LIBRARY LORE

In the three years since the Midwest Genealogical Society opened its library in the home of Louise and David Brehm, it has grown tremendously and is now "bursting at the seams."

We are presently exchanging our quarterly, "The Midwest Genealogical Register", with 89 organizations over the country and subscribe to 20. We find that the former adequate magazine racks overflowing with all of this material, so we have decided it is time to make a few changes in order to make the library more useful. The first step will be to bind the magazines into volumes between hard board folders which will stand up on the shelves.

Thanks to David Brehm, we will have more bookcases to accomodate this new arrangement. We also plan to enclose the many booklets we have in pamphlet binders in order to preserve them so they will stand up in the magazine racks.

Our piggy bank is still receiving donations. Since our society has helped the Wichita Public Library complete the purchase of the Federal censuses for 1870 and 1880 for Kansas with the donations from our little bank, we hope that we can buy some books and microfilm for our society's library.

If our members have any suggestions about improvements or purchases for the library, please submit them to the librarian and they will be given consideration.

Our Records Committee has put into folders copies of the following counties' cemetery records: Allen, Butler, Dickinson, Greenwood, Harvey, Kingman (complete), Lincoln (complete), Mitchell, Neosho, Pottawatomie, Sedgwick and Sumner. More cemetery records of Kansas have been alphabetized and are ready for the typists. We should have several more county cemetery records available soon at the library.

The society recently purchased a book which already has had wide circulation. It is "Genealogical and Historical Notes on Culpepper County, Va.," compiled by Raleigh Travers Green. It has much information in it for the genealogist searching Culpepper County records.

Another welcome addition to the library was purchased by several members of the society who are interested in research in New Jersey. This book is "Early Germans from New Jersey- Their History, church and Genealogies" by Thomas Fellinghuysen Chambers. This too, is out on loan most of the time.

Come visit us and check our magazines and books. Members may take them on loan for two weeks. The library, located in the Brehm home at 2911 Rivera, Wichita, Kansas, is open Tuesdays from 1 p. m. to 9 p. m. Who knows -- you may find just the family or ancestor for whom you are searching!

A Visit to the Friends University Library

Since Friends University, located at 2100 University Street, Wichita, Kansas, completed the move into their new Edmund Stanley Library in the spring of 1970, it is a good time for those with Quaker ancestors to plan a day of research there.

The Quaker records are in a room on the second floor near the center on the north side of the building. Comfortable chairs and well lighted tables are available for the researcher. A card index is in the room and copying facilities are available on the first floor. While this is not primarily a genealogical collection, there are a great many books of interest in that field. A listing of a few follows:

GRANDFATHER'S STORY TO THE BOYS

On May 12, 1870, my brother Dep (Jefferson Monroe Hall), age twenty-nine, and I who was nine years younger than my brother, left our old home near Windsor, Henry County, Missouri for Kansas.

We arrived in Wichita on the 22nd. day of May, having traveled a distance of over two hundred and thirty five miles. Our means of transportation was a covered wagon drawn by a little sorrel bob-tailed mule and a white pony, both of which were very small, weighing only about eight hundred pounds each.

Wichita at that time was nothing but a little Indian trading post, located on Waco Avenue, above Oak Street (now called Murdock). The Elks Horn Tavern, a Saloon, a post office, a few log houses and dug-outs, several deserted Indian Wigwams, constituted the village. There were no large trees here, only a few scrubby trees along the banks of the river.

The saloon was the only frame building in the village and it was just a little shack, ten by twelve feet.

The tavern was the largest structure, as it was about twenty by forty feet. The sides were made with poles set in the ground and plastered with mud. For the roof, poles were laid across the top and covered with coarse grass and dirt. A big Elk head with horns was hanging over the front door.

Sedgwick County had just been organized two or three months before we came.

There were no roads, but we struck out between the Little Arkansas and the Big Arkansas rivers in a northwest direction and went about twenty-five miles up the Big River. The land looked like good fertile soil, so we decided to stop and mark our claims. In order to work our claims, we had to pile up a mound of sod. After we did this we started to where the United States Land Office was at Humbolt, to file our claims. As soon as we got our papers for our claims, we loaded our wagons with enough lumber to build us a frame shanty and started back to our newly claimed land.

We built our shanty which was about eight feet by ten, made one door and one window in it. It had a cotton wood foundation hewed out of cotton wood logs. A little later we cut enough logs to build us two log houses. We got the logs, which were about eight inches in diameter from timber which grew on an island of about thirty acres, just south of our claims. There was no other timber for miles around. The Arkansas River at that time was about one-fourth of a mile wide with the banks full of water, so we had to float our logs across the river.

We finished our log houses, we built a log stable, dug a well and then got ready for buffalo hunting. We spent the first summer and fall hunting, fishing and putting up hay for our pony, mule and three yoke of oxen, which we had bought to break prairie. We cut our hay with a scythe and raked it with a pitch fork.

One day while we were making hay, two soldiers came by. They had evidently deserted the Army at Fort Larned. They wanted to trade

their uniforms for some of our old clothes. We bought a Springfield rifle for five dollars from them. So after that we had a good breach loading gun that we could shoot "clean" thru a buffalo. One time Dep killed two at one shot with this gun.

