There is much news of interest from other Libraries:

New hours at Kansas State Historical Society Library: Research rooms open at 9 a.m. (instead of 8 a.m.) Monday through Friday. Closing time remains 5 p.m. Saturday hours are 8 a.m. to noon. The 9 a.m. opening time on week days is to give personnel time to process books and put away materials used the previous day.

National Archives have a new pre-payment policy on request for Veteran records, pensions, bounty lands, etc. The price now is \$t.00 per order, in advance and with proper forms as used before. The last word from Bureau of Land Records was \$4.00 in advance.

The State Archives of Missouri has County records for most of the counties on micro film. (Atchison and Gentry Counties are available only from each Courthouse) Each request for information should be limited to one county. You will receive another request form and bill for service with the returned information. Do not send a second request until you have heard from the first one.

OBITUARY - James Harrison GILLISPIE

The Savannah Reporter, July 19, 1895
On Sunday evening, July 14, James H. Gillispie arose from the table after partaking of a hearty supper, and in the good humored pleasant tone which was so characteristic of the man, said to his wife, "well, let us go milk". Picking up the pail, he proceeded to the barnyard, accompanied by his wife, she driving the cows into the lot, while he held the gate open. Hearing him speak in an unusual tone, she turned to look and beheld him falling. She ran to him, but alas! He had spoken to her for the last time. He breathed but twice after she reached him, the spirit had taken its flight to God who gave it.

Brother Gillispie was born in Madison County, Ky., March 13, 1826. In 1847 he came to Andrew County where he has continued to reside and where by his true manhood he made perhaps as many friends and as few enemies as any man in the county.

In 1866 he became a Christian and united with the Christian Church of which he lived a devoted member until death. He was the father of 12 children, 8 of whom are living, and with a vast concourse of sympathizing friends and relatives attended the last sad rites. The funeral sermon was preached by Elder Chapman from I Samuel 20:3. "There is but a step between me and death."

The burial service rendered by Savannah Lodge A.F. and A. M. of which he had long been a member, was beautifully solemn and impressive. The body was laid to rest in the family cemetery. "Be ye also ready." Contributed by Opal G. Sutherland, Wichita.

AN EARLY WICHITA CHRISTMAS

by William Clark Ellington, Jr.

Unfortunately no record exists to date concerning a description of the first Christmas observance in the village of Wichita. would have been a sufficient influx of settlers by December of 1868 to have some type of community celebration. Perhaps the holiday was observed at Durfee's, a trading post and stockade, located about 400 feet n.w. from Ninth and Waco, managed by Milo Kellogg. Camp Beecher, an adjacent military outpost to protect the new immigrants to the area from Indians, was in existance here from October 19, 1868 to October 23, 1869, so, it would be logicalthat the troopers stationed at the camp did indeed celebrate Christmas with the few settlers at that time. A diary kept by Lt. Thrasher, quartermaster of the Nineteenth Kansas, had an insertion for November 13, 1868, "Go to Kellogg's to dance." However, the use of Durfee's for a Christmas celebration is strictly speculation on my part and by no means fact. To insist otherwise would cast an ill wind to my historical credibility.

The Christmas of 1869 was recorded by William Finn, our first surveyor of Wichita. From an old diary he recorded this very brief description, "Then, on December 23, the first Sunday school teacher's meeting was held in Milo Kellogg's house." (Durfee's) (The Sunday school was organized in the latter part of November, 1869. Most of the meetings were held in a dugout school room.) The insert in his diary for December 25th disclosed, "Christmas in a new country. No fun at all. Killed one prairie chicken and hunted me a new claim." Unfortunately, Mr. Finn didn't jot down the weather for that long ago holiday.

For a pleasant review of an early Christmas in Wichita, one that was recorded and observed the following year of 1870, let us focus on a small community of frame dwellings, several log cabins and a few store fronts sprouting up her and there......Christmas of 1870 was indeed a white Christmas. A cold wave had hit on the 22nd of December that froze the ice on the Little Arkansas river to a depth of six inches. The settlers didn't appreciate the frigid temperatures. It was the coldest weather that some of the earliest citizens could recall, even those who had resided in Kansas a decade earlier. A six inch snow had fallen on the 16th of December that still graced the rooftops and ground for that special day. The weather had turned mild which contributed to the holiday spirit.

