Dear Members:

For several years our Society has been exploring methods of acquiring larger facilities as a permanent home for our library. Our lease at Cowtown will expire in December of 1984. It is time for a full scale campaign to find larger facilities.

Our original goal of \$200,000. set in 1981, was for the membership to raise 10% or \$20,000. This amount is needed to effectively bargain for grants and donations.

Our Building Fund Committee has been meeting regularly for the past year making plans to raise extra money. Our committee has laid guidelines of our Society's needs for a new home as follows:

1. Proper air conditioning and heating with humidity control.
2. Men's and women's restrooms.
3. Proper security
4. Accessibility for all ages, preferably at ground level.
5. Minimum of 3,500 square feet in floor space.
6. Reading area for a minimum of 50 people.
7. Areas for a meeting room, librarian's office and publication rooms.
8. Off street parking.

We all must keep in mind that a new constructed building may not be possible for us at this time. Although we are negotiating with city and county officials, we have been unable to arrive at a realistic proposal.


As of January 13, 1984, our cash savings are \$9,174.02. This amount includes the proceeds of our bake sale and chili supper. All money in the building fund will be used to acquire a building with the above listed requirements, remodeling and/or essential new equipment.

THANK YOU to all who have helped with publications in any way.

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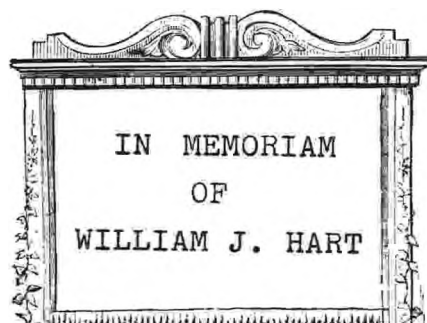

PERHAPS ONE OF THESE WILL BLOSSOM IN YOUR GENEALOGICAL GARDEN!

On 19 June, 1984 the National Archives and Records Service will have its 50th birthday.

The shortage of interesting information of a genealogical nature persists in both the Kansas & Federation Societies. Again, it permits the presentation of other sources of assistance.

Beginning in June 1980 and continuing through the present, the Minnesota Genealogist has had a series of transcripts. These are the speeches of various speakers at Society meetings and Seminars. One will find them informative and in an easy to read style. The lesser experienced members will find a world of suggestions to locate that which is sought. Most of the membership could find at least one or two new approaches. Examples of assistance cover British and German records, court records, newspapers, naturalization records, controlling paper work and the gathering items for the family history. One of the more practical presentations included tips on the handling of tape recorder problems. This is Vol. 12, no. 3.

It is only natural that we are proud of our accomplished ancestors. All of us will find those who were impoverished, at least for a time. Others had afflictions, epileptics, deaf and dumb persons or abandoned children are examples. Remember, such people were usually not allowed the tolerance to move about that exists today.

It has not been all that long ago that Sedgwick County had two "homes". One of these was at Sheridan and West Douglas (during last years of existence known as County Hospital) The other was on South Oliver, near the present location of the Cessna Activities Center. Records such as these along with apprenticeships and others are explained in the October, 1983 issue of Genealogy. Title of the article is, Records of the Poor and the Unfortunate. Genealogy is shelved with the Indiana periodicals. While this is Indiana oriented, such data is probably available most other places. In my own research, Nebraska records were pursued. Found were my grandfather as a County Commissioner for a three year term. On the record was travel pay to the meetings, where their polling places would be located and the poll workers to name a few.

This Column is in receipt of the June-July 1983 & Dec.-Jan. 1983-84 issues of Rota-Gene Genealogical & Historical Magazine. This is a publication of the International Fellowship of Rotarians. Six copies per year are printed. The price is \$15.00 per year and has an open membership. Each issue has some genealogical material, book reviews, queries and advertising. These periodicals will be available for viewing for a time on the new periodical rack in our Library.

