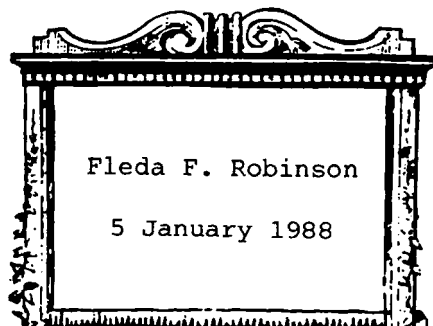

GENEALOGY AND KANSAS SCHOOLS

Records maintained through the educational system of Kansas provide a valuable source of genealogical information for the researcher. Within a particular school district, pupils named on the early school rolls were usually siblings, relatives, or neighbors who might have intermarried in later years. Generally, all the early school reports will give the name, age and sex of a child. Records of private and boarding schools, universities, and other educational institutions, such as schools maintained by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, will often provide more information than the public schools, which were established to ensure all Kansas children would receive an education at public expense.

Free schools had been formed in Kansas territory as early as ten years prior to the organization of the territory under the Kansas-Nebraska Act of 1854. John M. Armstrong, in 1844, had opened a school in present day Kansas City, Kansas for the Wyandots, funded under the Wyandot treaty of 1842, where white children were admitted free of charge. With the proslavery and free-state forces embroiled in a struggle for control of the territory, it was 1858 before the creation of the office of Territorial Superintendent of Common Schools.

In addition to a Superintendent of Schools, whose duties were mainly clerical, the territorial legislature created the office of county superintendent to certify teachers. A year later the county superintendents were authorized to organize school districts in the territory. By the close of the territorial period, there were an estimated 480 organized school districts and 24,000 school children in the Kansas territory.

When Kansas became a state in 1861, the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction was included among the elective officers. At the county level, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, or county superintendent, was reinstituted as an elective official with authorization to continue organizing school districts. The only instructions given to the county superintendent was to divide the county into a convenient number of school districts and to change the boundaries of the districts when necessary. No district, however, could have less than fifteen school children. Schoolhouses in each district were, in general practice, built at two mile intervals, within walking distance of most of the pupils.

Cities of the first class, with populations over fifteen thousand, had a separate school district as did cities of the second class whose populations were between two thousand and fifteen thousand. Third class cities, with populations of two hundred fifty to two thousand, were included entirely within a district. By 1893 there were five cities of the first class in Kansas: Topeka, Wichita, Atchison, Leavenworth, and Kansas City. Of the second class, there were about forty.

Schools were open to children between the ages of five and twenty one. Attendance was not compulsory until 1874 when an

act was passed requiring all children between eight and fourteen years to attend a public or private school. In 1903 the law was changed to between eight and fifteen years or have completed the eighth grade. The law, however, was probably not enforced until truant officers were appointed in each district with power to take the offenders to court.

In the school districts, teachers needed a diploma or certificate to teach. The Board of Education was organized in 1873 to issue state diplomas and state certificates which entitled recipients to teach anywhere in Kansas.

County certificates were an alternative but valid for a limited area and time. A certificate of the first grade, good for three years, was issued when an applicant was at least eighteen years old, had taught twelve months, and passed an examination, prepared by the State Board of Education, with an average of ninety percent. For a two year certificate, second grade applicants must be over seventeen, have taught three months, and passed a similar examination with an average of 80 percent. There were no qualifications for a certificate of the third grade, in effect for one year, except those required by the individual counties.

During the territorial period, yearly reports were incomplete as most counties did not file reports. In 1861, when Kansas became a state, the basic reporting system for annual reports was established by law. Reporting was still inadequate until 1870 when the county superintendents purchased record books for the district teachers and other officials, and state funds were withheld from districts not filing their reports.

Annually, the teachers turned in reports to the district clerks who, in turn, reported to the county superintendents who reported to the State Superintendent. Among the items included in the reports was an annual census of all persons, between the ages of five and twenty one and their sex, in the district. In 1903 the annual census was changed to include the address, date of birth and parent or guardian of each child enumerated.

In researching school records, the early records, particularly in rural areas, may be difficult to locate or no longer in existence. The first place to check is the county courthouse. Records of the county superintendent are in the office of the Register of Deeds. There you should find reports of the county superintendents, school census records, school district boundary maps and teachers' certificates registers. Also check with the county clerk for any school maps or records.

