hides and set out for the nearest market, Wichita. When they arrived on the west bank of the Arkansas the straggling community there had many such "hide" signs and they then saw the first bridge across the Arkansas river, a toll bridge, so they offered hides for the toll and they were accepted, the toll being a hide for each wagon.

Time and space would not admit of us giving the number of votes as they were cast in each ward, consequently we give them mostly in the aggregate. The ticket is a good one and we may look for an able and judicious administration of affairs in our city for the coming year.

For several weeks past the EAGLE has called the attention of our farmers to the probable profit that might be realized in the cultivation of the caster bean. The same matter coming up for discussion in the city board of trade, that body has ordered a lot of seed which will be on in a few days, and which been ordered to be sold to farmers at net cost. We heartily commend the action. We have hunted up the figures relative to the market price paid per bushel, and the number of bushels raised to the acre is twenty-five; the market price per bushel at St. Louis ranges from \$1.50 to \$1.60. If \$1.25 per bushel could be realized here it would prove a much more profitable crop than wheat, for the reason that it does not require half the labor to raise it, and it is a kind of crop that never fails. As to drouth, it cannot affect the caster bean. The beans should be planted from four to five feet apart, with five or six in a hill. This is done to guard against the cut worm, which sometimes destroys the plant just as it makes its appearance above the ground. After it is sufficiently advanced to be out of danger, then the hill should be thinned out to a single plant. It is cultivated just as corn is, as far as we are able to learn. It casts a dense shade and is death to weeds when it gets a start. If any of our farmers conclude to try the crop, we hope they will report their progress to the columns of the EAGLE.

From Mr. Stem, of the firm of Kullak, Millis & Stem, contractors of the Metropolitan hotel¹ of this

place, we get the following figures touching the dimensions of the building. It is 100 feet on Main street by 80 on Second street, three stories high. The hotel part will contain seventy-six rooms. The dining room will be 38x40 feet. The first story will have five business rooms of 20x80 feet, each fourteen in the clear, iron front, Corinthian columns. Six hundred thousand brick will be used in the construction of the building, four thousand feet of stone and one hundred forty thousand feet of lumber. The cornice of both fronts will be ornamented with heavy brackets. The new hotel will be the largest hotel in Southern Kansas, and as to appointments and conveniences, second to no public house in the state of Kansas. The building will cost between thirty and forty thousand dollars, and will be finished by the first day of September.

As an indication of the estimation placed upon the EAGLE by parties residing outside of the state, we produce a little extract or P. S. of a letter written to the county treasurer of this county, by a gentleman residing in Bloomington, Illinois, which gentleman paid our city a visit last spring, at which time he became a subscriber. We are aware that hundreds have been induced to visit, invest and settle in this valley through the instrumentality of this paper, yet we cannot help feeling gratified when we run across such an unselfish and appreciative commendation of our labors as is found in the following:

The election of officers for the M.E. Sunday school, for the coming year will take place next Sabbath. A full attendance is desired.

Mr. Rue, of Lawrence, has leased the yards for Mr. Weidner, on the other side of the Little river, and has contracted to make 600,000 brick [sic] this season.

The communication from Waco giving the proceedings of a convention held in Watson township came too late for publication in last week's issue.

J. S. Danford, of the first national bank of Eldorado, and wife, also Chas. Foulks and wife of the same place, paid our city a visit last Saturday.

The coal dealers, of which two principal firms are J. Exton and D. A. Mitchell, received during the last ten months 425 carloads of coal, or one hundred and twenty thousand bushels.

We can express no very high opinion of the new cross-walks put down by the city, nor yet of the manner in which they are laid. In a few months many of them will be as though they never had been.

The readers of this paper are treated to another refrain from the long silent harp of "Mozart." We think that gentleman a little harsh in his criticisms – at least, we cannot endorse altogether his political prelude.

After the full returns were received on Tuesday night the band boys, with quite a number of friends, serenaded the newly elected mayor, Mr. Hope, who responded to the compliment with an appropriate and well-timed speech.

We were honored last week with calls from Mr. Perry, of the Hutchinson *News*, and Mr. Ashbaugh,

of the Newton *Kansan*, brother editors who are laboring shoulder to shoulder with the EAGLE in the upbuilding of the Southwest.

C. S. Broadbent, county clerk of Sumner county, passed through our city last Monday on his way to Topeka, to attend the state farmers convention as a delegate from the Oxford township farmers club and the Arkansas valley fair company.

Fifty teams and wagons containing emigrants [sic] settlers passed through here one day last week *en route* for Barbour county. As a stock raising county the above is very superior, but it does not compare with Sumner and Sedgwick for agricultural purposes.

