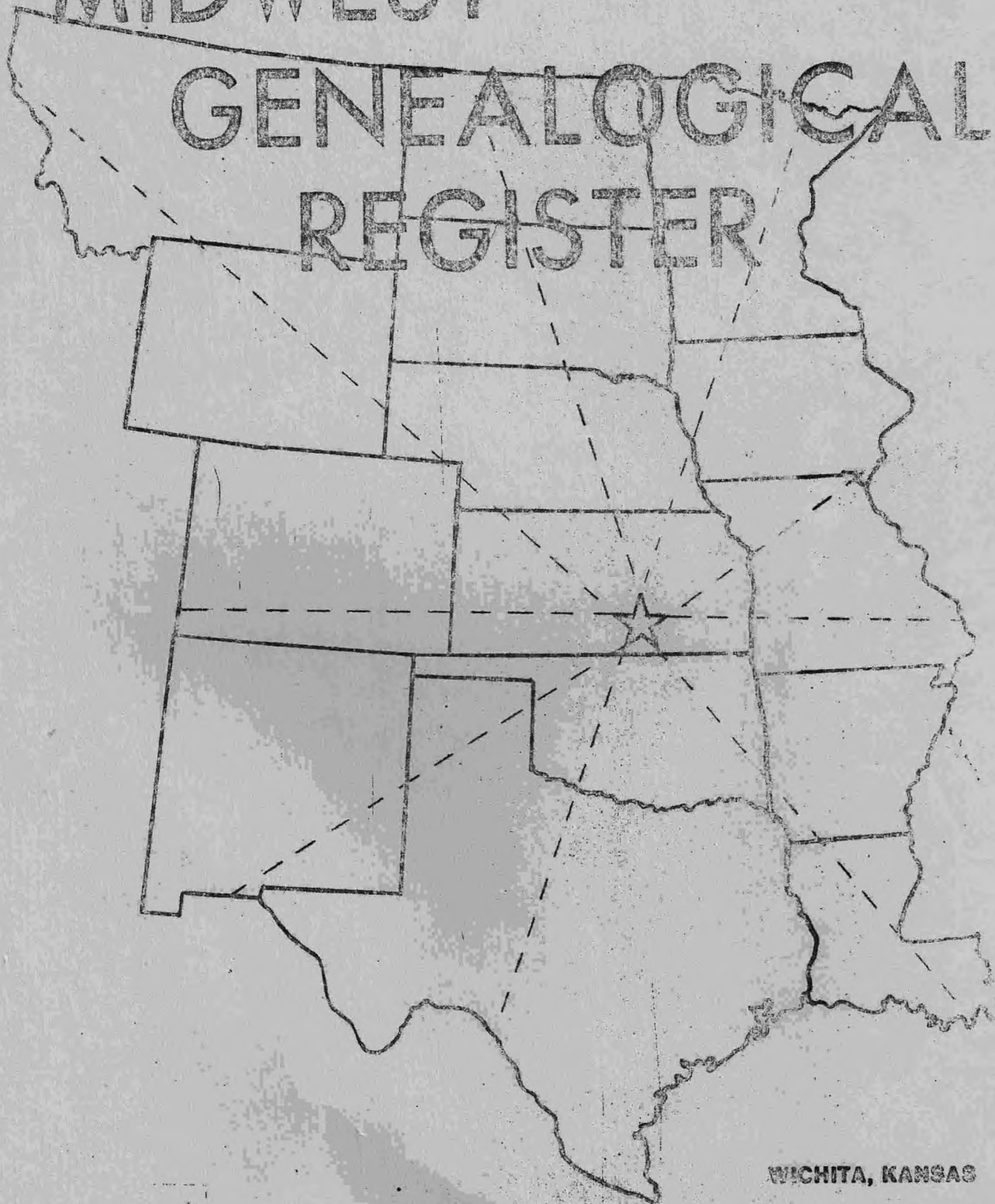

"TO LIVE IN HEARTS WE LEAVE BEHIND, IS NOT TO DIE."

On October 23, 1938, a new bell was dedicated by Reverend I. G. Koonce, with appropriate ceremony. The bell was the gift of brother John M. Anchors, the oldest member of the church. The Big Bend Church had never previously had a bell.

- - - - -

On May 19th, 1962--the two oldest members of the Big Bend Methodist Church, are Charles Murray, born April 1st, 1884 and Miss Carrie Downing, born May 21st, 1884. The membership has held its own down through the years and still has about forty members.