Other places to check are the archives of the present school district, local libraries and archives, university archives, historical societies, and historical museums. Ask the local school board where the early records are located.

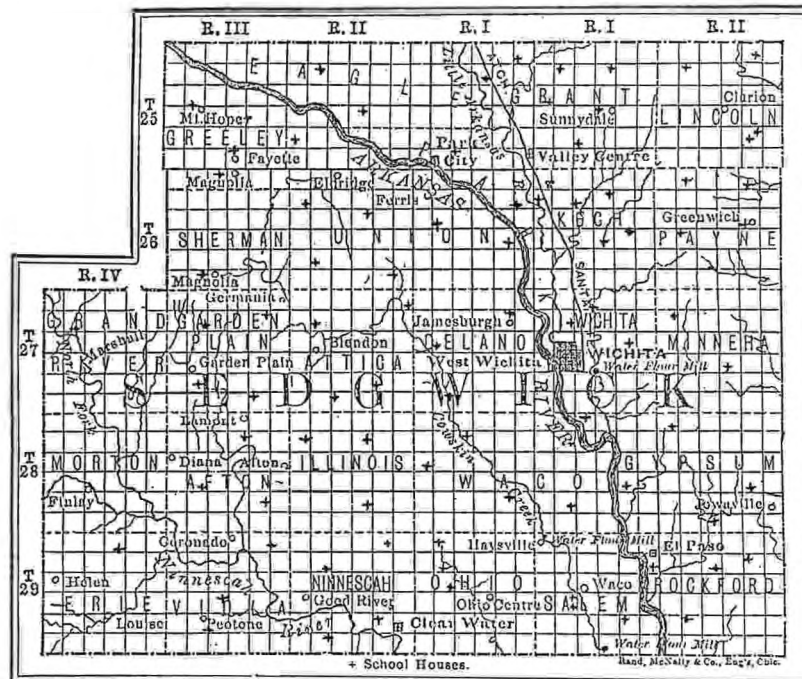

FOLKS AND PHYSIOGRAPHY, PART II

An area of about thirty five square miles in the southeastern corner of Cherokee County comprises the Kansas portion of the Ozark Plateau [see map in preceding issue, p. 119]. The rock layers here are of Mississippian age, about 350 million years old and are limestone containing beds or layers of chert. This is a rather flat upland area which, continued eastward, rises into the higher Ozark "Mountains" in southern Missouri. The land surface is littered with chert fragments; insoluble remnants remaining from long dissolved limestone. This makes farming difficult. The edge of the Ozark Plateau here generally follows the course of the Spring River.

The Ozark Plateau is bordered to the west and northwest by the Cherokee Lowlands, a topographically lower erosional plain composed of bedded sandstone, shale and siltstone of the Cherokee Group, which represent a series of river deltas deposited about 270 million years ago. The deltas and swampy coastal environment, near the Equator at that time, fostered growth of luxuriant jungles. The vegetal accumulation was covered with sand and mud and eventually was converted to coal. There are twenty beds of coal which contain mineable reserves in Kansas (Brady, et al, p. 29). Of these, nine are found in the Cherokee Lowland counties where over 200 million tons of coal have been mined during the past century.

