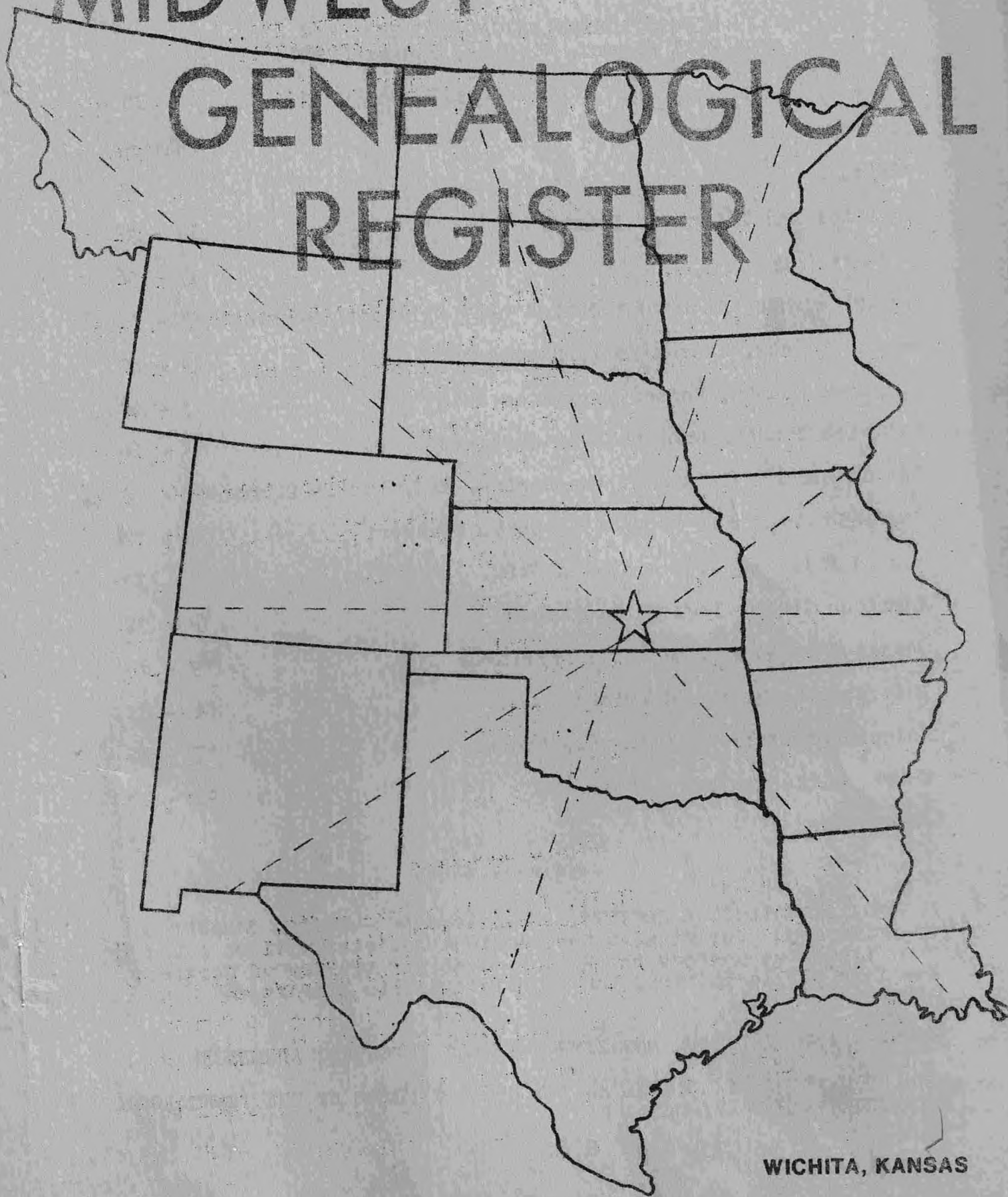

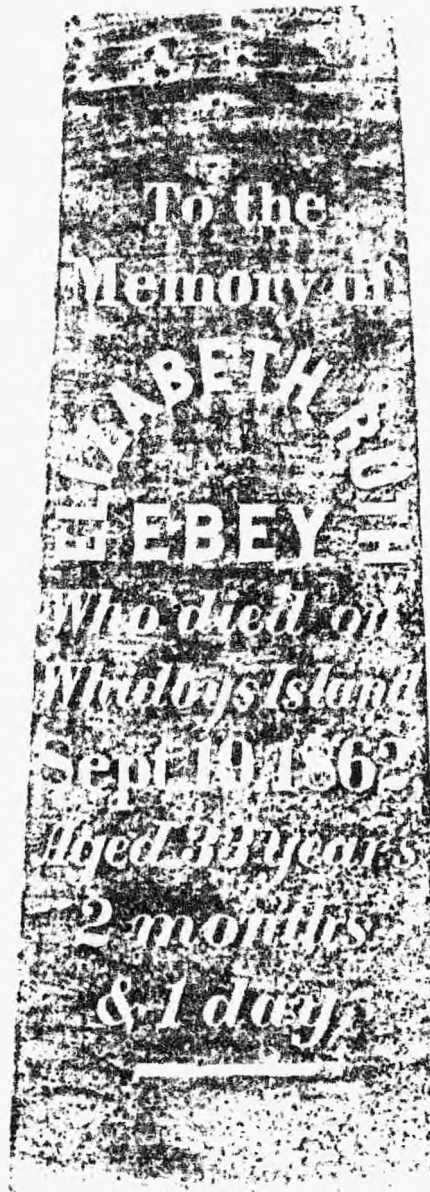

Have you ever wished you could preserve your ancestors' old, faded indistinct gravestones? Also, when you were a child, did you put a piece of paper over a Lincoln head penny and rub it with your lead pencil and watch the image come through? If so, then you have already learned the art of rubbings. The picture shown here is done in the same manner as the penny was done but with a little bit more finesse.

Rubbings cont'd:

To make a rubbing of a gravestone, the following tools are needed: a roll of masking tape, scissors, shelf paper, butcher paper or rice paper, and a heel ball from your local shoe repairman or an art store. You will also need a stiff brush or whisk broom.

To begin, clean the tombstone carefully with your brush and then tape an oversized piece of paper to the stone, making sure it is in place securely. You may need to feel out some of the letters and numbers with your fingers so that you will know just where you will find them. Then, holding the heel ball with the curved side to the paper, start stroking uniformly, from the center to the outside edges, using a firm pressure to get an even color. With just a little practice you will be able to master the technique needed to make a perfect impression. As you work, you will see the stone come to life under your fingertips as dates and names, heretofore hidden and indistinct, suddenly appear on the paper. Continue until you are satisfied that you have the color and impressions as clear as you can get them and then carefully remove the paper. If you roll it and secure it with a rubber band it will keep nicely until you can get it home and frame it. These rubbings can be framed on mat or masonite and make a very interesting display in your home.

