Capt. Folks, of the Sumner county *Press* was in our city last Saturday and of course called on the EAGLE. The Captain is one of those warm-hearted, whole-souled fellows that has a faculty of making everybody around him happy. He is well pleased with the move he made with his paper.

Alexander Caldwell U. S. S. (which was) honored our city with his presence one day last week. Mr. Caldwell has turned his attention to stock raising, and the study of the narrow gauge system. He has eschewed politics, and become an honest tiller of the soil.

Parties raising grapes can have them delivered here fresh from the vineyard, by sending him your orders.

The last newspaper venture coming with our exchanges is the Junction City *Tribune*, published by H. M. Fery and Tho. Alvord. Mechanical execution could not be better, if they would not use such large and heavy faced type in their advertisements. Editorially, it is good. Both of these gentlemen have had large experience in newspaper publishing in this state. We wish them success.

Politics are the dulcet topic of conversation on our streets. Biblical quorums, i.e. "where two or three are gathered together, etc.,," may be seen on the street corners from early morn till dewy eve, speculating on the results of the forthcoming contest. As far as heard from, forty-seven generous

hearted, able bodied men have expressed their willingness to serve the dear people in any capacity they may be called upon to fulfill.

Our most successful wheat growers give it as their experience that fall wheat must be sown, or drilling is better, early, in order to secure a good crop, say from the 25th of August to the 10th of September. Then the time is close at hand for their sowing of fall grain. Each farmer should endeavor to sow enough at least for his own home consumption. Some give it as reason for not sowing wheat that there are no flouring mills; but we have no doubt whatever that as soon as there is a sufficient amount of wheat grown in the county to justify a flouring mill, there will be one built.

A custom prevails in our hotels, when Texas men go to their camps, for them to register "out," and "returned," on their arrival. A few days ago a "pilgrim" from down east scanned the register in the Douglas Avenue. Then let it not appear that we are behind any other county in enterprise.




WICHITA HAD A REAL white Christmas in 1872. Ground and buildings were buried under a heavy coat of snow and the mercury stood at three degrees below zero. This excessive cold made it possible for wagons to cross the Arkansas river anywhere on the ice, making it unnecessary to use the Douglas avenue ford. There was an epidemic of frozen fingers and toes among the drivers of the slow ox teams and in many homes here there was anxiety over the fate of buffalo hunters to the west who had been overtaken by the storm. Santa Claus arrived at the celebration in the Methodist church. There was a Christmas tree at the church. There was a super-abundance of meat, 50 teams loaded with buffalo meat arrived from the western hunting areas.

Acres of Buffalo Hides Were Cured Near Wichita in 1872

Early Reports Give That Year as the One Most Destructive to Herds of Bison

HIDES from slaughtered buffalo were stretched out to dry over acres of ground near Wichita in 1872. This situation was described by a writer in *The Eagle* during the year as follows: "Thousands upon thousands of buffalo hides are brought in here by hunters. In places whole acres of ground are covered with these hides, spread out to dry. It is estimated that there is, south of the Arkansas and west of Wichita, from one to two thousand men shooting buffalo for their hides alone. Is it any wonder that the red man sometimes protests against this wanton destruction of his cattle." Most of the hides dried in and around Wichita were shipped to eastern markets by rail.



The Minneha postoffice will be kept hereafter at the house of E. Pierpont, the postmaster.

A tri-weekly back line between this place and Wellington will be started in a few days.

The blacksmith shop east of Pearce's stable is covered with cedar shingles from the Medicine Lodge.

Taflin's train of prairie schooners, drawn by long horns, has returned and is again loading with supplies.

We are sorry to record the death of Charles L., little son of W. W. and M. H. Magie, aged twenty-three months.

The Newton *Kansan* comes to us now a genuine newspaper. We congratulate friend Asbaugh upon the improvement.

Mr. Clugsdon, of Topeka, formerly of Wichita, came down to pay his old partners, Millis & Stem, and his many friends, a visit.

W. F. Stevens found and left at this office a due bill for \$24.65, given by Chas. Rath & Co. to John Blane. The owner can procure the same by calling for it.

The [Abilene] *Cattle Trail* comes to us this week with a large wood cut picture of L. M. Hunter's herd of Texas steers crossing the Arkansas river at Wichita, in 1870.

Among our enterprising merchants will be found R. C. Nixon, who keeps pace with the demands. Mr. Nixon is at present east, purchasing for the fall trade.

Professor Norton's lecture Tuesday evening was listened to by a large audience. The subject, "Recent discoveries in astronomy," was handled with marked ability.