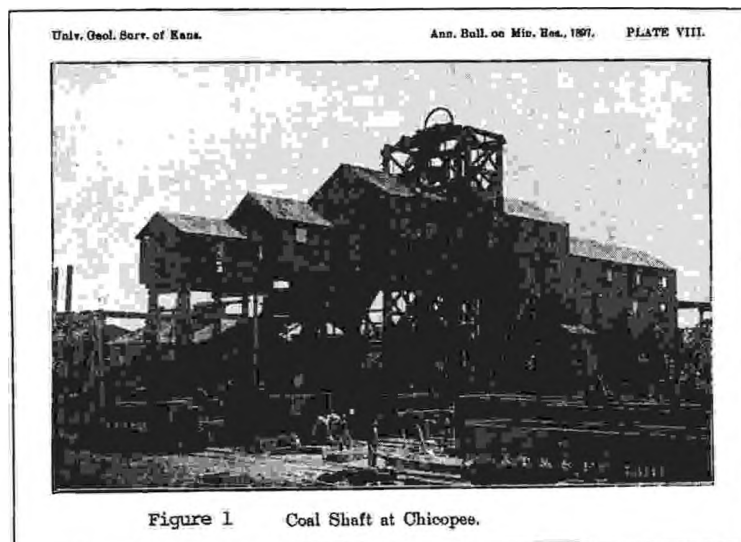
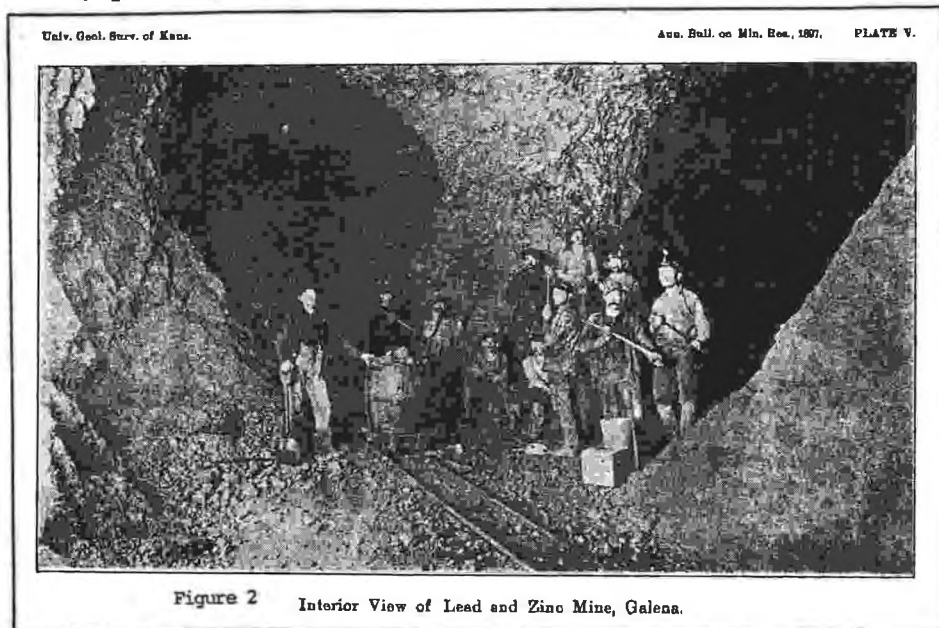


Figure 1 Coal Shaft at Chicopee.

Strip mining was practiced before the Civil War and Kansas' first shaft mine was opened in 1874 by the four Scammon brothers of Illinois near the present town of Scammon in Cherokee County (Rydjord, p. 76). In 1877, the first steam shovel used in mining in the United States was employed at the Hoges-Armil Coal Co. mine near Pittsburg in Crawford County (Abernathy, p. 216). For over a half century underground mining was more profitable than strip mining. As late as 1920, strip mining produced only 11.7 percent of all coal mined in Kansas with 625 workers employed in 27 mines. The remaining 88.3 percent of Kansas' coal was from 282 shaft mines (Figure 1) worked by 9,709 men (Schoewe, 1958, p. 283). It was not until 1931 that strip mine production exceeded shaft mines (Brady, 1974, p. 12). The last underground coal mine in Kansas stopped operating in 1964 (Brady, 1974, p. 41). Underclays associated with coal helped create an important brick industry in southeastern Kansas. This industry was fueled by coal and natural gas, another product of those ancient, buried swamps.

The other important mineral resources in these two regions of southeastern Kansas were lead and zinc. These metals were implaced during a period of

earth movement and mountain building which occurred during the Pennsylvanian age. The movement fractured the limestones of the Ozark Plateau region and injected mineral bearing fluids. The resulting ore deposits were worked apparently in the 1830s in Linn County by French prospectors who mined only some fifty tons of lead ore (Schoewe, 1958, p. 418). Commercial lead was first discovered near the town of Galena in the 1860s and near Baxter Springs in 1866. Zinc was found in the same area in 1870 by Billy Cook (Schoewe, 1958, p. 420) but was ignored in favor of the search for lead. There were several abortive mining efforts in the early 1870s but real activity began in 1877 when commercial ore deposits were found on Short Creek near Galena (Figure 2) in limestones at depths between 150 to 400 feet (Berendsen, p. 68). Within a month after the discovery, 10,000 people had entered the area (Schoewe, 1958, p. 421).