Many of the old pioneers who founded and attended Big Bend Church, are buried in its Cemetery. Mrs Elisha Lawrence being the first to be buried there and John Middleton's son William being the second. Elisha Lawrence was born in 1814, and died in 1886. He is also buried in Big Bend Cemetery.

Through the Estate of John Sloan, Elisha Lawrence obtained the land he owned in Venango County, Pa., from P.G. Hollister, who was the Administrator of the Sloan Estate.

This transaction is recorded in Franklin, Venango Co., Pa., in Deed Book 1 pages 110, 111 & 112 on the 7th day of December 1841. The Sloan property was deeded to Elisha and Mary Lawrence, his wife and was witnessed by J. Baney, a Justice of the Peace. Same was recorded Nov 15, 1183 (?)

Elisha Lawrence and wife Mary Lawrence, parties of the first part and A.S. Nicely, J.W. Ogden, Thomas Mahood and Jno.E. Lawrence, Trustees, ters S. Successors in office, parties of the second part. For the sum of One-Hundred and Fifty Dollars all that certain lot or piece of ground, situated in Scrubgrass Twn., Venango County, Pa., and bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a corner on public road & land of Elisha Lawrence, thence by land of said Elisha Lawrence, thence by land of said Elisha Lawrence, N. 37 $\frac{1}{2}$ due west 17 and four-tenths perches to corner on other public road. South 85 feet and three-fourths D.E. 25 perches-~~24~~ rods to a corner on public road, first mentioned. Thence along Public Rd., So. 51 degrees west 19 perches to a corner on public road and place of beginning, containing 1 acre and 5 perches the same more or less, being a part of a larger tract of land which was conveyed by P.G. Hollister to Elisha and Mary Lawrence from the Sloan Estate.

On October 20th, 1904, after Samuel and Lillie Lawrence came into possession of the Elisha Lawrence property, they in turn deeded one acre more or less

adjoining the above property to the M.E. Church, of Scrubgrass Twn., Venango, Co., Pa. also, for the sum of One-Hundred Dollars, this being the property where the church in question and Cemetery are located. These records are recorded in Book 285, Pg. 154. Same Recorded March 22, 1906

The Deed was signed and witnessed, Oct. 20th, 1904, by Samuel and Lillie Lawrence, his wife. Witnessed by V. P. Bunce, J.P.

All the above information, plus a complete description of above matter, may be had by anyone interested in checking the records, in Venango Co., Scrubgrass Twn., Pa.

The descendants of these old families who founded this Church and the new Members and friends who now live in the neighborhood of the BIG BEND METHODIST CHURCH, should be proud of the way they have preserved and protected this grand, old building, which will still be good in the generations to follow. Within the past two or three years they have made the following improvements:

We wish to thank Mrs. W.S. Shaw, who is a direct descendent of the late Elisha Lawrence, for the following information:

John Middleton moved to Scrubgrass Township, Venango Co., Pa from Forest County, Pa., May 30th, 1835. He had been connected with the Methodist Society in that County, and was justly entitled to the honor of having introduced Methodism to Scrubgrass Township.

At his personal solicitation the Reverend J. H. Jackson of Butler, Pa., was invited to visit Big Bend neighborhood at intervals of every four weeks. Between times, Mr. Middleton walked to Butler to attend services. Mr. Jackson preached in John Middleton's home during those first days and Mr. Middleton made homemade benches and these were carried into the yard each time Reverend Jackson came to preach.

A class was formed in 1835, with two members, Elisha Lawrence and John Middleton. Elisha Lawrence gave one-half acre of ground as a burial ground and church side and the first Church of Big Bend became a reality, when a frame structure 24x36 feet was built in 1836. At this time there were four members, Mrs. Elisha Lawrence and Mrs. John Middleton having joined their husbands in their earnest endeavor to establish the first Methodist Church in Scrubgrass Township.

The Elisha Lawrence family were blessed with five of their descendants becoming Ministers. Namely: Rev Osmus Marbarger, Rev. George Nglesby, Rev. Elton McPheters, who were grandsons, and one great grandson, Rev. Raymond Shoup.

There were two ministers in the John Middleton family: Rev. Lee Phipps and Rev. Homer Phipps.

John and Sarah E. Lusher, are buried in Rockland, Pa. Sarah died April 24, 1918, Parkers Landing, at the age of 75.

The Parker Story will contain more information in regards to Reverend John Lusher and his activities in this area. He died October 9, 1934 at Parkers Landing, Pa., shortly after his retirement.