The rubbing I have shown in this article was made from a gravestone I found in the Sunnyside Cemetery in Coupeville, Washington on Whidbey Island. This Cemetery is in reality four cemeteries combined into one. The first cemetery was named Valley View, then the next one came to be known as First Addition to Valley View, next came the Island County Addition to Valley View, and finally, Blockhouse Addition to Valley View. A little later all of these came to be known as Sunnyside Cemetery which is located on Sherman Road in Coupeville.

The rubbing shown was of interest to me because of the history behind it. The island was named for Joseph Whidbey who discovered Deception Pass in 1792, off the coast of Washington, which proved that this body of land was really an island and not a part of the mainland as was originally thought. In 1852, Thomas Coup, a sea captain, took up a claim on Penn Cove and it was on this claim that the small town of Coupeville came to be. Col. Isaac Ebey became a land owner in Coupeville and soon became a leader of the early pioneers to this area. The Skagit Indians on the island soon became hostile and Ebey was not a man to stand for an affront from them. At one time he kicked an Indian for being impudent and sassy to his wife when he was absent. In 1857 the Indians, seeking revenge for the death of one of their chiefs, killed in a gun battle, came to the island in search of a Dr. Kellogg, a prominent citizen. However, he was not there, so to settle their grievance, they beheaded Col. Ebey. There is now a monument to him, standing above what is known as Ebey's Landing.

Rubbings cont'd:

Elizabeth Ruth Ebey is thought to be either his wife or his daughter. By reading the dates on her gravestone it seems to be his wife. These are the things that make gravestone rubbings so interesting to me. The history of the area is there in the cemetery with all the colour of the past and of the people who helped make it. This too can be yours as you find a gravestone of your ancestor and preserve it in a permanent form by the simple method of "rubbing".

