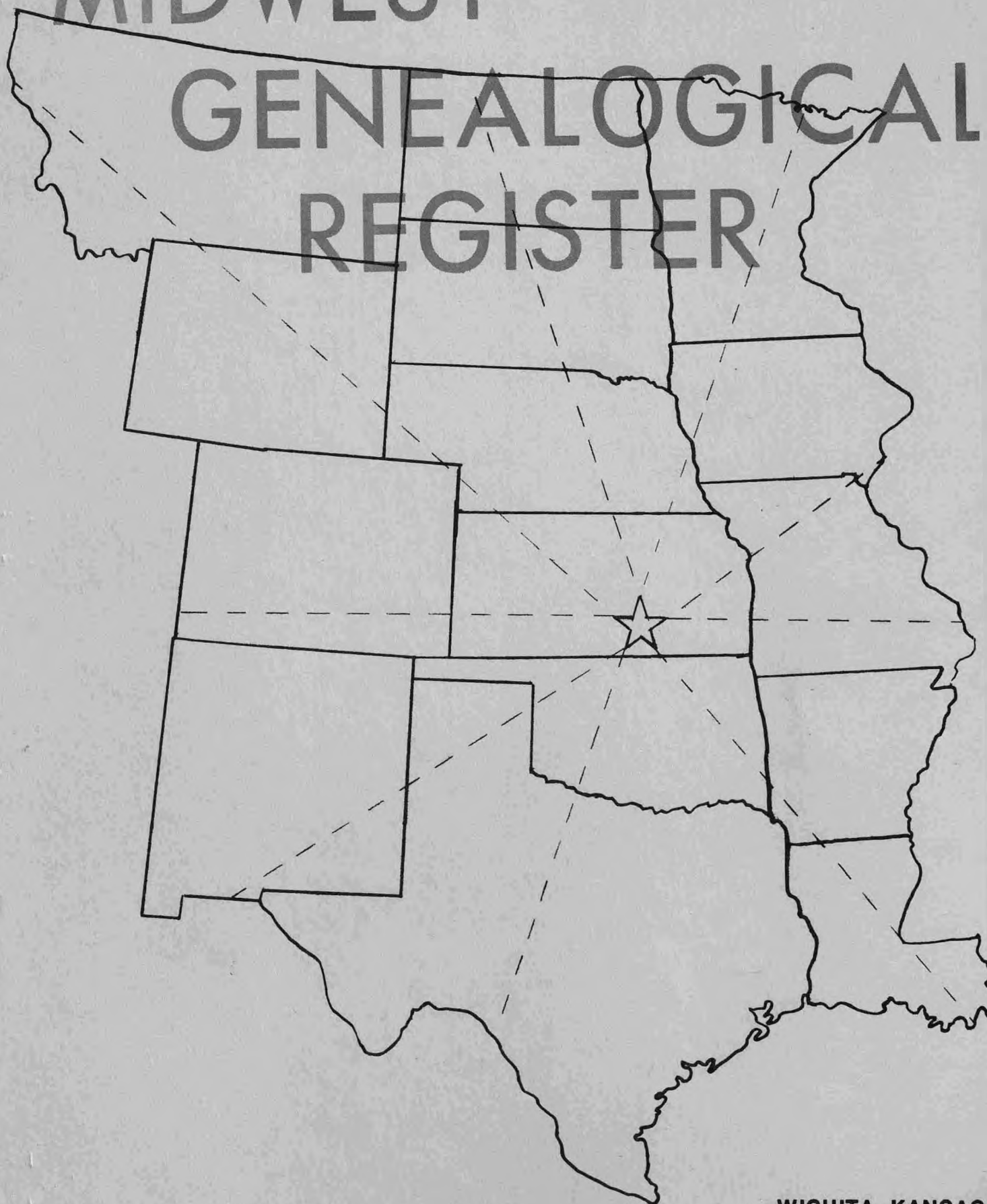

Everyone is busy but the library committee managed to hold a meeting in July, mainly for the purpose of choosing books and magazines for our library. Hopefully, there will be something for everyone. The "Blue Book-Who's Searching Where" aided in the selections. The committee will meet again soon to make further selections so make your wants known.

Books on who, what and where and how have been pulled from shelves and put together to aid in your searching. There are also folders under "potpourri" containing flyers on books for sale (county and family) and other miscellany. Look under the state.

World Conference Papers (yellow folders on rack) are available for checking out. There is a lot of material in them.