Opening of the new museum of the Kansas State Historical Society is planned for June. The facilities are west of Topeka on the north side of Interstate 70. Celebration plans include crafts, foods, genealogical displays, seminars, etc. Remember this is the museum that is moving, not the genealogical and research areas.

OLD BARN



THE OLD BARNS

Merle Seavey

It is doubtful that all the different variations of the old barns built in our nation could ever be catalogued. They varied according to the economy of the region and the time in history, and with the climate, need and availability of material. Native logs, lumber, rock or stone were some of the early materials used.

Cold crisp days bring remembrances when as a boy, it wasn't too upsetting to help with doing the chores. There were the cows to be milked, ice to be broken in the water tanks; all of the stock to be fed grain, hay or other feeds; horses to be curried or brushed down and then turned into the corral. The insulating qualities of dry hay, animal warmth and winter time lanterns contributed to a "sometimes" cozy atmosphere.

Intriguing are some of the barns in the northeastern states. The consolidated buildings all tied together with the family home up-front, next a summer kitchen, the storage and fuel room, buggy or 'hack' with hay sheds, silo and grain bins were built in between horse and cattle sections, with the pigs delegated to the far end. (Similar to such farm buildings found in Canada and Europe). The farmer could take care of a major amount of the winter chores without being outside in the inclement weather.

Southeastern Pennsylvania was known as the land of the Big Red Barns. These included the "Hex" barns built by the Pennsylvania Dutch in Berks and Lancaster Counties. They received their name from the geometric designs painted, carved or stenciled on the outside of the barns. A large portion of the designs were in some form of a star; four, six or eight point stars. They were referred to as "old folk-lore to ward off evil spirits." White trim around the doors was to keep the devil out and called devil doors; windows with the same treatment were called witch windows. These same 'decorated' barns are found in Rockingham, Augusta and Highland counties of Virginia and in Pendleton and Hardy counties, West Virginia where there were German settlements. Do not forget the Tobacco barns of the South!

In the Midwestern states, ready cash and materials were a problem for the pioneer farmers. The early sod houses or dug-outs with a shallow low frame roof were a result of being the only material available. The first barns were really sheds or 'lean-tos', usually built of logs and lumber or pole frames covered with grass, hay or straw. The latter were used for protection of the stock during rainy or cold days & often the stock would eat through the walls.

As the family grew in size and numbers and the economy improved, rooms were added to the house and a barn would be built. Larger families meant more hands to help and more food grown. The larger barn needed to house, feed and milk the expanded herd of milk cows, and to care for the needs of the horses.

The barn was the hub of the farm operation from early morning to late at night with help of coal oil or kerosene lanterns, then the Coleman gasoline lantern and later the 32-volt electric power lights. From the use of these animals came the income for the everyday needs of the farm family, i.e. clothing, food and other incidentals.

In this part of the country the larger barns were built around the turn of the century and on into the teens and early twenties. It was usually built by a local man who had experience in building farm barns. He usually had a helper or two; a big kit of hand tools and whatever else was needed to perform this job. If he lived a distance he would need board and room. There were few blue prints. Usually a few hours planning with the farmer as to size, number of stalls for horses; the number of stanchions for milk cows if they were to be milked here and they usually were unless the farmer was in the dairy business. A dairy barn would be built for this. There was to be decided if grain bins were to be included and size of the hayloft. Then, it was a matter of stepping it off and drive the corner stakes in the location decided upon. Early barns and houses had little in the way of foundation, using rock or stone mostly. Later a footing was dug, to run concrete and then a cement wall for foundation was formed. A builder drew from experience of the barns he had built and the farmer from those of neighbors he had observed.

From a newspaper article in the St. Francis, Kansas Herald, August 8, 1918. "We had the pleasure of visiting the farm of L.J. Willits of Lawn Ridge. He has just completed building an elegant new barn, costing well over \$3000.00 and it surely is a beauty. There is room on the ground floor for 20 head of horses, besides feed bins, etc. Above the 10 foot ceiling is a hayloft that will hold 20 tons of hay. The building rests upon a foundation with an extended abutment makes the building rat proof. It is a perfect oval inside and out. A Mr. Cole was the building superintendant. Not many farm barns were this large or 'elegant'. Often a new barn was host to a dance with the neighborhood invited and held in the hayloft. Most of the barns were painted with a prime coat and two more coats of barn red and trimmed in white. For some, this was probably the only coat of paint they ever received over the years from the number one has observed in a drab gray or brown condition.