HOWARD HUGHES' ANCESTORS

HOWARD HUGHES' ANCESTORS BURIED NEAR MILLSTADT -- A reprint from The Illinois State Genealogical Society Quarterly, Volume N6 2-1973 by permission of: Author Robert Buecher and The Editor of the Illinois State Genealogical Society Quarterly, Martha Montgomery.

Recently there have been numerous articles concerning billionaire Howard Hughes and his mysterious whereabouts. Although there is great controversy surrounding him, many of his ancestors lie peacefully buried in a small cemetery near Millstadt, Illinois. The cemetery, located in Section 11 of Millstadt Township, St. Clair County, Illinois, is known as the Union Hill Cemetery. A church, known as the Union Meeting House, built here in 1819 adjoining the cemetery, was torn down many years ago.

Howard Hughes is a great-great grandson of Philemon and Philenor Askins (nee Stayton), who were natives respectively of Virginia and Maryland. The two settled in Kentucky, first at Louisville, where 9 children were born, and then in Grayson County, where three more were born.

In the fall of 1819, Philemon Askins and wife came to the new state of Illinois (it was only one year old in 1819), for a visit with their daughter, Nancy, who had married a Rev. John Bloom and settled in Spring Township of St. Clair County. Liking the country, the Askins family sent back to Kentucky for the rest of their twelve children, who reached here in February of 1820. The Askins family lived part of the time in Section 3, Township 1 South, Range 9 West (Millstadt Township) and part of the time near Venice, in Madison County, where they are listed on page 111 of the 1820 Federal Census of Six Mile Prairie, Madison County, Illinois.

Supposedly, Mrs. Philenor Askins died in 1826, but her husband, Philemon, died 29 (May?) 1831 at age of 63; he lies buried in Union Hill Cemetery, near Millstadt.

One of their daughters, Martha Askins, married Joshua William Hughes on 28 July 1831 at the Bloom home in St. Clair County. Joshua (great grandfather of Howard Hughes) was the first blacksmith in Millstadt Township, as well as the first coal operator. According to the 1881 History of St Clair County, Illinois, page 254, his smithy was opened in 1829, and the following year he began to mine coal from a hillside about a half mile southeast of Millstadt.

In 1832, Joshua W. Hughes and his brother-in-law, Charles T. Askins, enlisted in the Black Hawk Indian War, where Joshua served as captain. Upon his return to St. Clair County, Hughes bought the Rehlg farm north of Millstadt. It was here, sometime in 1842, that a son, Felix Turner Hughes, was born to Joshua and Martha.

According to the 1914 History of Lee County, Iowa, pages 260-263, Felix T. Hughes (grandfather of Howard Hughes) was raised at Millstadt, Illinois, later going to Memphis, Missouri where he studied law under Judge David Wagner, who was to become a supreme

court Judge of Missouri. Felix was admitted to the bar at Memphis in 1869, and shortly thereafter moved to Lancaster, Missouri. In 1880, he came to Keokuk, Iowa, where he became a prominent lawyer, and in 1885 was elected president and general counsel of the Keokuk and Western Railroad. A Republican, in 1894 and again in 1896 he was elected mayor of Keokuk; he later served as judge of the superior court of that city.

He was married to Jean A. Summerlin of Memphis, Missouri in 1868, and the following known children were born to them: Howard Robard Hughes (1869-1924, the father of Howard Hughes); Greta, wife of Herbert Witherspoon of New York City; Rubert Hughes (1872-1956), a famous novelist, also of New York City and Felix Hughes, living in Cleveland, Ohio.

Howard Robard Hughes (1869-1924), married to Alene Gano in 1904, made a fortune in the manufacture of oil drilling equipment in Texas, and was the father of Howard Robard Hughes, who was born in Houston, Texas, December 24, 1905.

Besides Philemon Askins, Union Hill Cemetery contains the following members of the Askins family: Charles T., born 27 May 1810, died 11 March 1885; George P., born 1864, died 1936; Jane M., born 24 November 1832; John W. R., born 12 November 1858, died 2 October 1880; Malinda (wife of Charles), born 24 November 1832, died 9 May 1904.