The library rules are being published this time to refresh your memory. PLEASE NOTICE NUMBER 3. As our membership is large, the committee feels that books should be returned after two weeks. A number of books are in great demand. The name of the game is circulation. We hope to initiate some system of reserving books soon. Check at the desk to see if we can help you.

LIBRARY RULES

1. Each member who wishes to borrow books or magazines shall pay 50¢ a year for a library card.
2. Two books or two volumes or combination of magazines may be checked out at one time.
3. Loans must be returned within a period of two weeks, unless permission is requested of librarian for an extension. Persons with overdue books should make a donation to the piggy bank. (Funds are used to buy more books and magazines)

5. Library hours-1pm to 9pm Tuesdays except at stated times. (Vacations or holidays)

Lucius Families U.S.A.  
Vol. I

Concerning the Descendants of  
Joseph and Catherine (Mortrier) Lucius  
Who settled in Seneca County, Ohio  
in 1854

Collected and Compiled By  
Ophelia Richardson Wade

This is Volume One of six volumes that Mrs. Wade is printing concerning the Lucius families. It is a genealogy and Mrs. Wade follows the descendants of Joseph and Catherine Lucius who arrived in America in 1853, and settled in Seneca County, Ohio. The origin of the family is not certain; but they probably came from Alsace-Lorraine, Luxembourg or Belgium. Along with giving the vital records, Mrs. Wade has included religion, occupation, cause of death and other interesting facts if they are known. Addresses of present day descendants are given.

The Documentary section includes copies of the census record, Congressional Record, deeds, Marriage, birth and death records extracted from county court houses. From her own work she has extracted fiftieth wedding anniversaries, inter-marriages, twins, and those in the priesthood and convent.

It is well indexed. INSCRIPTIONS COPIED FROM MONUMENTS

Taken from an old History of the U.S.--copied by Naomi Clark Lexington, Kentucky (public square, or court house yard)

To the memory of WILLIAM TAYLOR BARRY, this monument is erected by his friends in Kentucky (the site being granted by the County Court of Fayette), as a testimony of their respect and admiration of his virtues and talents. He was born 5th Feb. 1784, in Lunenburg City, Va., and came to Kentucky in his 12th year. Was successively a member of both Houses of the General Assembly, a Judge, a Senator and Representative in Congress, Lieut. Gov. of Ky., and an Aide-camp to Gov. Shelby at the battle of the Thames. On Andrew Jackson's accession to the Presidency, he was called to his Cabinet as Post Master General, which office he held until 1st of May, 1835, when he was appointed Env. Ex. & Min. Plen. to Spain. He was elected Hon'y Member of the French Univ. Stat. Soc., in June 1833. He died at Liverpool, on his way to Madrid, on 30th Aug., 1835. His body lies on Albion's white shores; his Fame in the History of his Country, and is as immortal as America's Liberty and Glory.

NOAH NOBLE, born in Virginia, Jan. 15, A.D., Governor of Indiana from 1831 to 1837. Died at Indianapolis Feb. A.D. 1844.

OBITUARY OF SUSANA BOESE

Our dear Mother and Widow, SUSANA BOESE (nee Richert) was born January 12, 1848 in Poland Russia, in the Village Jadwanin. And died January 7 1936, near Galva, Kansas at the home of her children, ENOCH UNRUHS, at the age of 87 years, 11 mo. and 28 days.

On New Years day she took sick with a cold, which later developed into pneumonia causing her death.

In 1874 they left their Homeland and emigrated to America; as much as we know they landed at Newton, Kansas. Later they decided and moved to Yankton (later Marion) So. Dakota.

There on the open Prairies they put up their hut in Hutchinson County and started out in hopes that the good Lord would bless their labor and provide food and raiment for them, which He also did. As experience teaches, all beginning is hard, so this became true to them also, more so while they were struck by a severe tornado, by which their home and farmtools were destroyed.

Some years later they decided to move from Marion So. Dakota back to Kansas again, settling down near Galva, Kansas, McPherson County. Again they started out anew, and by thrift and economy the good Lord blessed their labor with a home for themselves and for their children.

At the age of 18 years she united in marriage with her already departed Husband, Benjamin Boese. This Union was blessed with 13 children, 8 sons and 5 daughters. For 49 years they were sharing their joys and difficulties in fellowship. 1915 her companion was taken from her side, which left her a lonesome widow for 21 years. In her days of lonesomeness the Lord drew near to her, she was longing for peace and rest for her soul, she took her refuge to her Savior and told Him her troubles, and soon she found peace and her heart was filled with the love of Jesus, this she regarded so much, and felt so thankful for.

