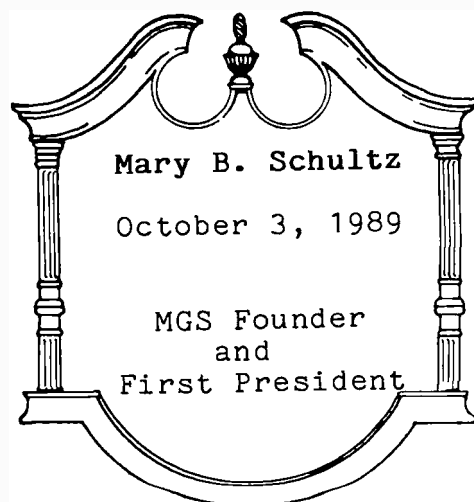

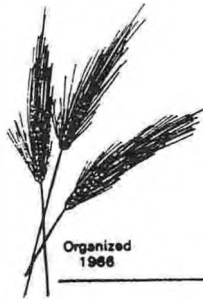

ABSTRACTS FROM "THE WICHITA CITY EAGLE"
Beginning April 12, 1872
Part I, section 2

Part I, section 1 was printed in the Midwest Historical and Genealogical Register, Vol. XXIV #1.

[Numbers in parentheses following abstract indicate (page, column).]

April 26, 1872

Mrs. William Smith's funeral was April 21, 1872. (3,1)

Harry Lindsay learned his trade in Scotland. (3,3)

Mary E. Smith, wife of William Smith, died Saturday, April 20, 1872. She and Mr. Smith had been married one year, and she leaves behind a baby. (3,3)

May 3, 1872

Mr. Abbott, an attorney in Oxford, was educated at Huron, Ohio. C. Willsie, an attorney in Oxford, was educated at Leonx College, Iowa, and at Fayette Iowa University. He was admitted to the bar at Paola, Kansas. Col. Knapp was educated at Alleghany College, Pennsylvania, and at Concord, New Hampshire Institution. He read the law at Williamsport and New York. (2,3&4)

Sumner Corbin died April 26, 1872. (2,5)

I. Albaugh moved to Hot Springs because of poor health. (3,1)

Mr. Mayfield was shot to death Saturday, April 27, 1872 in Wellington by Mr. Lynch. Mr. Lynch was hung on Monday in Caldwell by vigilantees. Also killed by vigilantees was Uncle Tommy Watson. [Mr. Watson was declared "hail and hardy in the May 10th paper.] (3,2)

When most of the moisture has evaporated, they may be pressed between sheets of white blotting paper weighted down by books and weights.

Records created before 1 July 1911 and held by city or county clerks and other officials may now be researched. Copies of birth and death certificates after 1911, marriages after 1 May 1913, and divorces granted after July 1951 are available from the State Dept. of Health and Environment, Bureau of Vital Statistics, Topeka, KS 66620 -- from the Prairie Pioneer Gen. Society.

Recently, the Midwest Historical and Genealogical Society was saddened by the passing of its founder and first president, Mrs. Mary B. Schultz of Wichita. Mrs. Shultz died on October 3.

The Midwest Genealogical Society began as the brainchild of Mrs. Schultz in 1966 while pursuing her own family "roots". To her surprise, many others also felt that the need for a genealogy organization in Wichita was long overdue.

Because of her determination, guidance, love and caring, the Midwest Historical & Genealogical Society has grown from a handful of people to a solid organization of nearly 700 members!

AN IDEA SNOWBALLS INTO MIDWEST GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, INC.

Have you ever been bitten by the "genealogy bug"? When you have been, you are frequently subject to brain storms. I had one of those brain storms last fall when the idea popped into my head that it would be interesting to have a genealogy study group. I visualized a small informal group of six or eight, who would meet in the home, exchange ideas and help each other.

A suggestion on the radio and a note in the Home Town News of Wichita Eagle brought a tremendous response. The telephone rang for days and everyone seemed really enthusiastic about the idea of such a study group. One man loaned a big stack of books and magazines on genealogy to me. These I read with consuming interest. Most people expressed a desire for a genealogical society here. Wichita is the largest city in Kansas and there was a feeling that we were long past due for such an organization.