The majority of the barns were functional with stall dividers between each matched team of horses with a hay manger in front part of the stall and a grain box for each horse. There were the convenient pegs and racks which supported the harnesses, bridles, collars, color pads, etc. even fly nets. With the advent of the tractors and mechanical farm machinery, horses were no longer needed in the farming process, making the barn of little use unless the farmer was a stockman. They began to fall into dis-repair and fall apart or were torn down. Each year a few more tumble down and will become a part of the past.

Give these old barns credit for contributing a great deal to our heritage. Also, the memories! Can you hear the nicker of the horse when he was fed? It was his way of saying "thank you". Remember finding a litter of new baby kittens in the hayloft or a "setting hen" on a nest of eggs she had secretly laid; almost stepping on a snake seeking food; or the smell of new hay in the loft. Those were the days of a farm lad! Along with steam trains, windmills, cisterns horse drawn machinery, home made ice cream, neighbors and the 4th of July this was a part of the making of America. 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GOOD MANNERS

Good manners are always in style. A marvelous book, The Wonderful World of Ladies' Fashion, 1850-1920, edited by Joseph J. Schroeder, Jr., outlines proper etiquette for ladies and gentlemen. Many of the guidelines seem quaint today, but the rules for conversation should be reviewed by many present-day ladies and gentlemen. Have we forgotten the rules for courteous conversation?

"The object of conversation is to entertain and amuse. To be agreeable, you must learn to be a good listener. A man who monopolises a conversation is a bore, no matter how great his knowledge.

"Never get into a dispute. State your opinions, but do not argue them. Do not contradict, and, above all, never offend by correcting mistakes or inaccuracies of fact or expression.

"Never lose temper--never notice a slight--never seem conscious of an affront, unless it is of a gross character.

"You are not required to defend your friends in company, unless the conversation is addressed to you; but you may correct a statement of fact, if you know it to be wrong.

"Never talk at people, by hints, slurs, innuendoes, and such mean devices. If you have anything to say, out with it. Nothing charms more than candor, when united with good breeding.

"Do not call people by their names, in speaking to them. In speaking of your own children, never 'Master' and 'Miss' them--speaking to other people of theirs, never neglect to do so.

"It is very vulgar to talk in a loud tone, and indulge in hoarse laughs. Be very careful in speaking upon subjects upon which you are not acquainted. Much is to be learned by confessing your ignorance--nothing can be by pretending to knowledge which you do not possess.

"Never tell long stories. Avoid all common slang phrases, and pet words.

"Of all things, don't attempt to be too fine. Use good honest English--and common words for common things."

It may be difficult to follow this advice to the letter, especially when one must not correct inaccuracies of fact, unless those inaccuracies pertain to a friend. One assumes the writer meant that one can correct inaccuracies of fact if they malign a friend's character. Nevertheless, in general, modern conversation can improve greatly if we follow these suggestions.

PIONEER PHYSICIANS IN WICHITA AND SEDGWICK COUNTY, KANSAS

There were many lean years between 1870 and 1900, but the "Gay Nineties" came to Wichita as it continued to grow and attract physicians. This growth was partly due to the Board of Trade which later became the Chamber of Commerce who induced factories to come here, such as Burton Car Works, Dold Packing Company, The Electric Company, Sash and Door Company and Paper Box Company along with many speculators and grafters too. Even Ida May had to split her profits with Dixie Lee, who owned property where the Missouri Pacific Station was located.