She was added to the church through Baptism April 10 1927 remaining a true sister unto her end. (THIS IS MY OWN NOTE-- THIS WAS THE HOLDERMAN CHURCH AS OPPOSED TO THE MENNONITE CHURCH TO WHICH SHE HAD BEEN A MEMBER.) The later years she alternately was taken care by her children. The mourners of her departure are 3 sons and 2 daughters, 27 grandchildren and 4 Greatgrandchildren and 2 sisters. 8 children, 7 in their infancy, 11 grandchildren preceed Father and Mother to that better Home above.

The whole Beis family will leave which is composed of the wife Susanna, the son Benjamin and two daughters, Elena (Helen) and Ekaterina (Katherine). To verify this, Immediate immigration of the Beis family out of the Russian State. This certificate is issued with the signature and official stamp of the authority with the provision that if Beis does not leave Russia or does not receive a national passport for free settlement within Russia within one year then he will be registered at this office again. Issued the 5 (fifth) day of September 1874.

PITTSBURG, CRAWFORD COUNTY, KANSAS

In the winter of 1875, John B. Sargent and E. R. Moffett, both of Joplin, Mo., conceived the plan of building a railroad from Joplin to Girard, Kansas. These two men were engaged in lead and zinc mining at Joplin. When in 1876, the grading reached the vicinity of Pittsburg, they had the town laid out by Colonel E. H. Brown, who had charge of the construction of the railroad. One hundred and sixty acres were platted, and Broadway and 4th Streets were graded, each one-half mile. Forty acres from four sections constituted the townsite, a section corner being the center of the town. The land belonged to the Kansas City, Ft. Scott and Gulf Railroad, but was occupied and claimed as follows:

The E $\frac{1}{2}$  of SW $\frac{1}{4}$  of Sec. 19 and the W $\frac{1}{2}$  of SW $\frac{1}{4}$  of Sec. 20 were claimed and occupied by George Dosser. The NW $\frac{1}{4}$  of Sec. 29 was claimed and occupied by Jacob Pugh. The E $\frac{1}{2}$  of NE $\frac{1}{4}$  of Sec. 30 was unoccupied, but was claimed by Thomas Seeley. All these tracts of land are in Twp. 30S, Range 25, east of the principal meridian.

The first house built on the original townsite stood on the NW corner of Sec. 29. The building was a box house, 14 ft. by 16 ft. and 8 ft. high and was built by Martin Brown, and occupied by himself and wife as a farm dwelling. Built in the summer, 1868, Mr. Brown lived there about one year, when he sold his claim to Mr. Esam, who afterward sold it to Jacob Pugh.

The second house built was a substantial frame dwelling built by George Dosser, and stood near the present site of the Waskey Commission house and was occupied by him as a farm dwelling.

The first building erected after the town was laid out stood on the corner of 4th and Broadway. Put up by George E. Rickey and occupied by him as a drug store. The building and lot was afterwards bought by John R. Lindburg, who replaced it with a brick building and the corner became known as the Lindburg Drug Store.

The first general store was built by W. G. Seabury in the winter of 1876 and occupied with a small stock of goods in the spring of 1877, with Neal E. Wood as clerk. Mr. Seabury had a store in Girard. When the new building was ready, he and his clerk loaded a few bolts of calico and other dry goods and notions into a spring wagon and drove to Pittsburg and when morning came the store opened for business. The first sale was made to Hortense Ferguson.

The postoffice was established in the fall of 1876, George H. Rickey was postmaster. Succeeded by A. J. Georgia in 1877, who held office until 1884 when he resigned and A. E. Nair was appointed. He held office for four years.

In the summer of 1877, a frame schoolhouse of two rooms was erected. The house was built by Sanders of Girard, Kansas. The first school was taught by A. J. Georgia during the winter of 1877 and summer of 1878. The term was seven months.

The first marriage in the town was that of William Weaver to Mattie Boyne, performed by John W. Jennings, Justice of the Peace. Their daughter, Josephine, was the first child born in the town.

## Pittsburg, Kansas (contd.)

Among those who came with the advent of the railroad were C. S. Clanton, Thomas McNealus, Newt Stewart and Neal Adams.