Late in the fall, I remember I went with four men on a hunting trip. They were Ed Darington, Tom Smith, E. P. B. Weir*, and Tom Cross (Dep had to stay behind to look after things at home). We left with two wagons and found the buffalo near the Minnesacah River. Ed Darington and I walked and crawled up a draw to get right close to them. We shot and killed seven before we quit shooting. They didn't seem to know where the shooting came from. When they smelled the blood from the first one, they just bellowed and pawed in the dirt. That afternoon we skinned and cut up the meat and loaded our wagons and started for home early the next day. We went by the "Seven Soldier Boys Camp" which was where seven soldier boys had taken claims. They were crippled from the Civil War, some were minus an arm, some a leg or crippled in other ways. Dep and I had met these boys before when we went to Humbolt to file our claims. They had two yoke of oxen and a new wagon. They had built a big double log house and covered it with poles and dirt. We often had some big times with them. This time, I remember one of the boys had cabbage for dinner and I thought it the best I had ever tasted. This soldier was J. P. Brown and lived at 1725 N. Lawrence (Broadway).

The same winter of '70-'71, ten men and I started with three ox teams and one horse team. We went about seventy-five miles north and west on the Walnut to where Great Bend is now. On our way we stopped one night to camp on the bank of the river and found some civilized Indians who were camped on the opposite side. We traded some of our provisions (flour, coffee, and sugar) for some buffalo hides which they had tanned.

We then went up the river and camped down under the bank, where there was a good deal of scrubby timber and brush. While we were camping here, there came a terrible blizzard. It snowed and the wind blew for three days, driving the buffalo all south. One bunch drifted right by our camp and we shot into them, but killed only one. We cut him up and had plenty of meat to last thru the blizzard. After the storm was over, we had to start back for home as our provisions were getting rather low. The snow then was about a foot deep on the level. The first night we camped below Old Fort Zarah, which the Government had put up for their stock at the Fort. They had abandoned the Fort and the stacks were left. Horse and cattle thieves were using the Fort. We cleaned off the snow and made our beds down on the south side of the stacks. About midnight there came up another blizzard and we nearly froze to death. Our stock drifted off to the river in the brush, so the next morning we had to look for our stock. We hitched up and drove seven miles to a little bunch of timber before we could get breakfast because we had to find wood before we could make a fire. Going such a long distance with snow a foot deep, without any breakfast and no road, wasn't any fun. However, we built a fire and soon got warmed up.

The same Indians were camped across the river that we had traded with about a week before. We bought some buffalo hides from them and started out for home again. When we got down to about forty miles above where Hutchinson is now (between Cow Creek and the Big River) we saw lots of northern buffalo. We killed enough to load our wagons.

The same winter I stayed home while Dep and Sam Bull took our pony team and went up the Big River below old Fort Zarah to hunt buffalo for hide and meat, also to get gray wolves, called Loboos, for their pelts. They used strychnine to poison the wolves. They established camp and one afternoon walked across the river which was frozen over, to put out poison for the Loboos. When they returned their ponies were gone. They had been stolen by the den of thieves which were located at Fort Zarah. The robbers just took the team, leaving the wagon and load of meat which Dep and Sam had already killed. The only thing now for them to do was to go home after an ox team to pull the wagon back. They cooked a lot of biscuits in a "Dutch" oven and fried some buffalo meat. Then Sam Bull, loaded down with provisions and two buffalo hides for a bed, set out on foot for home, a distance of seventy-five miles, cold weather and no roads to follow.

On the morning of the third day he arrived at our place and told me the news. As soon as we could get ready, we started in a wagon with three yoke of oxen. It took us three days to go, arriving there on the third day about ten at night. The only marker we had was a little clump of cotton wood trees, the first timber the other side of our place. When we got to this timber, we began calling to Dep. At last he heard us and answered. He was mighty glad to see us since he had been there a whole week without any company excepting his dog "Dollar". He had spent his time hunting and salting down the meat which they had killed. There were two wagon loads of meat and hides of all kinds excepting skunk hides. We pulled across to Cow Creek, where Hutchinson is now, and camped a few days. Dep and Sam Bull went back to look for the pony and mule as some men we met on the road told us they saw them at Fort Zarah.

Dep and Sam Bull got back, but didn't find the ponies. We killed a few more buffalo and pulled for home. We had run out of flour meal and had to live on buffalo meat. We called the liver and heart "bread". We lived on meat and parched corn for about a week and my but did I get hungry.

When we got home we filled a big dug-out with meat and smoked it. About the middle of February, 1871, Sam Bull and I loaded up this meat and hooked up to the best yoke of oxen we had and started for Fort Scott. On the first day about sun down one of the oxen gave out and that happened nearly every day after that. They were pretty weak as they hadn't had any grain all winter. The snow was melting fast and this caused the rivers to swell, so when we got to White River, we had to wait until the river went down before we could cross.

I was in an awful hurry because I wanted to get to Fort Scott, the nearest railroad, so I could take the train to Windsor, Missouri, to see brother, Bud and sister Parry married, but I didn't make it to the wedding. The day they were married I was only as far as Eureka. I decided to go back home with Sam Bull. We sold our meat for 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ a pound and bought molasses, sugar, coffee and flour. Then we started on our way. We got there about the middle of March and found Dep breaking sod with a yoke of oxen and a twelve inch breaking plow. That was about the extent of my experience with buffalo.

Well boys, you no doubt wonder what I did next. A man from Texas

wintered his cattle with us. His name was T. J. Anderson. He gave me a job for the winter and later made me "Boss Herder" for fifty dollars per month. I held this position for three years and then I got two hundred Texas cattle of my own and I stayed with the cattle business until I "busted". Thats All.
