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### CHRISTMAS IN KANSAS - A CENTURY AGO!



Christmas in Kansas in the early 1900s was a mix of traditions and family values brought by various immigrants from their homelands. Gifts were usually handmade – lace border hankies, wooden toys, dresses, scarves, shirts, pants, cards to send to family and lots of food for the official Christmas dinner.

Christmas trees were cut down from nearby farm fields and brought into the home while strings of popcorn were sewn together and placed carefully around paper ornaments made by the children in the household. Pine cones, long and colorful ribbons were strategically placed to bring color into the hearth room. Many homes were still using lit candles on trees (even though it was dangerous) and stockings were filled with nuts, fruit and candy.

The Christmas dinner was a family affair and if no family was close then neighbors were invited to join in the holiday celebrations. The main course was usually turkey, goose, chicken or ham. Potatoes were a staple, especially for Irish families and desserts like pies, cakes, gingerbreads and even fruitcakes were growing in popularity (why I don't know!)

Families most often celebrated with church services. Christmas caroling around the neighborhood was a welcome sight and if the weather was cold, the carolers would be invited in for a cup of hot chocolate or hot tea! Many times, the carolers were accompanied by musicians who were carrying accordions, trumpets, clarinets and yes, cymbals on occasion to mark their finale. Often families would join in the singing before the carolers would move on carrying their lanterns before street lights were installed.

Christmas post cards, like the 1904 postcard above, became popular due to short messages that could be written on the back and the cost of sending them to love ones would only cost a penny. May the spirit of Christmas of years gone by be with you and your family this year – may you be blessed abundantly with health, love and peace in the New Year!