In the spring of 1878, Robert Lanyon came from Peoria, Ill., and began the erection of a zinc smelter. With him came S. H. Lanyon, who was general overseer of the work. He remained three years with the Robert Lanyon and Co. before he severed his connection and began the erection of zinc works of his own, associating with him were his two sons, Arthur and Alvin, both of whom became presidents of the National Bank of Pittsburg.

The mining history of Crawford County is really the history of Pittsburg, for with the sinking of the first coal shaft in the county, on the townsite of Pittsburg, in the spring of 1877 began the growth of the town, and with the growth of the mining industry in this county, has likewise grown the center of the coal industry.

There is a question as to the first mine to be sunk. Judge Jones claims he helped sink the first mine in what was known as Litchfield, a camp not far from the present site of Pittsburg along Cow Creek. However, others claim that the first mine was sunk on the townsite of Pittsburg by the Coyle brothers, Peter and Matt of Joplin. The mine at Litchfield was sunk by George W. Anderson on July 24, 1877. James Vincent, who was the first foreman, appointed by the Piper and Sawyer Co. on Carbon Creek, insists that this was the first mine to be sunk. All agree that the Coyle shaft was the first steam shaft sunk and the first to amount to anything. Vincent became foreman of the Coyle's mine in August, 1877, moving to Pittsburg to take charge.

A camp was built around the mine by the Coyle brothers and Pittsburg, which had consisted of a crossroad country store now called 4th and Broadway with about a half dozen houses, began to grow.

Meanwhile the Joplin railroad company built a spur north of the mining camp on Carbon Creek which was known as Litchfield Junction. The camp that sprang up here was known as Edwin, in honor of Col. Edwin Brown. A postoffice was established in 1879 and Jeff Bedford was appointed postmaster. With Bedford came Jim Whitfield of Oronogo. They sunk a shaft about 100 yards north of the bridge near the Anderson shaft. Edwin and Pittsburg were now two camps, and one was about as large as the other. In fact Edwin was the more important mining camp, as there were mining operations being conducted all along the creek, while Pittsburg had but one shaft.

Fortunately for Pittsburg, a Wisconsin man changed the course of affairs, and definitely assured the permanency of the city. This man was Robert Lanyon, or "Bobbie", as he was best known. He acquired extensive zinc land holdings from Joplin, and began building a block of zinc smelters. This smelter was the beginning of a great zinc industry which firmly established Pittsburg.

Col. Edwin Brown brought Jack Armel, a railroad contractor, to Carbon Creek with him, and Armel leased the land where Jeff Bedford had put down his shaft, and then he sent to Ohio for a couple of young men, James A. Patmor and brother, Charles. These two brought with them a steam shovel outfit and commenced active operations stripping by steam north of Edwin. Charles Patmor opened the first coal pit at Midway and later became president of the State Bank.

## Pittsburg, Kansas (Contd.)

The Oswego Coal Company commenced extensive operations in 1880, and that winter Bill Weaver took a contract to build 28 company houses in the camp - the first company houses to be built in the county. A company store was also built and T. P. Waskey, the first manager. Several prominent business men were connected with this store: W. C. Seymour, Ed Nevius, John Tracey.

The town company was organized with C. M. Condon president and B. F. Hobart secretary. John Jennings, who had been the agent of the old company, was succeeded by Major J. I. Rochison as manager.

In the fall of 1879, Pittsburg was incorporated as a city of third class. M. McBride, F. Kalwitz, P. A. Shields and D. S. Miller were elected councilmen. Snow was re-elected as mayor in the spring of 1880, 1882 was succeeded by W. C. Willard. His councilmen were: John R. Lindburg, A. J. Georgia, C. S. Jennis, E. E. Eakin and J. P. Braidwood.

The first hotel was built by L. Stephens.

The Methodist Episcopal was the first to build a house of worship in 1880 on 5th and Pine. This was sold to the United Presbyterians in 1891, and the Methodists proceeded to build a larger church on the corner of 8th and Locust street.

The First Baptist Church was organized Aug. 3, 1875 in the schoolhouse erected at 7th and Walnut March 20, 1896.

The United Presbyterian Church was organized April 29, 1890, by Rev. J. H. Gibbson from Buelah. Later he was officially appointed pastor in 1891. The church was organized in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander on Forest Ave. with thirteen people present.

The Presbyterian Church was organized on March 12, 1879, in the Waskey Hall. A frame church was erected on the corner of 7th and Pine in 1883.