It was suggested the settlers take advantage of the thick crystal clear ice on the Little river and start cutting to store for the summer months. At that time the waters of the Little Arkansas were fed by various springs along the river's winding path to Wichita and consequently, was of good quality.

Ferhaps the most unusual sport for the holiday and during the cold snap was ice fishing on the river. This consisted of cutting a hole in the ice and waiting for a school of fish to surface for air and then, with a quick flick of a hoop or snare, which usually consisted of a heavy brass wire loop inserted in and attached to a stick, the fish were caught by looping them out onto the ice.

The merchants in the new town, who had been wise for laying in ample provisions for the holiday trade, were quite pleased over the

An Early Wichita Christmas, continued. healthy Christmas business.

J. H. Dagner, proprietor of a liquor and tobacco shop, offered a Christmas glow with pure Kentucky Bourbon whiskeys. Brandy, gin, Port and Sherry wines were also on display for sale.

Sol Kohn, in partnership with his brother, Morris, operated a prominent dry goods and clothing house that also sold groceries. Boots, shoes, hats and caps were also featured at their New York store. Sol Kohn later established a bank at Wichita and served as Mayor in 1879 but resigned five months later.

George Smith, who was an exclusive dealer in groceries, offered fancy food items for the holidays.

Emile Werner's Oyster Depot boasted a fine cellar and ice house. This establishment offered a large supply of fresh oysters for sale.

Oysters must have been in abundance locally for Charlie Corderio's Arbor Restaurant and lodging house featured oysters on the menu. The cooked variety were listed at 75ϕ and the raw, 50ϕ .

William Bloomfield Hutchison, co-founder of the first newspaper in Wichita, <u>Wichita Vidette</u>, complained that the only greeting he received for Christmas was a notice of an unpaid bill. The notice demanded payment before January 1st or the matter wil be forwarded to the squire for collection.

Doc Lewellan, a pioneer trader and merchant in the area, boasted the largest stock of dry goods in the valley.

Typical examples of food prices in Wichita during that December had potatoes selling for \$1.50 a bushel; 100 lbs.of flour at \$6.00; a pound of butter and a dozen eggs selling at 40¢ respectively.

Perhaps the first holiday activity for that 1870 Christmas was a festival, held on the evening of the 23rd of December, at the new Presbyterian church, located then at Second and Wichita. It was a duo-purpose occasion, to celebrate the holiday and to raise additional funds to complete the church. The Society of Church Ladies officiated and sponsored the festival. (This church stands today at Wichita's COWTOWN.)

A concluding celebration for the pioneer holiday of 1870 was a grand masquerade hall held on December 29th. The occasion was the wind-up of the Christmas holiday and the opportunity to "hoof" out the old year. This hall, held at Wichita Hall, was labeled "the affair of the season." The admittance charge was \$3.00. The executive committee consisted of Ed Smith, George Clark, John E. (Jack) Ledford, James (Big Jim) Steele, M. R. Hall, C. H. Stone, Charles Case and R. B. (Bone) Waterman. (Waterman was the son of the first land owner in the village, Eli F. Waterman.) These men were responsible for assisting in securing costumes and making arrangements.

Many Christmas seasons have been celebrated in Wichita since that 1870 date. One hundred ten to be exact.

[&]quot;Colonel M," Mr. Wm. Grieffenstein's noted trotting horse, for which he had refused three thousand dollars, died last Tuesday night, suddenly. Mr. G. has not returned from Washington. (1884, Wichita, Ks.)

GENEALOGY SEARCH PAYS OFF

Jennie Karaffa is not your typical great-great grandmother. At 81 years young, her life is an active mix of auxiliary meetings, working with the senior citizens, and handwork, such as, crocheting, making silk flowers, and playing piano for various lodge functions. These activities help to keep Jennie's mind off of the fact that within the past few years, she has buried her second husband and all of her three children. But in November 1979 something happened to rekindle the flame in her beautiful, snappy eyes.