Your District Supt. Arthur B.R. Colley, was licensed to preach in 1923. He has served Lanes Mills, Sonora, Ohio, New Richmond, Guys Mills, Allegheny College, Chandler, Chicago, Ill., Hydetown, North East, Titusville, Sharon, Warren and for the past six years he has served the Grove City District as District Supt. He is the 2nd man to serve the Grove City District a full term. His term expires this year.

A LETTER FROM EZEKIEL DYE----A CIVIL WAR SOLDIER

Dear friend:

Your long looked for and interesting letter was received yesterday and perused with pleasure I assure you I was glad to hear from you I had almost com to the conclusion that you was never going to write but when I read your letter I was very agreeable disapointed to find that I was still remembered by my friend and schoolmate I hardly know how to answer your kind letter for there is nothing to write about Times have not changed a great deal with us since last summer we ar now stationed at Bayou Bouif seven miles East of Brashear City guarding the Neworleans and great Western railroad we ar now in winter quarters having a first rate time our quarters ar situated on the East side of the Bayou and a dull looking place it is about half mile to the East stands a heavy forest of cypriss covered with a kind of moss that to look at from a distance has the appearance of the timber up north when it is covered with sleet and frost it is very beautiful to look over these forests when the sun is just rising or its last rays disapearing in the far west I sit and watch most every evening and think to myself how beautiful ar the works of Nature even in this lonesom and dreary place to the north of our camp runs the great western and Neworleans road and rite opposite the depot and the long bridge that spans the Bayou, on which may be seen a sentinel with a loaded musket walking leisurly from one end to the other to prevent any one from trying to burn(?) it. to the south is a large stone(?) (store)? house and near by is to be seen a nice flower gardin that is now blooming vary beautiful and a little way to the right is a large Orchard that a few weeks ago was nearly braking down under its load of golden fruit, of which the soldiers ar so fond this a vary lonesome place yet there is a great many things to be seen that makes it interesting. I thought I would take a ride in company with three or four of my mess mates the other day to see what there was to be seen. We made our way down the bayou in a small boat and about ten miles below here we found people living that told us they had never been twenty miles from home. they was actuly the most ignorant set of People that I have ever come acrost. I use to think that Arkansas & Missouri would produce the most ignorant set of people in the United States but here I found these I come to the conclusion that Louisiana could surpass them all. on our way back we thought we would run up a little bayou and se if we could find anything new there we found Alligators by the hundreds and the snakes wer so numerous that I would have to use up all of the multiplication table if I should undertake to numerate them we returned to camp about 8 oclock that night almost tired to death for we had rowed about twenty miles that day. I was at a catholic meeting last Sunday and of all performances that I have ever seen that beat all I could not understand a word that was said for the old Priest cant speak a word of English he does all his talking in French. I have some notion of trying to learn the language myself. there is a man living here that says he will give me lessons and wont charge me a cent The Negroes ar most scared to death about here today there is an officer around conscripting them when they heard he was coming they got sick vary suddenly some of them got so lame they could hardly walk.

DYEletter cont'd:

it was fun to hear the excuses they had to offer I was at a French dance a few night ago there were about twenty young ladies there there was about a dozen of us soldiers that ?????????????? though I did not take part in the dance, they said they was going to have another on Christmas I have an invitation to attend but I dont think I shall go we still have a few mosquitoes to trouble us but not quite so many as there was last summer. the weather is very cool and pleasant we havent had but two or three disagreeable days this winter I must tell you what some of the boys had for dinner they went out and killed a couple of large owls, and cooked them they had a great deal of fun over them but they said they are as good as any chicken they ever tasted I dont think I could relish that kind of meat very well if I was vary hungry Probably I would eat them but that went be as long as we get as plenty as we do now it must be vary lonesom about there now since so many have moved away. if they keep on leaving there will be but fewe of my acquaintances left by the time I get back I received a letter from Annie Morris yesterday she says she likes her new home vary well and they wer all well Satisfied, we have plenty of fresh oysters here now. better then those you got at that oyster supper at Mr. Zanes I was sorry to hear your health has been so poor for good health is one of heavens choisest blessings there is no news to write so I wil close for this time hoping to hear from you soon.

Molly's Life on the Prairie (1876)

Life on the claim, southwest of Belle Plaine, Kansas, must have been very difficult for Molly Willey. Years after her death, my Grandfather Willey told me the story about Molly and the hungry Indian.