The discovery and development of Kansas' lead and zinc deposits fortuitously coincided with the development of a need for those products on a national scale. Clark (1970, p. 25) notes that "cities replaced the railroads as the primary markets for industrial goods." In the post-Civil War period to 1900, urban areas underwent electrification and the introduction of central and interior plumbing on a large scale. This "modernization" caused an unprecedented demand for lead, zinc and copper, and Kansas' share of primary zinc rose from 24 percent of national production in 1890, to 50 percent in 1900, to 57 percent in 1904 (Clark, p. 18). Zinc and lead mining ended in Kansas in 1969. The market value of the metals during the 92 years of mining and milling exceeded half a billion dollars.

This development occurred in the same area as Kansas' rapidly growing coal industry which was predominately in Crawford and Cherokee Counties. Such activity called for many miners and mill workers for difficult, dirty, low paying jobs. In 1908, 51 percent of brick and tile workers earned less than \$10.00 per week; 69 percent of the zinc workers less than \$15.00. The cost of living in Crawford and Cherokee Counties was around \$44.00 per month at about that time (Clark, p. 105). Clark (p. 104), however, notes that between 1900 and 1914, annual wages in the cement industry increased over 200 percent as well as by over 60 percent in the glass, clay and zinc industries. Attempts

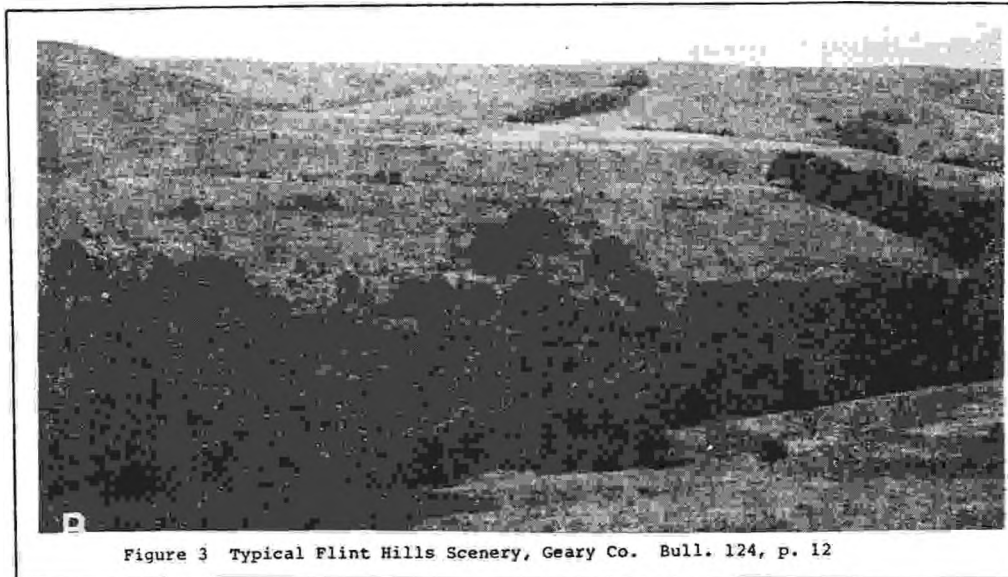
to form workers unions were not very successful as both management and the court system opposed the unions. Management, in some areas, imported Mexicans and trains of Black laborers from Alabama to use as strike-breakers. The number of Kansas residents born in Mexico rose from 71 in 1900, to 8,429 in 1910, to 13,770 in 1920. During the same period, the numbers of Black Kansans grew from 31,763, to 36,196, to 42,096 (Clark and Roberts, pp. 210, 212). This is not indicative that all Mexican and Black immigrants were miners or strike breakers but many were attracted by the mining industry. The concentration of Italians and Yugoslavians in the mining area was mentioned in Part I. Crawford and Cherokee Counties, in 1910, were respectively the fourth and seventh most populous counties in the state (Clark and Roberts, p. 251).

The Chautauqua Hills are a narrow, hilly, upland which occupy eastern Chautauqua and Elk Counties and extend into the southern adjacent corners of Greenwood and Woodson Counties. The area is sculpted from Pennsylvanian age sandstones belonging to the Douglas Group which places them at the base of the upper Pennsylvanian series of rocks in Kansas. These sandstones, which are exposed in roadcuts along about nineteen miles of U.S. highways 160 and 166, are remnants of river deltas washed into ancient oceans by rivers running northward from the Arbuckle and Ouachita Mountains of southern Oklahoma. Cedars and various species of oak trees thrive on sandstone and are abundant in the Chautauqua Hills. The towns of Oak Valley and Cedarvale take their names from the numbers of those trees thereabout.