From present indications a great many large droves of Texas cattle will be wintered in this valley next winter. In this way the farmers can find a market for their surplus of corn and hay.

We acknowledge the pleasure of a call from Col. Forney, the enterprising and wide-awake editor of the *Belle Plaine Democrat*. The farmers of Sumner are rejoicing over good crops already matured, and *Belle Plaine* is improving.

Jas. Bryden has sold both herds of his cattle, realizing a good profit. He has also contracted two thousand more to be delivered at Red river. He will start home in a few days. Profits on the whole will be about twelve thousand.

Some complaint reaches us from subscribers of the non-receipt of this paper. The paper has been issued and mailed regularly on time every week since its establishment, and where subscribers fail to get it we wish they would inform us.

A few more days and the lazy, dull summer will be past; fall, with its pleasant days and lively but interesting business, will begin. The spirit of business will revive, and many happy and joyous faces will receive it with a glad welcome.

The republishing of the premium list has crowded out a large amount of correspondence, editorials locals and other matter. We will be compelled to leave it out, and those desiring a list for reference would do well to save this number of the paper.

Mr. White, who contemplates establishing a paper at Oxford, paid his respects to this establishment this week. The people of our sister town will find Mr. W. an enterprising and agreeable gentleman if he should conclude to locate in their midst.

We thought we had made complete arrangements for a good report of the teachers' institute held here last week, but the report was not furnished us in time, much to our own disappointment, and, we fear, to others in this and adjoining counties.

The most satisfactory examination of teachers yet held in Sedgwick county took place at the close of the institute, on Friday afternoon, August 22d, at which the following certificates were issued: Two of the first-class, nine of the second and seven of the third. Total eighteen.

W. T. Jewett wintered quite a number of Texas cattle last winter and is making extensive preparation for doing the same this winter. He has secured about ten thousand bushels of corn for that purpose,

the most of which he raised himself. He is also putting up a large amount of hay.

A U. S. surveying party, numbering forty-odd, together with a newspaper correspondent and other attaches, who were encamped above town, were all arrested and brought before Esquire Mitchell on Monday last, for hooking roasting ears. The matter was settled by the payment of eighty dollars.

Mr. J. J. Sitton, notwithstanding all assertions to the contrary, is alive and kicking. He organized Gem grange in Park township, night before last, and expected to organize one in Delano last night. He is an earnest worker and doing much for the prosperity of the organization throughout the Southwest.

The firm of Cook & Adams, of the Blue Front, has been dissolved by mutual consent, as will appear elsewhere. Mr. L. F. Adams takes the store, and has gone east for a new stock of goods. On his way east he attended the great blooded stock sale of Andy Wilson, at which he purchased young thoroughbred bull [sic].

It runs in our judgment that Black & Corbett, at the diamond front, keep as choice and fresh lot of family groceries, and as cheap as can be found in any establishment in Wichita or elsewhere. No sham, no short weight, but honest dealings, is their motto, as their regular customers have long since found out. Give them a call.

The city council, so the city treasurer informs us, at their last meeting determined, after an examination of the finances and income of the city, that it would not be necessary to levy any city tax for the present year. Where is there a city in the west of the respectable size and proportions of Wichita, that can make such a showing?

In a letter to us, President Hoss, of the state Normal school, gives the following cheering information: "With pleasure I inform you that the number of applications of new students for admission to the Normal next term, is double that of last year at this date. Every room in the young ladies' boarding house is engaged, with five applications in excess."

The Topeka *Blade* will be completed to use a different grade whetstone if it ever becomes sharp enough to cut the EAGLE. The fact that it copied, without credit, two items from the EAGLE in one issue drew forth no comment from us – in truth, It is against our rules to insert dead head advertisements,

samples of which occupy nearly a whole page of the *Blade*.

Mr. Dwight Beach, Kechi township, and Mr. J. E. Thompson, of Grant township, each left in our office specimen ears of corn of their farm production. The ear left by Mr. Beach is fourteen inches long, contains 864 grains and fourteen rows. The largest of Mr. Thompson's is twelve inches long, contains 954 grains and sixteen rows. The latter looks like a backlog in size.

The farmers are requested to bring samples of their best wheat, oats, corn and all of their various products from their farms to the depot agent, who will take charge of them and send them to the A. T. & S. F. R. R. company's land office, where they will be properly arranged and put on exhibition at several different state fairs this fall. We hope the farmers will respond to the call and not let Sedgwick county be behind in this enterprise.