The Christian Church was organized in 1881 by a Rev. Burr, in a one-room frame building on 7th and Pine.

The Pittsburg Democrat, founded in 1885, by M. F. Sears, William and Moore and Sons, emerged into the Headlight.

In 1859, Thomas Beecher and wife, Eunice, emigrated from Jackson County, Indiana with their four sons: David, Philo, Floyd and Charles. They settled on Cherokee Neutral Land, locating one mile south and one and a half miles west of the corner of 4th street and Broadway. With the Beecher family came the Hammond Brothers, George and Albert and sister Mary Dosser, wife of Frank Dosser. These were brothers and sister of Eunice, wife of Thomas Beecher. They settled on a farm now located west of Broadway and north of 4th street. It was on George Dosser's claim that Pleasant Ridge was platted and part of the city of Pittsburg. These families were among those driven from their homes in the autumn of 1860 by the soldiers to Drywood Creek, five miles north of Englevalle. The Beecher family felt it best to leave the state and return home until the troubled times were over. They returned to Indiana and remained until the close of the Civil War. The father, Thomas Beecher, died in Indiana. The mother and four sons returned to the homestead the latter part of 1865, to find all their improvements destroyed

by fire. Eunice Beecher, died Feb. 23, 1867, and was buried in the Beecher cemetery one mile south and one-fourth mile west of 4th and Broadway.

Floyd Beecher married Mary Ellen Boston after the family's return to Pittsburg. They were the parents of six children. A daughter, Mrs. L. W. Kelso lived in Pittsburg. A son C. F. Beecher born Aug. 15, 1877, married in 1902 Mabel Kettler. They had five girls: Phyllis, Helen, Loraine, Catherine (5th not named).

C. F. Beecher speaks about the Beecher cemetery: The cemetery, because of vandalism, has disappeared. He was unable to preserve it, even after fencing the small plot of ground. The land has changed hands many times, the winding road that once was a scenic drive for many Pittsburger has become straight. The rustic bridge no longer used. The quaint little cemetery, which one could see from the roadside after having crossed the angled bridge and completed the turn in the road, was one of the first cemeteries around Pittsburg.

Christopher John Volk, born in Wurttemberg, Germany Nov. 12, 1839, came to the US in 1857, age 17 years. His family consisted of his father, Heironymous Christopher, two brothers, one sister and two half-sisters and a step-mother. All three brothers volunteered for the army. One enlisted on the side of the Confederates. Christopher enlisted at the age of 22, as Christopher FOLK (Volk) Aug. 10, 1862, enrolled by Cap. Snodgrass, Co. H 110 Regiment, Ohio, to serve 3 years. Transferred to the Veterans Reserve Corps. by General orders No. 93 A.G.C. 25th day of July 1863, at Washington, D.C. He was in Ford's Theatre the night of Abraham Lincoln's assassination. Mustered out of the army July 26, 1865, Washington, D.C. He moved with his father's family from Dayton, Ohio, to Mercer County, Illinois where he married Mary M. Tichner in 1867. To this union was born eleven children; five were born in Kansas. In 1890 the Volk family left Pittsburg, after burying one of their children in the Hobson Cemetery and took up another homestead in Englevalle, Kans. From here they went to Galesburg and finally made their last move to Erie, Kansas. A son, Ross Volk, lived at Parsons, Kansas. (The Volk family settled on a farm a mile south of what is now the Highland Park Cemetery.)

Albert Sandford Warren and wife, Clarissa Taylor came to Pittsburg in 1866 with their two children George and Nina from Virginia. He died in 1897. The Seeleys were in the contracting business from 1888 to 1932. Dr. M. E. Johnson and Mrs. Lucy Adelia Johnson came from Preston, Mo. to Pittsburg in 1885. Dr. Johnson was a graduate of the Cincinnati Medical college. Daughter Florence Johnson-Fitch born in 1887. Mr. and Mrs. Orlie Samuel Casad and daughter Ethel (now Larkin of Pittsburg) came to Pittsburg in 1882 from Lebanon, Illinois. Sylvester Wright and brother, B. F. Wright and son T. J. Wright came to Pittsburg in 1889. Opened the Wright Brothers Dry Goods Store in 1898. Mrs. T. J. Wright started the Wright's Greenhouse in 1898.

The city of Pittsburg has become the largest city in the county. The Normal School, founded in the early days, has become the Pittsburg State College.