Among physicians arriving in 1890, in spite of the depression, were: Dr. Jacob Ziegler Hoffman, born April 1862 near Maytown, Pa. became leader among the doctors. He was president of Wichita Hospital and Wichita Academy of Medicine, later known as Sedgwick County Medical Society. Dr. Hoffman married Miss Maude Pratt, daughter of Wichita pioneers, 17 May 1900. Their home was 938 N. Broadway. He died in January 1935.

Dr. Ernest E. Hamilton, born Halsey Valley, New York, graduated from the University of Michigan and specialized in eyes, ears, nose and throat. He married Ora Wooden and started westward, stopping in Wichita in 1890.

Herman B. Tihen located here in 1893 (born 3 March 1869, native of Jefferson City, Mo.) at the urging of his brother, Bishop Henry Tihen. Dr. Tihen decided Wichita had enough doctors and moved to Andale, Ks. where he carried on an extensive practice until his death 15 October 1933. He was the father of Dr. Henry N. Tihen.

Mark F. Hobson, M. D. born 1853, Henry County, Indiana was noted for his treatment of patients with dropsy.

John H. Fuller, M. D. came from Louisville, Ky. seeking a climate to improve his wife's health (which it did). He had offices in the Bitting Building. They lived in the old Munger House for years.

Dr. Pembroke Thomas, born in Va., grew up near Charleston, West Va. He bought half interest in the Martha Washington Home, a hospital, privately owned by J. W. Shults, located at 10th and St. Francis and later became Wesley Hospital in 1912.

Dr. James Enoch Liggett, a prosperous doctor, made money by entering the grain business, owning elevators in Andover, Kechi, Haysville and Wichita. He also fattened cattle in the winter months, so it is questionable if he had much time to practice medicine.

Dr. J. G. Dorsey came in 1893. He was born 5 July 1860 in Fairmount, Virginia (now West Va.) Dorsey attended public school in Chillicothe, Mo. and married Etta Palmer in 1883. Her brother, Dr. Ed Palmer practiced eye, ear, nose and throat in Wichita too. Dr. Dorsey had practiced in Braymer, Mo. but did not like the general practice so he decided to specialize in eye, ear, nose and throat and had started to go to Oklahoma, stopping in Wichita on the way to visit a friend, Dr. Martindale, a minister. Martindale arranged a meeting between Dr. Dorsey and Dr. Fabrique. In short, Dr. Fabrique, who did not like ministers, told Dorsey that Wichita had a fine eye, ear, nose and throat doctor (Dr. Hamilton) and if he wanted to succeed he should go on west. This antagonized Dr. Dorsey. He rented an office the next day on the second floor of Kansas National Bank Building.

After establishing his practice, he went to St. Francis Hospital and told the Sisters he was going to do eye surgery...cataracts and cross-eyes. Dr. Hamilton was working at Wichita Hospital so the Sister Superior saw a chance to further her cause and prepared a special room for Dr. Dorsey. He soon limited his practice to eye surgery.

In 1911, Dr. Dorsey bought a two-story brick building at 201 N. Main Street and opened new offices on the second floor. He rented the space vacated by a saloon to Ellis Cookson Drugs.

Dr. Dorsey became a factor in medicine in Wichita and was in demand as a speaker at medical meetings. The Dorseys had two daughters. Helen Dorsey married Dr. Walker Weaver, who became a partner in the clinic, and Mabel Dorsey who lived in Santa Fe, N.M. Dr. Dorsey died in 1929.

Dr. Charles E. Bowers, born November 17, 1865 at Canal Dover, Ohio, located in Anthony, Ks. In 1887 he married Kate Ranney. They had two daughters, Mrs. Florence Gill and Mrs. Jud Petrie. Kate died in 1913 and Bowers later married her sister, Rosalind Ranney. Dr. Bowers came to Wichita in 1899 and became a partner of Dr. Fabrique with offices in the Bitting Building and practiced surgery. He introduced the X-ray machine to Wichita, which he "set up" on the third floor of St. Francis Hospital. It was very noisy and shook the hospital. It was requested that he move the X-ray to his office. Dr. Bowers died in March 1927.