Mr. M. G. Lane, of Illinois, a gentleman of high educational attainments, one that is enthusiastic in everything that pertains to the culture of the rising generation, has been visiting our place for several days and has concluded to make Wichita his future home.

For severity the part winter has been unparalleled, yet we cannot learn that the loss in live stock was so great as that of a year ago. Cooke & Adams lost during the last storm ten head out of their herd of 400, which is the only instance that has as yet been reported to us.

Mrs. Watson & O'Conner are now prepared to do dressmaking in all the latest styles. They also have a full line of millinery goods and dress trimmings. On Saturday they have an opening, and they invite all the ladies of Wichita and vicinity to call and examine their stock.

Col. Woodbury started yesterday for drills and machinery, with which he expects to find coal on the rise east of town. Small lumps of coal have of late been picked up in the bed of a ravine near the head of Gypsum, and there is but little doubt of the success of Mr. W.'s enterprise. Haste the day, for the question of fuel to this valley in a very few years will be an all important one.

Will Rouse, who was so intimately connected with the early trials and triumphs of our young city, was in town on last Saturday looking exceedingly happy and fat. His attention is so closely taken up with his stock and farm that he had not been to town for months. He is putting out two thousand six hundred fruit and nursery grown forest trees this spring.

Mr. Peter Felter, of Kane, Green county, Indiana, who made some extensive purchases here last year, is back again this spring putting more of his Hoosier money in Jayhawker real estate. He has purchased, also, several city lots and will erect two buildings the coming summer. He says there is no chance for this county or anything in it to fail. His purchases were made through Steele & Levy.

“Wanted – We wish to enter into contract to deliver about the 1st day of July, at Wichita, several thousand head of beeves² and stock cattle. Parties wishing to buy, please address Maverick & Kroeger, San Antonio, Texas.” The foregoing are the words of an advertisement appearing in the Kansas City Times, yet that paper and its contemporaries have the impudence from day to day to write editorials which set forth that Wichita will not be the great cattle mart for 1873. It is no use to kick against the pricks. If Kansas City don't like the aspect of affairs let her seek a direct connection with Wichita.

Captain A. M. Wright, who lives near Wellington, has been prospecting some fifty miles west of his home. In a succession of deep gulches he found fine growths of red cedar, from some of which he found no difficulty in splitting sixteen good posts from a single cut. He says there is an abundance of such timber in the above locality. He also brought back some specimens of iron ore that has been pronounced 70 per cent. pure iron. Nothing is yet comparatively known of the natural resources of this vast country.

Charley Hill has been making necessary additions to his drug establishment. Running the whole length of his salesroom is a set of upright glass cases for the protection of package medicines. He has also put a cellar under his building and erected about the handsomest sign in the city, which consists of a semi-circle enclosing a golden mortar. Mr. Hill has ordered a fine soda fountain, which will be up before the sultry days are here. Mr. Hill is also building a residence on Market street.

S. L. Davidson bought, last week, the Mansard cottage built by W. A. Shuman.

MHGS has just finished digitizing the records of The Book Club, a Wichita women's club that was founded in 1914 and continues to meet today.

Each year, The Book Club members each select a book for the group to read; these books are passed between members. The club meets each month between September and May; members take turns hosting and providing meeting programs on topics relating to art, literature, culture and history.

The charter members were Mrs. John Evans, Miss Lotta Hess, Miss Maud Hess (later Mrs Alfred Rothchild), Mary Walker (later Mrs Paul Hart), Vera Clemes (later Mrs Roger Hurd), Nourma Harris, Mrs. Chester Long, Dorothy Hurd (later Mrs. Robert McCorriston), Mrs. Charles Moore, Mrs. Howard Potts, Charlotte Brodie (later Mrs Victor Rule), Mrs Thor Jager, Mrs Charles Testard, and Mrs. Thomas Griffith. The only book we know for sure that they read was "Old Wives' Tale" by A. Bennett; written in 1908, it was an extremely popular novel about two English sisters, one who stays in rural England, and one who elopes to Paris during the French Revolution. 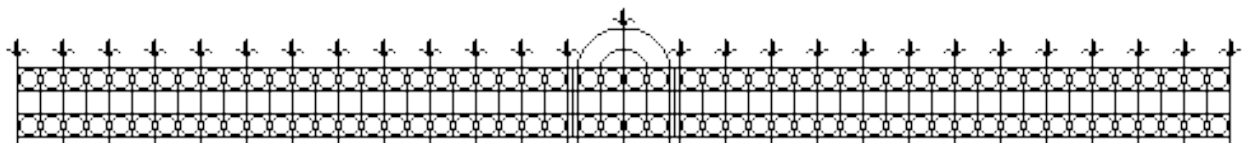