I spent most of the next three months and some sleepless nights studying books from the library on the correct procedure for starting organizations. There seemed to be a formidable array of never ending steps and pitfalls in the process. For instance, there were constitution and by-laws, charters, seals, bonding, insurance, tax exempt status and special mailing rates, to name only a few.

After considering all the responsibilities involved, there were times when I almost got "cold feet" and was tempted to chuck the whole idea. After all who was I to be presumptuous enough to start such a big project? But then, when my spirits hit bottom, there was always someone to encourage me to accept the challenge. It is hard for me to resist a challenge.

Let me say here that, from the start of this idea, it has been fantastic the way doors have opened for us. Whenever there has been a real need a way has been provided.

I am of the firm conviction that, if you are going to have an organization, you should start right with a good solid foundation; then you are in a position upon which to build. It soon became apparent that we would need the services of a competent attorney and that it was advisable to incorporate.

One of those doors opened when, in considering the names of attorneys, one name rang a bell. I recalled that I had known Judge Kenneth Kimmel as a Dale Carnegie instructor. He had impressed me as a very capable and sincere person. In response to a call the Judge seemed genuinely interested in the idea of our society. He suggested that several of us come in to discuss this further with him. This we did, without obligation.

Next we had a committee meeting to draw up our by-laws. Finally on March 1, 1966, we took THE BIG STEP when Ann Adams, Judge Kenneth C. Kimmel and I signed as the original incorporators and applied for our state charter. The name Midwest Genealogical Society, Inc. was selected and a nominating committee was appointed.

March 17, 1966 was a red letter day in the history of our society. On this date an organizational meeting was held in my home. Shamrocks were much in evidence although I am sure the Irish were outnumbered. Judge Kimmel was there to show us our new charter and seal and to read the by-laws which were adopted. Following this we had election of officers and board members.

Judge Kimmel had shown so much interest in our project and had contributed so graciously of his time and knowledge that we, as a token of our appreciation, voted unanimously to make him a Lifetime Charter Member of our society. He has since been elected as a member of the board.

On May 26, 1966 at our regular monthly meeting, Judge Kenneth C. Kimmel was presented a certificate of Lifetime Charter Membership in the Midwest Genealogical Society, Inc. This certificate was hand lettered by a nationally prominent Indian artist, Black Bear Bosin. This was presented as an expression of our deep gratitude for the many courtesies that Judge Kimmel had extended to our society.

Our next major need was for a place to hold monthly meetings. A place large enough to give our membership an opportunity to grow. Again a door seemed to open and this need was supplied. Although meeting places are very difficult to obtain, we were fortunate enough to secure the lovely Blue Room of the Southwest National Bank, thanks to their courtesy. The same was true of our board meeting room at the Southwest Federal Savings and Loan Association. When we were ready to start classes the beautiful Board of Directors Room at the Kansas State Bank, complete with massive tables and a blackboard was perfect for our needs. We are indeed grateful for these accommodations.

Our library program hit a temporary snag when our very efficient librarian Pat Fineout moved to Topeka. We want to thank all of you who have been "pinch hitting" for us at the library the last few weeks. We will soon have our new library program organized and will have someone at the city library one afternoon a week to help beginners with their genealogy. With our new city library opening this fall, we indeed have much to look forward to.

November general meeting will be a special dinner meeting at the Y.M.C.A. This will be one of the highlights of the year; an opportunity for husbands and wives to attend together and a chance for all to become better acquainted. Plans for the program are in the making. I am sure our program chairman Vera Brown has some surprises "up her sleeve". Be sure to mark a big circle around Friday, November 18th on your calendar. We will keep you informed as plans progress.

Looking back over the last five months it appears we have made outstanding progress. Just to chalk up a few of our accomplishments:

1. We have had a June newsletter and this is our first quarterly magazine. We plan to improve this as time and finances permit until we have a top publication.

2. May 13th and 14th a very successful garage sale was held at the home of Betty Flory. Goldie Swartsfager, chairman of the ways & means committee, was assisted by Judy Somers and Pam Medlam. They did an excellent job of planning the sale. Everyone "pitched in" to help make this a real success. We are planning another garage sale soon.

3. We have paid a substantial part of the cost of incorporating. We have some ambitious plans for the future that include among other things the purchase of our own printing machine.