After 17 years of intermittent practice, Dr. David Walker Basham of Neal, Greenwood County, Ks. came to Wichita in 1902, to practice surgery. He was the eldest son of four children. Basham was born in Clifton Mills, Ky., November 6, 1854. He married Katherine Genevieve Daley in Helena, Mt. in 1902. They had six sons, all were physicians. Five are named here: David, Travis, John, Charles and George.

Dr. Andrew Fabrique was born September 9, 1842 in Harrison County, Ind., the 9th of 10 children. His father, Henry Lewis Fabrique was born July 28, 1798 in Hinesburg, Vt. He was descended from the old French Huguenots, who left France for Holland because of religious troubles. Later, the family settled in England and the family name was Henry Lewis. Fabrique came from the term, "Manufacturer of Cloth". His maternal ancestry was Louise Hinsdale, daughter of Aaron and Lucinda Mitchell Hinesdale (two spellings given) born in 1805, Hinesdale, Vt. The Hinsdales were French and English. Aaron Hinsdale owned woolen mills in Vermont. Andrew's father died when he was seven.

Dr. Fabrique had read medicine with Dr. Mitchell in Indiana. He then moved to New Orleans, La. and enrolled in Tulane Medical School, 1860, and worked for a retired physician, Dr. Piquet. The Civil War broke out and Fabrique hurried north to join the Union troops. After the war he did not return to medical school. Instead, he went to Mexico with General Sheridan to overthrow the Mexican government. Yellow Fever was prevalent and he helped with many cases, although he was not an Army doctor.

September 26, 1866 he married Sarah Philler in Memphis, Tn. They came to Wichita in 1869. He tired of making house calls, dispensing pills and started an intensive study of anatomy and surgical textbooks. He went to Chicago to study and became a friend of a leading surgeon, Nicholas Senn, who offered to teach him, "all he needed to know." He paid a Dr. Christian Fenger \$400.00 to allow him to study pathology, which he needed. Later he studied with Dr. Edmund Andrews, noted surgeon and when he returned to Wichita, he was a capable surgeon. Due to the law passed in 1885 requiring all physicians to register, Dr. Fabrique, who actually did not have a degree but had practiced in Wichita for 15 years, refused to register. There was much talk and bad feelings among the doctors about this. "Fab's Boys" as his close friends were known, took the matter up with Northwestern University and in 1905 he was issued a regular degree. "Fab's Boys" included Doctors: Charles E. Bowers, J. F. Gsell, J. D. Clark, Martin Hagan, D. I. Maggard, George Purvis, Thor Jager, Fred Lyons, E. M. Seydell and others.

In 1900 the doctors organized the Wichita Academy of Medicine and took a definite stand for better training, better methods and responsible practitioners. The academy had regular monthly meetings. In 1903, the name was changed to Sedgwick County Medical Society, with Dr. F. J. Gsell, eye surgeon, President; Dr. J. W. Cave, general practitioner, Vice President; Dr. G. S. Hickock, a surgeon, Secretary and Dr. J. C. Brown, an eye doctor, Treasurer.

In 1902 a law was enacted stating anyone who had been in continuous practice for seven years or had graduated from medical school would be licensed to practice. The license had to be recorded in office of County Clerk in the county of residence. This law, with some changes, controls Kansas medicine today. This not only improved medical care but protected the public from quacks and fakery. From files of the Wichita Eagle Newspaper, Sedgwick County Medical Society records.

J. W. JAMES, EARLY SETTLER NEAR WACO, SEDGWICK COUNTY, KANSAS-1870

JOHN W. James was born in Scott County, Indiana, Oct. 1, 1819 and was the son of Thomas and Priscilla James, natives of Kentucky. At the age of twelve he removed with his parents to Schuyler County, Illinois. On 19 December, 1843, he was married to Martha Garret, a native of Virginia. They were the parents of six children: Mary E. wife of Dr. S. Mann (lived in Wellington, Kansas); Carrie, Mrs. E.R. Ross, Wichita; Henry J. resident of Pratt County, Ks.; Calvin G. of Sumner County, Ella, wife of William H. Babb, Salem Twp., Sedgwick County; and Hurlbert, killed in Civil War at Franklin, Tennessee.