Town names in the Chautauqua Hills indicate settlers of predominantly Illinois or German background. According to Rydjord (1972), Peru and Niotaze both are named from towns in Illinois (a "ze" was added to "Niota" to avoid confusion with Neola in Labette County); Sedan and nearby Metz were named by German settlers to commemorate events in the then recent Franco-Prussian War; and Chautauqua, town and county, drew the name from the same in New York. By 1880, after native Kansans, there were more native Illinoisians in Kansas than persons from any other state, and Germans comprised 25 percent of Kansans of foreign nativity, having doubled their numbers since 1870 (Clark and Roberts, p. 210). The population densities of both Elk and Chautauqua Counties increased eightfold from 1870 to 1880; grew respectively 14.7 and 11.0 percent more by 1890, their peak year, then slowly declined. By 1980, the population of both counties was less than half the 1930 census and roughly a third of the 1890 level. The population decrease is reflected by urbanization throughout the state. The area comprising the Chautauqua Hills was predominately agricultural from initial settlement. The preponderance of non-agricultural jobs were found in nearby Montgomery and Cowley Counties as the energy, glass and brick industries grew. During the 1940s, World War II accelerated movement away from farmland.

The Flint Hills Uplands, possibly the most publicized part of Kansas, occupy a north-south strip varying from ten to seventy five miles in width and extending, at the western edge of the Osage Cuestas, from the Oklahoma border to the southeastern corner of Washington County. As noted, surface rocks in Kansas are progressively younger to the west and the Flint Hills are formed on Permian age rocks which were deposited about 210 million years ago. The topography is formed in much the same manner as the Osage Cuestas, differing only in that the limestone layers contain large amounts of chert or flint. Chert is an inclusive term for a tough microcrystalline silica rock deposited or formed in sediments. Flint is generally regarded as a dark colored chert. The chert or flint, being composed of silica, is far less

soluble than the enclosing limestone. As the limestone weathers away, the remaining chert inclusions remain as gravel on the surface and help retard weathering of the underlying limestone. Consequently, erosion is deterred so the Flint Hills are higher topographically than adjacent areas and present a rocky surface not as well fitted for crop agriculture. This has resulted in the Flint Hills' primary use as pasture land (Figure 3) and their preservation as the last large area of tall grass prairie in the United States (Wilson, p. 28).



As the population of Kansas moved westward, the proportion of people engaged in agriculture increased and became more ethnically diffused. The state continued to gain population from other states as well as from foreign immigration. Some laggards on the Santa Fe Trail may have stayed since the Flint Hills is traversed by that route with its well known jumping off point of Council Grove in Chase County. By 1930, native born Kansans comprised 64 percent of the population. Almost 189,000 were first generation Americans and approximately 81,000 were of foreign origin. Of all living native born Kansans, 39 percent had left and were living in other states.