This particular day, like most of her days, had been filled with crocheting and a visit to some of her senior citizen friends until the telephone rang. On the other end was the voice of a man she had never heard before, never knew existed:

Jennie's youngest sister, Ella, had died 41 years ago, shortly after Ella had given birth to her son, Robert Ronningen. But Jennie had lost touch with her family due to moving around and traveling in Europe and somehow, when news of her sister's death reached her, the birth of Ella's son was not make known to her.

But things have a way of working out. When Robert Ronningen joined The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormans) in 1962, he began to collect data for his family genealogy. In reading through his mother's old school records, there were the names of all her brothers and sisters of the Berends family. He was familiar with all of these names but one: Jennie Berends. After a few inquiries, he traced Jennie's family to Dodge City, Kansas. He was told by her relatives there that Jennie, the only surviving sibling of the nine Berends children, was living in Oakley, California.

It was over a year ago when Robert placed the call to his Aunt Jennie. Since then, a steady exchange of correspondence and telephone calls have taken place arranging for a meeting between two newly-found friends. Three days ago the meeting finally took place when Jennie, driven by friends, arrived for a visit from California.

"I've really enjoyed these three days. It's been some of the greatest days of my life to be greeted by someone who really cares about me. The meeting was a turning point for me at this time in my life. I hated to hear about the family deaths because I had lost contact with the family, but I can't express the feeling I have inside. It's beautiful!" says Jennie.

It's been a wonderful experience for Robert, too. "We've spent these few days going over family history and catching up on 41 years of genealogy in three days.

"But that's what genealogy is all about. Not only do you record data on family that you are familiar with, but sometimes family histories are full of surprises, too!" said Robert.

Jennie will go from Wichita to Dodge City today to visit other relatives, which include two great-great grandchildren that she hasn't seen in two years.

HUGUENOTS

Huguenot is the name generally given to the French Protestants of the 16th, 17th and 18th centuries. The word Huguenot means French descent.

The National Huguenot Society by-laws for membership eligibilty require proof that: (1) a person who without regard to ethnic origin or particular sect of the Protestant faith, who subsequent to Dec. 10, 1520 and who prior to the promulgation of the Edict of Toleration, Nov. 28, 1787, emigrated to America from France (or from another country. (2) a Huguenot who, in spite of religious persecution, remained in France(within the kingdom of France on the date of promulgation).

The word Huguenot comes from an alteration. It may have been influenced by the gate Roi-Hugon where the Protestants of Tours assembled at night; of earlier French eyguenot, referring to those who opposed annexation by the Duke of Savoy; may have come from several German words.

Promulgation is to make known (a decree, law or doctrine) by public declaration. Edict is a decree or proclamation issued by an authority.

The Edict of Nantes signed by Henry IV of France, was one of the most Famous royal decrees in history. It was the first official recognition of religious toleration by a great European country. Signed on April 13, 1598, at the ducal castle in Nantes, it allowed the French protestants complete freedom of worship in about 75 towns. They were given equal rights with the Catholics as citizens. The intolerant King Louis XIV abolished the edict in 1685. Thousands of the Huguenots fled France. Nantes is a port city 215 miles southwest of Paris, a trading center with ship building as it's major industry.

The National Huguenot Society recognizes among their membership descendants of Mennonites, Jansenists, Hussites, followers of ZWINGLI (Tsving-Lee) and the Walloons.

Mennonites are a protestant group known for its emphasis on plain ways of dressing, living and worshipping. There are many branches. Their beliefs are based largely on the New Testament. Their creed is the Sermon on the Mount. It forbids going to war, swearing oaths, or holding offices that require force. The first church originated in Zurich in 1525 and was the Swiss Brethern. They believed the Church and State should be seperated. They baptised only those persons who proved their goodness in their daily lives. The name came from Menno Simons, a Roman Catholic priest who led the Anabaptist movement in the Netherlands and northern Germany in the 1530's. Later it split into various groups, including the Amish.

Dutch Mennonites moved to northern Germany and Prussia in the 1600's and the Russian Ukraine in the 1700's. In 1874 many moved from Russia to Canada and to Kansas, Nebraska and nearby states. Swiss Mennonites moved to southern Germany and France and to Pennsylvania in 1683 after William Penn offered religious liberty. These were the Pennsylvania Dutch.