4. Arietta Gage, our editor and very capable instructor, has been teaching our classes in genealogy. All members of the society are eligible and there is no charge for these classes.

5. Louise Brehm, our membership chairman, has really been "on her toes". In the past five months she has helped us almost triple our membership, which is an outstanding record; so we feel we are off to a flying start. All who join the first year will be charter members.

I am proud of the privilege to serve as your first president.

The opportunities ahead present a challenge that seems almost unlimited. Let's accept that challenge! We can dream big and then all work together to make those dreams a reality. Let us make our Genealogical Society one in the front ranks.

THE BUILDING OF A CITY.

By F. A. SOWERS.

The church was officered by such eminent moralists as Bill Hutchinson, Charley Schattner, who run the bon-ton, George Richards, an itinerant printer, Bill Dow, ("Rattlesnake Bill") a trade fallen Cincinnati gambler and John Edwin Martin, whose chief aim in life was to get somewhere, where he could not be found by the citizens of the place he last emigrated from. All the above gentleman were legally installed vestrymen, duly arrayed in the

long spotlessly white vestry robes at each service. They sang in the choir, assisted at the sacrament and took up the collection, while being watched

with a degree of anxiety by the contributors that was possibly the birth of the expression, "now you see it, now you don't;" plainly portrayed in each vestryman's face as he would get dangerously near the door, in his rounds.

It was while the church was so officered that a citizen, who had donated the lot upon which the church edifice stood, proposed to swap for another site

further away, and some of the officers thought, in an inferior location. The result was a Sunday afternoon service meeting, with all present, when the

matter was fully discussed and upon which occasion as the "pros and cons" waxed warm Wm. Bloomfield Hutchinsou arose, radiant in his spotless garments, and said in that smooth, bland, and

child-like manner so characteristic of the man: "I don't care a d—n what the other officers of the church propose to do, but I am in emphatic opposition to seeing any cuss cheat Jesus Christ out of a foot of ground so long as I have power to interpose." The rest, after a time, fell sedately into Hutch's opinion, the matter was quietly dropped, and church was out.

In July, 1870, Wichita was incorporated as a town, with the following of-

ficers: C. A. Stafford, Chris T. Pierce, Ed. Smith, Uncle Jack Peyton and Morgan Cox, trustees; H. E. Van Trees, police magistrate; Ike Walker, marshal.

The 3rd day of April, 1871, the town was merged into a city of the third class, with Dr. E. B. Allen, mayor; Councilmen: W. B. Hutchinson, S. C. Johnson, Chas. Schattner, Dr. Fabrique, Geo. Schlichter and Geo. Van-

tilburgh. D. C. Hackett was appointed city attorney. H. E. Van Tres police judge, and Mike Meagher, marshal.

W. C. Woodman and Son opened the first monied institution in 1871 as a loaning office, running in connection

a general merchandise business.

Out of their loan office several years afterwards, grew the Arkansas Valley Bank, now defunct.

The Wichita Bank was opened in, 1871. J. C. Fraker was its Pres.; J. R. Mead, Vice-Pres.; A. H. Gosard, Cashier.

The next year it was chartered as a National Bank, and erected the then best business block in the city, the building on the corner of Main and First street. The county made this bank its depository, and when the

bank failed got the building for the county funds then on deposit.

The Wichita Savings Bank was organized in, 1872, with E. M. Clark of Leavenworth, Pres.; Sol H. Kohn, Vice-Pres.; and A. A. Hyde, formerly of Clark's bank, Leavenworth, Cashier. It was incorporated in the fall of 1882 as a National Bank and failed in 1895. In 1872, Wichita, by the efforts of our representatives at

Topeka, was made a city of the second class, so rapid had been its growth. E. B. Allen