Molly had made a batch of lye soap in the iron kettle in their clearing. She had cut the solidified, yellow-white mass into cakes and placed them on the window sill of the open window of their cabin. She and the children went back into the house and she busied herself with the kitchen work. Glancing out toward the woods near the river bank, Molly was horrified to see an Indian move out from the trees and walk rapidly toward the house. She knew that Indians occasionally camped down by the river and that they never menaced the whites unless provoked. But she had seen very few of them. This brave looked to Molly both terrible and dangerous. She thought of her three helpless children and of herself nearly as helpless. Her knees shook as she made her way to the window which the Indian was now approaching. He spoke rapidly in his own language. Then, seeing that the white woman did not understand, he pointed a very long, thin finger at the soap, then at his mouth. He made signs of eating. Wild thoughts went through Molly's mind. "The lye! What if the taste would make him mad and he would kill her and the children? But if she refused him the cakes what would he do?" But the decision was made for her. Even before he could have seen her trembling nod, the man's hand went out and he grasped a chunk of the soap. As he wheeled and began to stride towards the woods, he took an enormous bite. Not once did he look back. Soon he disappeared from view.

My Grandfather Willey has been dead for over forty years now, but I can still see his old chin quiver and his eyes grow moist as he said, "And you know Molly acted just like a woman. After the Indian left, she just sat down and cried. - - No, she never saw anything more of that Indian."

MY LINEAL SERVICE RECORDS 1776-1976

My father, Ray Milton Quinn, a Veteran of World War I, recently became a member of Sons of the American Revolution through the service record of Josiah Dodd, his great-great grandfather. Josiah was a member of The First Rifle Company of Amherst County Virginia, formed February 26, 1776. Josiah's father-in-law, Richard Luttrell, was also in the Revolutionary War, as was Josiah Dodd II's father-in-law, James Finney, of South Carolina. Michael Finney, father of James, was also a Lieutenant from Augusta County Virginia, in the Revolution. Josiah Dodd II, was in the War of 1812. Ray Quinn's father, James Quinn, was a captain in the Missouri Cavalry during the Civil War, and his son, Wayne Vaughn Quinn, was a World War II veteran in the navy. A grandson, Ray Quinn Maxwell, is now a navy pilot in Search and Rescue at The International Airport in Los Angeles.

My mother, Edith Katherine Vaughn Quinn, and my father celebrated their golden wedding anniversary December 24, 1971. Her father, William N. Vaughn made the run into the Cherokee Outlet, September 16, 1893, securing a claim near Three Sands, Oklahoma. His father, Francis Marion Vaughn, a captain from Kentucky, Civil War, secured a claim in the land rush into Oklahoma in 1889 near Stillwater, Oklahoma. My mother's maternal grandfather, John Michael Wahlenmaier served from Kansas, 1863-1866, and participated in the Powder River Expedition to Wyoming. Her great-great-grandfather, John Lacy, was a Revolutionary War soldier from Virginia and is buried in the Lacy/Carson Cemetery near Hazel Green, KY.

HER FATHER FOUGHT IN 1776

A Real Daughter of The American Revolution is Mrs. T.J.E. Hoyt.

Mrs. Terressa Jane Emmons Hoyt, 84 years old, of Emporia is perhaps the only real daughter of the American Revolution in Kansas. Mrs. Hoyt's father, Jonathan Emmons, served in the Continental Army in the struggle for independence. He enlisted from Connecticut, but later entered a Massachusetts regiment. He also served in the navy part of the time, and for three months while on board ship was out of sight of land. The records in possession of Mrs. Hoyt give an account of her father's experiences. He served much of the time under General Lafayette.

Mrs. Hoyt is a member of the Edward Hand chapter of the D. A. R. in Ottawa, and she also is a member of the National society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. She lived in Osage County until two years ago, when she applied to the United States government for a pension. The government was unable to grant the request except by a special act of Congress, and this would have required a vast amount of work in signing papers and making affidavits.

The Edward Hand chapter, D. A. R., in Ottawa made her an honorary member, and referred the question of obtaining a pension. It also presented to Mrs. Hoyt a souvenir spoon on which was engraved the wheel and distaff, the emblem of the society, the American flag and Mrs. Hoyt's initials.

Jonathan Emmons, Mrs. Hoyt's father, was born in Connecticut in 1760. After the close of the Revolutionary War he took his family "West" to Onondago County, New York, where they settled in Lafayette, the town named for the gallant French general under whom Mr. Emmons had served.