Jansenism was started by a Roman Catholic bishop of Ypres(Y-pris) Belgium. He wrote a book "Augustinus" in 1640 which was the source of the heresy called Jansenism. The idea was a rigorous Calvinistic piety into the Roman Catholic life by discouraging frequent communion. The book was of course condemned.

Hussites, organized by about 450 Bohemian nobles to avenge the killing of John Huss. He was a religious reformer and martyr, influenced by the English reformer John Wycliffe. His death set off the civil wars in Bohemia and inspired Martin

Luther in his revolt. Huss was rector of the Unity of Prague and a priest. He attacked the worldliness of the clergy and the church interference in political matters. Put on trial and not allowed to defend himself, he was burned at the stake in 1415. The Hussites were divided into 2 groups; the conservatives reached an agreement with the Church in 1433; the radicals were defeated in 1434. This group became the Moravian Church that we know today. It was oranized in 1457 and has 160 congregations in North America. First called the Unity of Brethern, it experienced a rebirth in Germany in the early 1700's. They came to America in 1735, settled in Savannah, Georgia and later moved to Pennsylvania where they founded the city of Bethlehem in 1741. They have a strong missionary policy.

Zwingli (TSVING, lee) was a Swiss clergyman who led the protestant reformation in his country. He preached against fasting, veneration of the saints, and insisted that priest should marry. The political powers of the Pope was his strongest issue. He went to the support of Martin Luther in 1520, and in 1523, Zurich broke with the Roman Catholic Church. He disagreed with Luther on the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The Swingli group broke away and in 1531 in a war against the 5 Catholic cantons of Switzerland, he was killed in battle.

The word Walloon means foreigner, and the French used it to refer to the French people in southern Netherlands. Walloon derives from the Teutonic word "Wahl" meaning foreigner. Germans use the word as an adjective "Walsch" meaning foreign and specifically French or Italian. Walsch Flanders is French Flanders as is Walslant. London records use it to identify a person as a Walsch-Swiss

In the 15th century the Dukes of Burgundy owned parts of the old Gaul not under Roman rule. Gaul had been divided into 3 parts - Belgica, Aquitania, Gallia, all formerly occupied by Celtic tribes. This property made the Dukes of Burgundy as powerful as the Kings of France.

The marriage of Mary of Burgundy to Maximilian of Hapsburg, the Holy Roman Emporer, gave these dominions to the House of Hapsburg. Their son Philip the Handsome, married Joanna of Castile, daughter of Ferdinand and Isabella, which gave their eldest son, the Spanish Empire. The northern Netherlands were able to free themselves after terrible fighting, but the southern Netherlands remained under Spain until 1714, when the Treaty of Utrecht reverted control to the Austrians, passing to France in 1797. The kingdom of Belgium was proclaimed in 1830, but nearly half of the French part of the southern Netherlands remained with France and today is known as the Dept. du Nord, (French Flanders) and Pas de Calois (once Artois).

Political rivalry for the throne of France, between the Bourbon family which for a time headed the Huguenot party and the Guises, leaders of the Catholic party, was involved in the religious struggle.

The massacre of Protestants by Catherine de Medici and the Guises on Saint Bartholomews Day (Aug. 24, 1572) and the rise of the Guises led Henry III of Navarre (Huguenot leader) to renounce protestantism in order to win the throne (1593). The French protestants had grown in number and wealth and were no longer a political party, but devoted to commerce and manufacture. (They numbered at least 1/3 of the country's tradesmen). The Huguenots in southern and western France surpassed all in the cultivation of soil. They applied themselves with great success to the mechanical arts. Woolen cloth, linen goods of serge and silk, iron works, paper mills, tanneries; all things that enriched France during this period and founded chiefly by Portestants.

In labor they were fitted to excel by their morality, intelligence and thrift. They were prudent in dealing with others, and ready to cooperate in business procedures. They were even loyal to their government. To be Continued in Next Issue

WILLFORD -HARDMAN FAMILY STORIES

Elinor Womer has provided us with an interesting story written by her mother Leslye Hardman Womer. This story is a history and compilation of anecdotes about the Willford-Hartman family giving us a glimpse into days gone by. We are going to try to choose the most interesting stories from the book, concentrating on the Willford family, who descended from one, Samuel Willford of England.