In addition to the ancestors of Howard Hughes, Union Hill Cemetery contains many other members of pioneer St. Clair County families, namely; the Bailey, Becker, Billen, Briesacher, Frazier, Glass, Gooding, (the latter two were founders of Millstadt), Goodner, Gregg, Hatfield, Lumbattis, Nimerick, Primm, Roach (founder of Roachtown), Rowan, Sample, Siebert, Snyder, and Valerius families.

Among the earliest burials were John Ross, October 1, 1823; Thomas Jarrard, October 16, 1823; Harrison Lacey, August 24, 1826; Mary Lacey, August 17, 1826 (both children of John and Lydia Lacey); and Charlotte M. Primm, daughter of Levi and Susan Primm, July 13, 1828.

A complete inventory and index of this cemetery has been deposited with the Illinois State Historical Library at Springfield, Illinois.

Abstracts from

"HISTORY OF HARRISON COUNTY, IOWA 1888"

There were many mounds in different parts of the county, and much speculation as to whether they were the handiwork of nature or whether they were built by an early race of people either as homes or burial places. The two largest groups of these were, first the farm formerly owned by WM MCDONALD near the old town of Calhoun. Here there were six mounds, each ninety feet in diameter and fifteen feet high, all in a direct line running north and south and from fifteen to twenty rods apart. The second group was on the farm of A. W. LOCKLIN, north of those just mentioned. In this row there were twelve of the same size and appearance, in a row north and south and having the same space between. Near this place there were found stone hatchets and sledges, pieces of pottery of a make unknown at that time and other curious tools and instruments.

At a place between the farms of H. H. LOCKLIN and his father, A. W. Locklin, in May of 1888 at the bottom of a washout and twenty-five feet from the surface of the earth, was found a well-preserved cedar tree, twenty inches in diameter, over which was growing a large white oak tree, at least four feet in diameter and not less than a thousand years old. Near the same cedar were old buffalo skulls fifteen feet or more below the surface of the earth. A son of H. H. Locklin had in his possession a four-foot jawbone of some animal found in this same place. In 1886, a neighbor of Mr. Locklin, P. R. SHUPE, while plowing the field of Mr. Locklin near where the mounds were located, struck a stone and dug down eighteen inches, finding a furnace of sorts constructed of brick. The neighborhood could not understand how this came to be there, since Mr. Locklin had lived on the farm for thirty-five years, knew nothing of this, and was the first settler thereon. Also no such bricks were ever made in the county, except perhaps in the year preceding the discovery.

An old Indian trail passed within twenty feet of both of these groups of mounds, on the east side of them, and in 1848 the path had been worn into the soil six to ten inches. The most favored opinion as to what the mounds were was that they were ruins of sod-houses such as were built by the Omaha Indians.

The most noted mounds were those on the farm of JESSE J. PECK, near the line of Harrison county on the north, but in Monona County. There were three mounds, each two hundred feet in diameter and thirty feet high, located about two hundred yards from the bluffs on the west side of the Soldier river. On the farm of D. W. KENNEDY, section 3, township 79, range 42, on Six Mile creek, in Jefferson township, there was the very largest mound in the county.

Many implements had been found: a stone sledge and stone hatchet on the farm of JAMES HENDERSON, a short distance from Reeders' Mills, which were part of a collection belonging to Dr. J. L. Witt, of Logan; three other sledges, one each found by LEHI ELLISON of Cass township, MR. SHNDER, ex-County Surveyor, and the other by BENJ. PURCELL, JR. of Boyer township; a stone hatchet found by HENRY YOUNG, residing one mile north of Logan; a hatchet found by PROF. J. D. HORNBY; something which was probably a mortar, found on the farm of PIERSON VORE, in Harris Grove, in 1852.

In 1887, on a place which had been occupied by HENRY REEL since 1852, workmen found skeletons of six persons two feet below the surface of the ground. The skulls unmistakably showed that the Indian features were very pronounced and at the same place was found a stone knife.

There was doubt as to which tribe of Indians occupied these lands up to the time of the first settlement in 1847. This county was probably within the territory of the Pottawattamies, because in June of 1846, the Pottawattamies relinquished all of their rights to their reservation in southwestern Iowa and went west of the Missouri River. The Sioux occupied the Northwestern part of the state until 1853, and the Omahas on the west side of the Missouri River with the present city of Omaha as their central eastern border up to 1854.