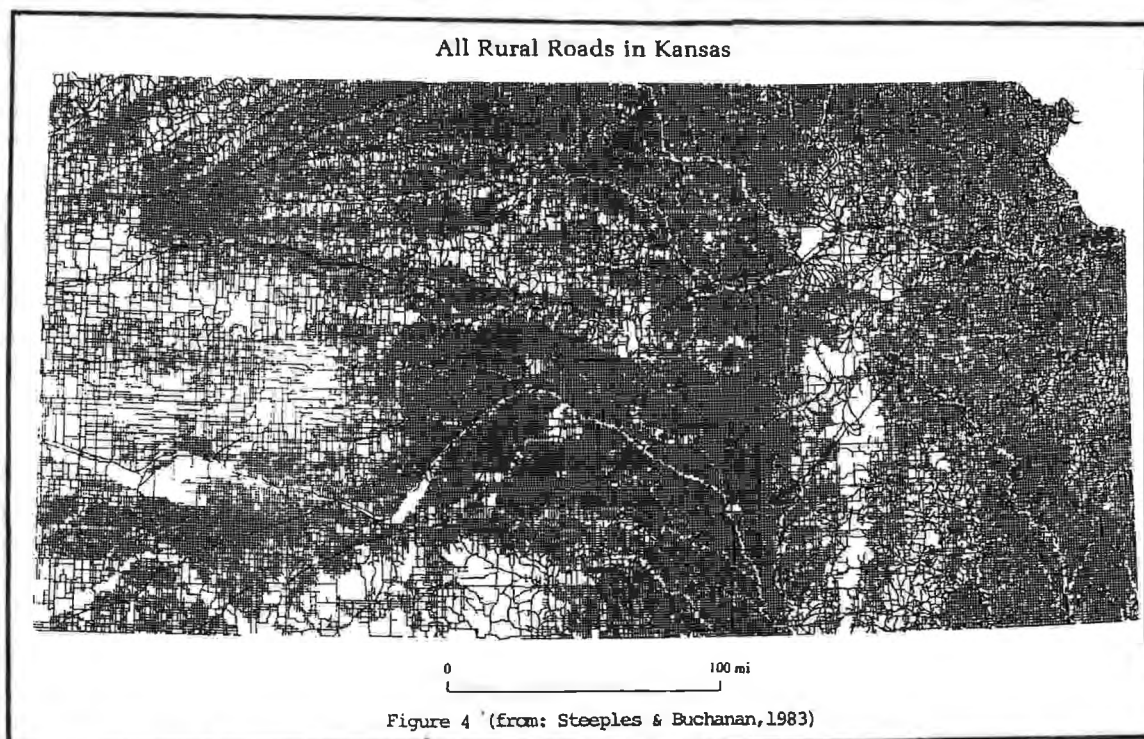
What of the Flint Hills? A scan of names on plat maps of five counties in the Flint Hills during the 1950s and 1960s show 46 percent German, 38 percent British Isles, 11 percent Scandinavian and 5 percent Slavic surnames (note that these figures which total 100 percent are only of the sample and not of the entire population of this area). Again, town names reflect origins of settlers. Poland (Chase County) and Poleska, an early name for Manhattan, (Rydjard, p. 195) obviously reflect Polish roots. Neva, in Chase County, owes its name to the Neva River in northwestern Russia; and Alma, in Wabaunsee County, was named for the Alma River in the Crimea by Russian veterans of the Crimean War of the 1850s. Pilsen in Marion County is named for the town of the same name (now Plzen) in the western Bohemian section of Czechoslovakia. Moscow, also in Marion County, was named by Mennonites to honor Russia for hosting them in their long trek to Kansas.

Population of the nine county area comprising most of the Flint Hills increased rapidly from 1860 to 1890, held fairly steady through 1930 and has grown a bit in numbers since then. The 1930 population density was 23.35 persons per square mile and represented 9.9 percent of Kansas' population.

In 1980, the density was 29.59 per square mile which accounted for 9.5 percent of the state population.

Certain counties have experienced declines. Chase County reached its peak population in 1890 and has steadily declined since. Morris County has declined from its 1910 peak. Wabaunsee declined from a density of 16.1 in 1900 to 8.6 in 1980. Butler County decreased in population from 1890 to 1910, almost doubled between 1910 and 1920, due to the oil field boom, declined by 1930, and has since increased with the increasing urbanization of neighboring Sedgwick County. The greatest steady gain has been in Riley County which has increased every decade, except 1920 to 1930, since 1860. This probably is caused by the co-location of both Fort Riley and Kansas State University.

As noted, with the exception of the petroleum industry and the concentration of the military and educational facilities in the Riley-Geary County area, the predominant industry in the Flint Hills is agriculture. Schoewe (1949, p. 289) noted that the "Flint Hills Upland, south of the Kansas River . . . constitutes one of the finest grazing areas in the state if not elsewhere in the United States." This can be observed in Figure 4, which is a map of Kansas' roads prepared from space satellite photographs. The noticeable scarcity of roads in the Flint Hills is caused by the primary use as prairie pasture developed on a weathering resistant topography.



The influx of foreign immigrants populating the Flint Hills and farther west settled there because the eastern portion of the state was already "taken" and this area was being settled when they arrived (Clark and Roberts, p. 54). The railroads which were expanding into central and western Kansas even had agents overseas to sell land. Clark and Roberts (p. 54) attribute the presense of the Mennonites here as "largely a result of the efforts of the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad."

Whatever spurs people to move did so and the eastern third of Kansas was settled fairly quickly. The High Plains, Smoky Hills, Red Hills, and some

river lowlands remained to be settled and became the next and final step in populating Kansas. Those areas will be addressed in the final portion of this paper.

AERMOTOR WINDMILL CENTENNIAL

Continuing the article on Kansas windmills, MHGS Register (22:2:58-59), all windmill people are aware the Aermotor windmill is popular; not all know that it is a 100 year old company. Laverne W. Noyes began the manufacture of Aermotor in 1888, and in 1893 advised all Aermotor agents: "Aermotor is successful because we know what to do, how to do it and have the facilities to do it," and many different models indicate the many improvements.