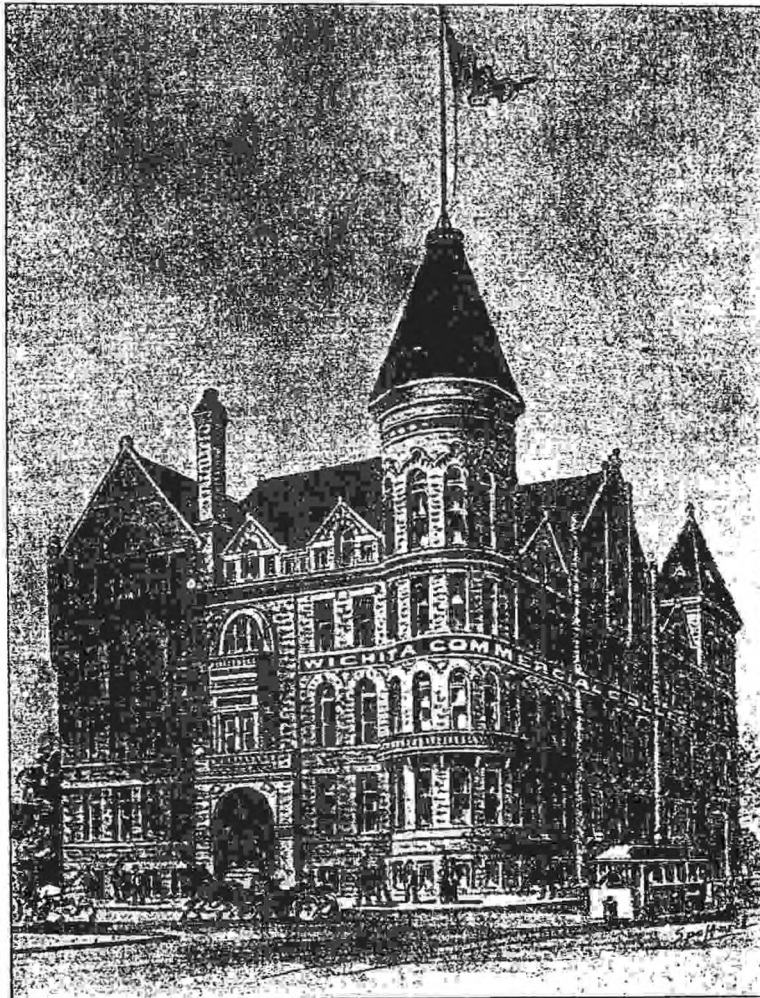


THE SEDGWICK BLOCK.

was re-elected Mayor: Mike Meagher Marshal; Wm. Baldwin City Attorney; Chas. A. Phillip Treasurer; J. M. Atwood Police Judge.

During this year the structure spanning the Arkansas River at the west end of Douglas Ave., since remodeled

Moore, Hills & Kramer, J. C. Fraker, and other "North enders," who forced it to be sold, by constructing a free bridge near the junction of the two rivers, somewhere in the vicinity of Griswold Park. The county thus bought what was called the Hobson

and improved, was built at a cost of \$27,000. The bridge was built by W. J. Hobson, contractor, and paid for by a joint stock company, organized for the purpose. The bridge nearly paid for itself in tolls the first year, and would have made the company rich, had it not been for the pluck of Lank

bridge and abolished tolls.

The "Cattledrive" came in hot about this period in 1872. Wichita was the thriftiest and most uproarious town between the two seas.

Large sign boards were posted up at the four conspicuous entrances into town (Jas. G. Hope was then mayor),

bearing the strange device—
 "Everything goes in Wichita;
 leave your revolvers at police
 headquarters and get a check."

After the close of the cattle
 drive in the winter 1873 began the
 changes that wrought so much to
 upbuild Wichita and astonish
 people everywhere throughout
 the west and south at its marvel-
 ous growth and the wonderful
 zeal and enterprise of its busi-
 ness men. This brings us to the
 second advent in the history of
 Wichita—its "boom period."

The cause that led us to the
 "boom" have been variously esti-
 mated, most of these estimates
 wandering far from the truth.

Wichita's boom began in a very
 small way. One Mr. Morris, of
 New Haven, Connecticut, a man
 of wealth and business foresight,
 came this way. He saw what
 had already been done towards
 upbuilding, and getting an in-
 sight into the energy of the people of
 Wichita, concluded it was the best
 point in the west to invest money. He
 was the more easily led into this opin-
 ion owing to the location of Wichita,
 geographically, the centering of vast

railroad systems at this point and its
 already out-reaching trade. He
 bought largely and started others to
 doing the same, and out of this small
 beginning came the unexampled devel-
 opment of the boom period.