Mr. James came to Sedgwick County in 1870, one of the oldest settlers of the County. He and his family pre-empted land near Waco, where he built a house of cottonwood logs. He said the country was open and there were buffalo on the prairie. Wichita had three small grocery stores on North Main street. The houses were mostly log cabins or dug-outs. The dugouts were walled and roofed with sod. At that time Mr. James said "the blue stem prairie grass, which covered the land was about three and one-half feet high and would hide a coyote." When the sod was broken, sunflowers would spring up everywhere. Often a farmer would mark off his land by plowing a single furrow around it. The furrow could not be seen but a long line of sunflowers would mark the boundaries."

On 1 October, 1909, about sixty neighbors, friends and relatives met at the rural home of Mrs. Carrie Ross, near Waco, to celebrate the ninetieth birthday of her father, Mr. John James. The following relatives were present: his daughters, Mrs. Ross and Mrs. Ella Babb, Wichita; grandchildren, Mr & Mrs. Will Jones of Caldwell, Mr & Mrs George Gill, Miss Nellie Babb; Messrs. Harry and Glenn Ross.

Mr. John W. James died 7 July, 1912. "He had known the trials and hardships of a pioneer. He had seen the prairies changed to fruitful fields, dotted with school houses, churches and beautiful homes built and furnished with improvements for comfort and progress." He was laid to rest in the Waco cemetery beside his wife who had been gone some 39 years. Taken from The Wichita Eagle and submitted by John H. Marvin, Madison, Wisconsin, a MHGS member.

Brothers and fathers sold land back and forth to each other, and often signed as witnesses for each other. It was very common for members of the same family to have land adjoining each other.

A CANADIAN COLONY IN KANSAS

This is a family story traced from Canada to Kansas. The author had come across this in an ancestor's notes, "Archibald McVICAR went to Kansas". She had a great feeling of success thinking "I've found him." Soon this was replaced by dismay as she realized Kansas was a fairly large place; it was too far away for a casual look-around visit in any other state in the United States for that matter.

A number of efforts increased her knowledge of Kansas geography but did nothing to locate McVicar. Then, she learned there had been a colony from Carleton County, Ontario that had gone to Kansas and the McVicar were a part of it. They settled near Wichita within the first few months of settlement and not only had been well known, but had descendants living there.

This group centers around Thomas Allen Sullivan, his wife Adaline Rood, their family and neighbors. Thomas Sullivan was born in Ireland, went to Vermont when a young man and then on to Canada. He was married in Vermont, where his first four children were born. The remaining seven were born in Carleton County, Ontario.

Family legend tells he bought land in Ottawa(Canada), opened the first cabinet shop and was active in politics. Records show that he bought Lot 13, Con. 6, Fitzroy Twp. which he sold before going to the United States. According to 1861 census members of the family were living in Fitzroy township where he was engaged in farming. His eldest son, Charles Edward, went to Kansas before the Civil War and encouraged his father to migrate to Kansas "where there was lots of good, cheap land for the large family."

In March, 1870, two of the Sullivan boys, George C. and Cyrus set out ahead of the main party. They travelled by train to Emporia and then by Stage Coach to Sedgwick County. The balance of the party followed a month later, taking the train to Kansas City, where they were met by Cyrus. They stayed a week in Kansas City while Thomas bought wagons, teams and a year's supplies of needed provisions. Another week of travel and on May 12, 1870 they staked claims in Kechi township, Sedgwick County, Kansas.

Thomas Sullivan lived only about 18 months after his arrival in Kansas and his son-in-law Archibald McVicar lived seven years, dying July 3, 1877 at 41 years of age.

Two of Thomas' sons, Albert N. and Thomas A. settled in Nebraska near Omaha. Their wives Mary Jean (?) and Mary Jane Murphy may or may not have been Canadians.