We have had another active week in the Texas cattle trade. Several heavy Illinois buyers are here purchasing and shipping daily. From a letter written by James Bryden to the *Live Stock Reporter*, we gather that this season's drive does not now differ materially from that of last year. On Saturday last, the number entered at Caldwell was 325,000, only 25,000 less than the total of last year. The drive commenced this year one month earlier than in any previous year, and has ended in the same manner, one month earlier, consequently feeding and even cattle intended for packing purposes have the additional advantage of one month longer on the Kansas range, something that will tell greatly to their favor when put on the scales in October, and something too important to be overlooked by intended purchasers. We hear of drouth in several sections of the country, but have had abundant rains in this section of the state.

Commend us to Wichita for sensations. A good portion of our population naturally tend towards a big noise, horns and Texas cattle. The afternoon preceding [sic] a benefit at the theatre, the other night, the variety brass band were hauled through our principal streets by eight yoke of cattle, piloted by a driver who swung a whip twenty feet long. The noise, confusion and dust would be hard to de-

scribe. The outfit had thirty-eight horns, thirty-two of which belonged to the oxen.

From two to three hundred persons assembled at the race track [sic] on Tuesday to witness the paring race between Fleetfoot handicapt [sic] to a two hundred and thirty pound wagon, William Foster to drive, against Avenue Bill to harness. As the summary will show, the race was decidedly uninteresting and one-sided. Match stake two hundred dollars; mile heats; two in three. Jim Anderson enters S. G. Avenue Bill, to harness. William Foster enters Fleetfoot, to wagon, distance. Time 2:53 $\frac{3}{4}$.

At a meeting of the officers of the respective school districts of Sedgwick county, at Eagle hall, Wichita, on the 21st day of August, 1873, for the purpose of adopting a uniform series of school books, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved. That we, the officers of our respective districts, recommend and desire that the following text books be adopted for the county of Sedgwick: Worcester's dictionaries, Hillard's readers, Goodrich's U. S. history, Walton's arithmetic, Spencerian penmanship, Bartholomen's [sic] drawing.

Some of our farmer friends are determined to kill us with kindness. Not a week passes but finds our slim larder made fat from their abundance. It seems almost impossible for a man to till the broad rich acres of this valley without becoming broad guaged [sic] and liberal in his impulses. So, too, with noble wives, industrious sons and fair daughters of this valley. J. E. Thompson, of Grant township, will please accept our thanks for a couple of fine, large heads of solid cabbage. We are also under obligations to a lady for remembering us with a luscious watermellon [sic] — she won't let us mention her name. Mr. Dwight Beach, of Kechi township, too, will accept thanks for a savor in the same line.

The new hotel is up, cornice on, and enclosed. Its proportions are artistic and its size approaching the magnificent. It looks grand, and the enterprise that secured its erection will be a subject of remark and commendation for years to come. It is only

eclipsed by two hotels in the state — the Eldridge of Lawrence, and the Otis of Atchison. We believe the stockholders as yet have not fixed upon a name. With their permission we would respectfully suggest a few names for their consideration. We give them in the order in which they strike us most favorably, being prejudiced in favor of a local name: "The Southwestern," "Fraker House," "Valley House," "Two Rivers Hotel," "Sedgwick House," "Wichita House," "Main Street House," "Granger House," "Ingalls House," "Grand Central Hotel."¹

SAD ACCIDENTS — Two sad accidents have happened within the past week, both resulting in death. Last Wednesday Frank Magee and Billy Anderson, personal friends, were scuffling over in West Wichita, when a pistol in the hands of Anderson was accidentally discharged, killing Magee almost instantly. On Saturday evening a blacksmith, by the name of John Snider, who had been working for M. R. Moser for the past two months, was out buggy riding. In coming up street he applied the whip so severely it caused the horses to run away. Snider in attempting to jump from the buggy was thrown against a house. He was found insensible and remained so until 5 o'clock Sunday morning, when he died. It is said he had a wife and child living in Boomer, Johnson county, Missouri.

Already may the ominous columns of smoke be seen of evenings, which tell us of dry grass and prairie fires. For the past ten days it has been exceedingly dry, and the rank vegetation of the valley is almost dry enough to burn. We dread the result of fires sweeping through grass eight feet high before a stiff breeze. We hope our farmers will not put off the burning of fire guards until frost. We don't want to record the sad news of the burning of homes, improvements and crops, the result of one, two or three years' hard labor, this fall; but unless immediate steps are taken to prevent the encroachment of fires, thousands of dollars worth of property will be consumed by fire in this valley within the next two months. Now, while the grass is yet green, mow and burn around your premises, using care and not permitting the fire to get the state of you. There

is but little danger in burning now, but month [sic] hence it may be.