HER FATHER FOUGHT IN 1776 Contd

He was killed in an accident in 1835, when Mrs. Hoyt was 11 years old. Mr. Emmons was married twice and there were nine children in each family. Mrs. Hoyt was the youngest of the children.

Mr. Emmons owned large orchards and made hundreds of barrels of cider every year. Part of the work of the children (Mrs. Hoyt says all the children worked in those days) was to pick apples. Mrs. Hoyt attributes her good health to the daily exercise in her father's orchards.

Mrs. Hoyt was married at Lafayette, N. Y. to Daniel B. Nichols in 1848. They came west immediately after their marriage, making their honeymoon trip by way of the Erie Canal and the Great Lakes. They settled near Aurora, IL where two children were born. Later they moved to Aurora where in a few months Mr. Nichols died. Her second marriage was to Dr. Henry K. Hoyt who has been dead many years. Mrs. Hoyt went to Osage County Kansas in 1877, and since has lived with her daughter, Mrs. W. A. Jones. They moved to Emporia about one year ago. Mrs. Jones owns a boarding house on Commercial Street. All of Mrs. Hoyt's seventeen brothers and sisters are dead. Two uncles, William Avery and James Avery, fought in the French and Indian War, and two other uncles fought in the War of 1812.

Mrs. Hoyt remembers many circumstances that occurred in President Jackson's administration. She said that she and other children shouted for "Old Hickory" when he was elected. Mrs. Hoyt tells of how her father drove in a gig from New York to Pennsylvania to obtain affidavits from Revolutionary war comrades by which to secure a pension from the government. Mrs. Hoyt traces her ancestry back to Thomas Emmons who came from England to the colonies in 1637.

This is a copy of a clipping from the Emporia, Kansas Gazette of June, 1910. My Grandmother Hoyt's birthdate was June 26.

WAITES IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

John Waites, born April 14, 1730, Christ Church Parish of Middlesex County, Virginia, was the son of Richard Waite and Sarah Blake and the grandson of Richard Wayte, immigrant.

He entered the army during the French and Indian War, and received a Fairfax patent of 225 acres on Lick Run of the Cacapon River in Hampshire County, Virginia for his service.

Here he married Anne Deloss, daughter of Lewis Deluis and here their children were born and reared.

During the Revolutionary War he was a coronet in the First Continental Line, retiring in 1782 from 1st Light Dragoons under Colonel Theoderick Blanc, and at that time went to German twp. Fayette County, Pennsylvania

where his sons had gone before him.-

Have found no record of John Waites death, last seen on the census of Fayette County in 1790. He received patent for 400 acres on Short Creek in Ohio County, Virginia for service in the Revolutionary War.

All five of his sons served in the Pennsylvania Militia during the Revolution. Richard, John Jr., Reuben, James and Charles. John, Jr. died in Penn., - the others going on to Kentucky. Richard, James and Charles going on to Ohio when the territory opened there.

James, my ancestor, was with the army at Blue Licks and at Sandusky. He died in Brown County, Ohio at the age of 95. He and his wife are buried at Taylor's Chapel, northeast of Williamsburg on Greenbush road.

JOHN RUSSELL LITCHFIELD

John Russell Litchfield, born March 7, 1899 at Flanagan, Illinois, and as a boy moved to Blackwell, Oklahoma with his family where he attended school. He joined the Marines and as a Navy pharmacist's mate serving with the 6th Regiment, USMC, he displayed exceptional bravery in treating the wounded while under shellfire. He was killed September 15, 1918 near Thiaccourt, France, attempting to remove a casualty from a frontline trench. He was buried in the Arlington cemetery with high honors.

For his many services to his country the U. S. Government has awarded his family, through his mother, the highest award for bravery, the Distinguished Service Cross and saw fit to name the battleship, Destroyer Litchfield in his honor.

U.S.S. Litchfield (DD-336) was commissioned May 12, 1920. In 1924-25, this gunboat won the highest honors over the entire fleet for excellence in radio and signalling competition and was awarded the President Coolidge Cup.

Blackwell, Oklahoma's American Legion Post, was number seven in the state, chartered July 31, 1919, named in honor of Russell Litchfield, a western Kay County boy who was killed in line of duty for his country.