Joseph, the third son of Samuel emigrated to America and settled in the Tuscarora Valley in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania in 1766. Mary Ann Eniex, wife of Joseph III, was grandmother of the author and contributed much of the story to her.

Mary Campbell born in Cumberland Co., Pennsylvania, 1750, married Joseph Wilford. She lived a very exciting life, starting at the age of seven, when she and her brother William were captured by Indians while pursu ing their cows in the summer of 1757. Seven years later, she was discovered by a brother, named Dougel, who was with Colonel Bouguet as he was making a peace treaty with the Delaware and Shawnee Indians th the fork of the Muskingum River. Dougel stepping upon a log, enabled him to see out over the crowd. As he called Mary Campbell, he saw a squaw clamp her hand over a girl's mouth. Thus, Mary was found and returned to her parents by the Indians.

Hoeing corn with a hoe, made by fastening the shoulder blade of a deer to a stick using tendons from the deer legs to tie it together, Mary earned her 'keep'. It seems the Willfords lived rough lives. Joseph Willford (4) was frozen to death when caught in a blizzard while trapping fur bearing animals in Nobles County, Minnesota. He is buried at Spirit Lake, Iowa.

Joseph Willford (5), a machinist, invented the Willford and Northway Roller used in Milling and had a factory in Minneapolis where all the Mill machinery was made. Pillsbury Mills in Minneapolis, the largest flour mills in the world, contained this machinery put in by the Willfords.

Leslye Hardman Womer was the grandaughter of William Willford and Nancy Casebeer, who were married in Wayne County, Ohio, July 5, 1838. Her mother, Ellen, was born near Beloit, Wisconsin in Green County, December 26, 1851. one of the younger children.

While the Willford boys helped outdoors, Martha the oldest daughter, was the seamstress, having only one needle, guarded diligently, to do all the sewing. She bought the first sewing machine in the County paying \$100.00 for a Wheeler and Wilson machine, earning the money by sewing for neighbors for one cent a yard. She carded, spun and wove cloth from the sheep shearing, raised flax for linen and thus provided the material for their clothing. She made dyes from butternut and and walnut shells; so most of the clothing was brown. A dress for Sunday and one for every day wear was the extent of their dresses in the winter. She also, made the men and boys clothing.

Shoes were worn in cold weather, only, with orders to "stay out of the mud". Children of that day were no different than children today. Into the nearest mud hole
they went! When the father came home and found out about it, all were lined up
and given sound spankings until Ellen's turn. She was so small that she was
scolded severely and let off the hook.

The children attended Sharon school in Iowa, taught by numerous teachers. Some of the teachers were Mary McClain, Jonathon Dudley, Sue Dudley, two sisters, Sybil and Nan and Mary Jane Horn. Affa Dubois NcCrory related the following story to Leslye Hardman whose grandfather had a rick of sugar cane stacked between their house and the sorghum mill which stood between the house and the school. In spite of having kindling and matches in the school house to start a fire, the teacher sent two boys with a shovel to get some live coals to restart the fire which had gone out. The boys on returning climbed over the rick of sugar cane with the live coals, setting the cane on fire. The teacher, pupils

nor near neighbors could not save the cane or mill.

Amanda Casebeer baked and brought the first iced cake ever seen by the younger school children to a picnic on Sugar Creek. Amanda was Ellen Willford's cousin. The adventures of the Hardman family will be related in the next issue of the Register. Series to be continued. Compiled by Claudine Doyle

I notice in the American Friend of 11th month 2nd, a little account of William Baldwin and E. B. (Elizabeth).

"CENSUS DAY"

Cenaus Day is that day set by law for each census enumeration to begin (i.e.who lived in this household on the said date.) Although the assistant census Marshal may have quizzed the head of the family in September on the make-up of his family, the return was to show "all persons in the family on June 1st." No baby born between June 1st and the enumerator's visit was to be included. But anyone who had died between June 1st and the time of the enumerator's visit was to be included as well as anyone who was a member of the family in June but was absent from the home when the enumerator came by. At forts, Navy yards, prisons, asylums, colleges, schools, etc., the commanding officer, superintendent, keeper, or headmaster was regarded as "Head of the Household" and was instructed to furnish information on the number of people in his charge.