Since 1849 small bands of Omahas and Pottawattamies had hunted and fished in this county at frequent intervals. From them it was learned that some time during the 1840's the Omahas and Pottawattamies banded together in a severe battle against the Sioux near Smith Lake within two miles of the village of Little Sioux. The legend was that the Pottawattamies had claimed the Little Sioux river was the boundary between them and the Sioux and that the Sioux had trespassed on their hunting grounds, when they had caught a party of Pottawattamie braves unexpectedly on the banks of the Soldier river and killed them. (This had happened at a location close to the place where FREELY MYERS lived in 1888 near Calhoun.) So the two tribes had banded together against the Sioux, who were badly beaten and who gave up all claim to the territory on the right bank of the Little Sioux river. Although this was a legend, nevertheless, each year the winds and rains uncovered numerous skeletons of Indians all along the bluffs on the left bank of the Smith Lake.

The Indian graves that were found in the county were the former burial place of both Pottawattamie and Omaha. It was known that the Omahas buried their dead in huge mounds above the earth, so the larger mounds found in the county were most likely graves. It was also known that the Pottawattamies wrapped their dead well in buffalo robes and blankets and placed them in the crotch of a high tree or erected a scaffold on which the body was lain. This practice was affirmed by DANIEL BROWN, AMOS CHASE

and ROBERT NEELY (all of whom had passed away in the decade or two prior to 1888), who according to their own observation knew this type of burial was practiced by the Pottawattamies in 1849 and 1850. In the winter of 1851, near the school house where JAS. B. McCURLEY taught school in Harris Grove, the skeleton of a child was found in a hollow log in the fork of a large tree.

There was a tradition among the Omahas that at one time the Missouri river had no channel and the Indians could pass in the summer season from the bluffs of the Iowa side to the bluffs of the Nebraska side on horseback. This must have been before 1804 for at that date Lewis and Clark ascended the Missouri to its headwaters and landed at a point a few miles below Sioux City, and buried at that time one of their party, SERGEANT FLOYD, in a bluff which in 1888 was still called Sergeant's Bluffs.

There had been a superstition also about Smith's Lake. The bands of Winnebagoes who fished there believed that this lake was the place of incarceration of the Evil Spirit. Many times they had imagined that they had seen this monster and they fled the country telling the resident whites what they had seen. Two young men of the village went to the lake to fish and while there saw some huge fish or animal playing in the water. They immediately left and reported what they had seen. Then a young doctor and two friends from Mondamin went to the lake to investigate. Two of them went out in a boat leaving the other one on the bank. The September 1, 1887 issue of The Logan Observer contained an article by Dr. McFARLANE of Mondamin describing how he waited on the bank and how he saw what appeared to be half-werpent and half-lizard. However, on 7 April 1888, CHARLES SMITH found the carcass of a very large fish floating near the bank of this lake. It was six feet and ten inches long and would have weighed two hundred pounds. This was felt to have been the fish which had created so much excitement in the neighborhood.

The Indian trails were well-marked in 1849 and up to 1855, and at a later date could still be easily distinguished. One of these started at the farm of JOE HILLS on the bluffs of the Missouri bottoms on the north line of Pottawattamie county. It followed up Harris Grove creek, crossing the creek and on to Elk Grove, then to Six-mile Grove, crossing Six-mile creek a little west of the farm of JASON HUNT (the same on which Mr. Hunt had lived for thirty-three years) then to Braden's Grove, then to Twelve-mile Grove, crossing the farms of MATTHEW HALL and old MR. MEFFORD, then crossing Picayune creek, near SAMUEL DE COU'S farm. At this point the trail divided into three, one going to Beetree Grove, one to Coon Grove and one to Galland's Grove in Shelby county. Another trail starting at Joe Hills' crossed the Boyer river at a point where the town of Missouri Valley was located (it had formerly been known as McIntosh's Point) and went to Weimer's Grove (formerly known as Dunham's Grove) and from there toward Boyer lake.