Aermotor's dominance may have originated in 1882 when Thomas O. Perry began experiments to solve some early day problems on windpower and windmills, testing 65 windmills in several thousand tests. His conclusions were rejected by his employer, the U.S. Wind Engine and Pump Co of Batavia, IL, and several years passed before his suggested design improvements reached production in the Aermotor Co. mills in 1888.

Without Noyes' indomitable energy, inventive and business abilities, the windmill may have floundered. In 1888, 44 windmills were sold; 2,288 in 1889; 6,268 in 1890; 20,049 in 1891; and, at least 60,000 in 1892. For a number of years there were mechanical changes but from 1933 to 1981 (or ?) their 702 has been a tradition, just changing from red to green trim.

Aermotor Co. of Chicago existed until 1958 when it was left in trust to 48 colleges and universities. Motor Products Co. of Detroit was the owner in 1958 and in 1960 moved to Broken Arrow, OK. With other corporate changes, by 1969 the firm was in Buenos Aires, Argentina, S.A., and Conway, AK. In 1981, Valley Pump Div. of Valley Steel renewed the manufacture of Aermotor in America and in 1984 was acquired by Mueller Co. of Decatur, IL who became the Mueller Pump Co. and continues to manufacture the 802 in Conway, AK. And thus, the Aermotor has come full circle and is now a centurian. (Abstracted from the Windmillers Gazette (4:1) by T. Lindsay Baker, Canyon, TX.)

New Historical Society Director Appointed

The genealogical and historical community has an immediate interest in the appointment of the new State Historical Society director. Of first concern, naturally, is to have someone with an interest in, and a knowledge of, the archives. An ability to operate the state's historic possessions over the longer term, however, is where the real challenge lies.

Mr. Ramon S. Powers, a native Kansan, was recommended by a five member search team and was approved by the board for the position. He is considered an expert on the American Indian as well as Cholera on the Plains. Mr. Powers received all his formal education and has spent the most of his work time in state. Several positions in the instruction of history were held prior to joining the staff of the Kansas Legislature. He advanced to a position as principal analyst in the Kansas Legislative Research Department. This experience should prove most valuable in obtaining funds for the operation and expansion of the society's activities. A new home for the Research Center, the gathering point of the Kansas historian and genealogist, could be accelerated. -From the KSHS "Mirror", Jan. 1988.

KSHS RECEIVES SOLDIERS HOME RECORDS

Official state records from the Kansas State Soldiers Home at Fort Dodge, located a few miles east of Dodge City on highway KS 154, have been transferred to the Archives Department of the Kansas State Historical Society at Topeka. Destitute or disabled veterans from the Civil War through the Korean War resided at the home, along with their families. Included in the accession are documents dating from 1890 to the early 1970s covering admission, discharge and death records as well as minute books, accounting journals, a volume of school records of the veteran's children, and the records of the Mother Bickerdyke Home Annex at Ellsworth which merged with the Home in the 1950s. MARION COUNTY CULTURE

Raymond F. Wiebe, author of Hillsboro, Kansas, the City on the Prairie and compiler of the 1870 census of Marion County, Kansas serialized in the Register, shares the following on the cultural resources of Marion County: Marion, Peabody and Florence were founded by New Englanders; the French settled east of Florence; the Danish north of Peabody near Aulne; the Swedes east of Lost Springs; the Czechs near Pilsen; the Germans near Peabody, Lincolnville and Hillsboro; the Protestant Germans from Russia at Hillsboro, Lehigh, Durham, Tampa; and, the Dutch-Low German Mennonites at Hillsboro, Goessel, Lehigh, and Marion.

WHEN UP IS DOWN

An article, "Where IS the Shenandoah Valley?" published in the Nov-Dec 1987 Virginia Genealogical Society Newsletter, brings to mind a good research axiom: Know the geography of the area you are researching. While conventional rivers, the Mississippi River for example, run south, the Shenandoah River flows NORTH and empties into the Potomac River. Therefore, as far as the Shenandoah Valley is concerned, "those driving south to Staunton are going 'up' the valley (and the river) and those bound northward for Winchester or Washington are headed 'down'" both the valley and the river. If your ancestor settled down the valley from his parents, depending on the geography, he might have located to the north instead of the south.