George C. and Cyrus returned to Fitzroy in 1872 for brides. George married Letitia Hunt, sister of Mrs. William Sullivan. Cyrus married Elizabeth Queensbury Douglas Rorison, sister of Mrs. Arthur Sullivan.

ROHRBACH GENEALOGY....VOL. 111 - 1982 by Lewis Bunker Rohrbach

This volume is "devoted" to the ancestry and descendants of Johann Reinhart Rohrbach, emigrant from Hessen-Hanau section of southern Germany to Pennsylvania in 1749. Later the family went to West Virginia. (Rohrbaugh, Rohrbaugh, Rorabaugh, Rohrbough, etc. spell.) The preface includes a list of researchers and studies made of this family by various members from 1862 to 1980 including manuscripts, booklets, and books that have been published.

Johann Reinhart Rohrbach, born 17 March 1699 in village of Bergen, four miles out of Frankfort am Main, Germany, died 1765-66 in Berks County, Pennsylvania near Reading. He married (1) Anna M Margaretha Koch of Hockstadt, Germany, (2) Anna Marie(____)Schrued? There are no pictures, maps, legal papers (photostats)

This 339 page book contains direct Genealogical line of 7-10 generation in America plus an additional 4 generations in Germany back to mid-16th century.

It includes documentation necessary to establish eligibility for family members to join D.A.R., S.A.R., D.A.C. etc. It is fully indexed with 15,000 entries.

HOW TO TRACE YOUR ROOTS IN FRANCE

If you are of French ancestry, you can check your family records by going to the Hotel de Ville (City Hall) of the village where your ancestors were born. Only relatives are admitted to the archives (pronounced AR-SHEEV); so you may have to explain your relationship with the person you are researching. It helps to speak a little French or bring someone along who does. If your pronunciation is shaky, have names, places and dates written down. Occasionally, a woman's records are listed with her husband's. If a female ancestor is not listed, you might look under her husband's name and birthplace. Parisian records are a problem - many were burned in the 1870's; those remaining are at 1'Hotel de Saint-Aignan, 71 rue de Temple or at 30 quai Henri IV.

THE DESCENDANTS OF JOHN LINSKOTT(1655 to present day)

This book is compiled and published by Harold L. Linscott of 1847 North Clarence, Wichita, Kansas, 67203 (1983) and printed by Mennonite Press, Newton, Kansas.

John Linscott, born 1655, Exeter, Devon and left England for political reasons arriving Portsmouth about 1685-1688, emigrating to Portland, Maine in 1693. He lived in York County, Maine the remainder of his life dying in 1711. He married (1) Lydia Milbury, in 1690; (2) Sarah (Kingsbury) Brookings, 1696. All of his children were born in York County, Maine.

This book has been compiled very neatly and attractively. It is easily read as the type is large. The 201 page history has an 11 page index of all Allied Families and 15 pages of Linscott, Lynscott, Lynsott, Linscot, Linscut, Linskit, etc. (spellings). It has 4 pages of references listing sources of information. Mr. Linscott has included excerpts of personal stories of the lives of various descendants. There are several photos of family members; copies of original marriage records, land records and other legal papers.

Anyone researching the Linscott family will find a gold mine of genealogical information.

In 1850 Sarah Gregg and her two daughters -Frances (Fannie) age 5 and Alice (Allie) age 2 - are living in Brown Township, Hancock County, Indiana with Sarah's parents. Sarah was born in Indiana in 1824. Her daughters were both born in Indiana according to the census, and both lived to adulthood and may have married.

In 1885 the obituary of Sarah's sister stated that "Mrs. Dr. Aaron GREGG of Texas was a resident of Markleville, Indiana until her death in 1874".

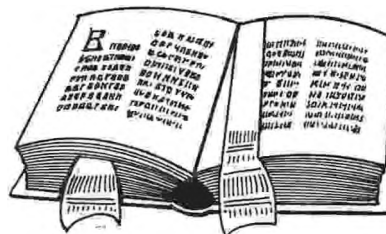