STEPHEN A. LEWIS

STEPHEN A. LEWIS was born 5 April 1838 at Edinburg, Beaver County, Pennsylvania. His father was John Lewis, who was born in Maryland in 1780, and his grandfather was John Lewis, a Revolutionary War Courier, born in Cecil County, Maryland, in 1757. The message announcing the arrival of the French Fleet off Yorktown was delivered to General George Washington by John Lewis, according to his pension record. The mother of Stephen A. Lewis was Anna Lydia Young, daughter of Philip Young, a Revolutionary War soldier born in New Jersey in 1762, and served as a soldier from Hunterdon Co. in that state, with his brother, James Young. Both John Lewis and Philip Young died in Beaver County, Pennsylvania.

The wife of Stephen A. Lewis, Mary Ann Shrum, was born in Warren, Trumbull Co, Ohio 7 April 1842. Her father was Joseph Shrum, born 21 June 1804, in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania, the son of George Shrum and Catherine Marchand. His grandfather was Captain David Marchand, a Huguenot Physician, who served in the American Revolution from Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. The mother of Mary Ann Shrum was Mary Eckels, born in Pennsylvania 2 Oct 1803, a daughter of Samuel Eckels and Jane Esther Clendenin. Her grandfather was Nathaniel Eckels, born 2 Oct 1744, in Northern Ireland, a Revolutionary War Soldier of Cumberland County Pennsylvania.

Stephen A. Lewis and Mary Ann Shrum were married 12 March 1862 at Glasgow, Beaver Co., Pennsylvania, and they had ten children: Myron, Olive Jane, Rhoda H., William Hill, Ida Mae, Joseph Frank, Almira P, Charles F., Clark Arthur and Arthur J. Stephen and Mary Ann Lewis moved from Columbiana Co, Ohio, to Russell Co, Ks. in 1878. For a short time the family lived in Holyrood, Ellsworth Co., Kansas, before moving to Alva, Oklahoma, a few days after the Run opening the Cherokee Strip. Mary Ann Lewis died in Alva on 27 Sept 1908, and Stephen A. Lewis died there on 20 Feb. 1923. Stephen A. Lewis served in the Civil War as a Private in Company "E", 19th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, and as a Sergeant in Company "C", 104th Ohio Volunteer Infantry. He was severely wounded in the jaw at the Battle of Franklin in Tenn., and the wound bothered him the rest of his life. Stephen A. Lewis was a Canal Boat Captain in Pennsylvania and Ohio as a young man, and in later years his occupation was that of a Stone Mason. Some of his stonework still stands in the town of Bunker Hill, Russell County, Kansas, and also near Guthrie, Ok.

HENRY EMERSON MOORE

HENRY EMERSON MOORE was born 10 Nov. 1846, in Dimock Township, Susquehanna Co., Pennsylvania. His father was Edward E. Moore, born 1820, Milltown, County Caven, Ireland, and immigrated to the United States in about 1836. In 1846 Edward E. Moore married Mary Gardner, born in Ireland ca 1813, daughter of John Gardner and Nancy _____. Mary Gardner Moore died in Susquehanna Co., Penn., 2 Sept. 1851. Before 1880 Henry Emerson Moore came to Ellsworth

County, Kansas, and filed on a claim near Black Wolf. On 17 July 1882 he married Mary Catherine Wells, born in Ohio in 1865. Two children were born of this marriage. Mary Catherine Wells Moore died at Ellsworth, Ks. in 1890. Henry Emerson Moore then married, 14 Oct. 1892, Olive Jane Lewis, and seven children were born of this marriage. Olive Jane Lewis, born 9 Aug. 1866, Columbiana Co., Ohio, was the daughter of Stephen A. Lewis, born 5 April 1838, at Edenburg, Beaver Co., Pennsylvania, died 20 Feb. 1923, Alva, Ok., and Mary Ann Shrum born 7 April 1842, Warren, Trumbull Co., Ohio, and died 28 Aug. 1937 at El Dorado, Ks., where she is buried.

Shortly after Henry Emerson Moore came to Kansas he was followed by his father, Edward E. Moore, and a half-brother, James Robert Moore. Edward E. Moore settled in Ellsworth, Ks., where he practiced the professions of a blacksmith and a practical veterinary surgeon. James Robert Moore located on a farm in Lyon Co., Ks. He died in 1946 and is buried in a cemetery located in Agnes City Township, Lyon Co., Ks., approximately ten miles east of Council Grove, Ks.

Henry Emerson Moore followed the occupation of a Stone Mason and some of his stonework still stands in Ellsworth County. Henry Emerson Moore died 14 Sept. 1920, and is buried in the Ellsworth Cemetery. The burial plot is cornered by four limestone posts and has an obelisk shaped head stone, all made by Henry Emerson Moore.