Another old trail came in to the bluffs just west of the homestead of HENRY GARNER in Raglan township, followed along the bottoms until it reached the old farm near old Calhoun, which had been originally squatted upon and entered by IRA PERJUE, then up the bluffs and on until the north line of the county was passed. Another trail branched from the main trail, which came from the Missouri river, at the point where ALEX. JOHNSON formerly lived, near the residence of Henry Garner, and going up the bluffs at that place, came to Raglan Grove. Then through this grove, crossing Steer creek nearly at the home of S. E. STREETER, then to the Coffman Grove and on to the north line of the county.

In many different parts of the county, farmers had found skeletons of Indians while plowing in their fields. GEORGE HARDY found a skeleton along Allen creek near Magnolia in 1854. In 1886 PORTER STREETER of Raglan plowed up one in his grain field. There were no traces of Indian villages in the county, nor had there been for thirty years. The Pottawattamies had not been in the county very much, as they had been constantly at war with the Sioux over the boundary, and this part of the territory was so near to the north line of the Pottawattamies, they would scarcely have dared spend much of their time so near the Sioux.

All residents of the county from the time of the first white settlers until the latter part of 1852 were squatters. There was controversy as to who was the first squatter. Some said it was DANIEL BROWN who lived at Calhoun for more than twenty-five years and died there in 1873. Others said it was URIAH HAWKINS, who lived in Cass township from 7 July 1847, until he died sometime before 1878. Daniel Brown was the first man to select a claim, which was June 1847, but shortly after this, he returned to Florence, Nebraska, and stayed there until the following spring, and then moved his family to the claim selected. Settlement was perfected on 7 April 1848. Uriah Hawkins was accompanied by his family and permanently "squatted" on his land in Cass township on 7 July 1847, upon which he lived for nearly thirty years and upon which he died. No one could obtain title to his lands before the latter part of 1852, as no surveys of these lands had been done by the government prior to that time. The county was townshipized by government surveyors during the year 1851 and the sectionizing was not complete until November, 1852. Under these conditions the terms "squatter" and "early settler" were synonymous, since there were fifty or more families living in the county before the government gave opportunity for title to the lands.

From 1847 until the forming of the first bank in the county in 1866, there was a necessity for the citizens to help their neighbors and guard the rights of their neighbor with as much valor as they did their own. Woe be unto the man who would attempt to jump another's claim. When lands were to be entered at the government land office at Council Bluffs (then Kanesville and afterwards Bluff City), a meeting would be called and a group

of men selected to accompany the settler to the land office and see that the land was entered in his name.

These men were called Regulators. There was a case of a claim jumper in 1855, who was arrested by a group of earnest, angry men and brought to the Bates House in Magnolia for trial by a jury of settlers. JUDGE LYNCH was about to open his court when some of the more humane regulators called the man to one side, had him sign over his rights to the claim in writing to the proper owner, and opened a back window for his escape. (Direct quote from page 82 and 83: "If any of the readers of these hastily written lines ever knew one JAMES W. BATES, who in the latter part of the fifties, and up to 1862, built, owned and ran the Bates House in Magnolia, they only can form any adequate idea of the cords of oaths cut by Mr. Bates, when he learned that the prisoner had escaped. Bates was an awkward professional swearer, and up to the time of the close of the rebellion could distance any man in the county in the race of words profanely directed. But in justice to Mr. Bates, I must say, that no warmerhearted man ever lived on the "slope"; no person ever left his door hungry, and none possessed a heart so easily touched by the misfortunes of others; impulsive, honest, and withat, generous to a fault.") The men who made up the Regulators were, as nearly as the memory of the writer could recall: JAMES W. BATES, GEORGE BLACKMAN, WM. T. FALLON, N. G. WYATT, THOS. B. NEELY, JAMES HARDY, LUCIUS MERCHANT, JOEL PATCH, PETER BARNETT, SOLOMON BARNETT, H.H. LOCKLIN, A. W. LOCKLIN, EZRA VINCENT, HENRY GEORGE, HORATIO CAYWOOD and two sons GEORGE and FRANK, TOM DURMAN, ROBERT HALL, JACOB HUFFMAN, CHESTER STALEY, CAPT. CHESTER HAMILTON, JACOB MINTURN, JOSIAH CROM, BENJ. LAPORTE, DANIEL BROWN, AMOS CHASE, IRA PERJUE, --- BURDNO, J. W. CHATBURN, STEPHEN MAHONEY, BENJ. DENICE, JOHN ENNIS, O. M. ALLEN, GAY CLEVELAND, ELEAZER DAVIS and others.
